

Dick Stuart Blasts Two Homers To Lead Boston Red Sox To 7-4 Win Over Twins

New York Yankee manager Ralph Houk may have done the Boston Red Sox a favor when he snubbed Dick Stuart for the American League All-Star team.

Houk apparently not only stirred up the hottest controversy of the 1963 All-Star game but also lit a fire under the big first baseman.

In any event, Stuart returned

from the two-day vacation resulting from the snub with a pair of homers and five runs batted in that paced the Red Sox to a 7-4, 10-inning victory over the Minnesota Twins Wednesday night. Stuart's second homer was a three-run, 10th-inning wallop that ended Minnesota relief ace Bill Dwyer's string of 24 consecutive scoreless innings.

Stuart's first homer in the fourth inning was his first round-

tripper since June 20, and the two runs he knocked in were the first for him since June 28. The two homers and five runs batted in for the night increased his season totals in those departments to 19 and 55.

Wins Ninth Game

Dick Radatz, who was removed for a pinch-hitter in the 10th inning after shutting out the Twins on one hit for three innings, received credit for his ninth win against one loss. The victory moved the Red Sox into third place and dropped the Twins into fifth.

The Los Angeles Dodgers nipped the New York Mets, 1-0, the Philadelphia Phillies drubbed the San Francisco Giants, 10-2, the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Chicago Cubs, 3-1, and the Houston Colts beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-0, in the National League.

Stuart and Lou Clinton hit home runs and Frank Malzone contributed an RBI-double to the Red Sox' fourth inning outburst. Bob Allison hit his 22nd homer of the year for Minnesota in the fourth and the Twins tied the score with two more runs in the sixth. The other eight AL teams were idle.

Johnny Podres pitched a three-hitter for his fourth shutout and seventh win and batterymate John Roseboro homered in the eighth inning as the Dodgers increased their NL lead to four games with their eighth victory in nine games. Left-fielder Tommy Davis saved the win by starting a game-ending double play with an electrifying catch of Frank Thomas' ninth-inning bid for a two-run homer. Carlton Willey was the unlucky loser for the Mets, who have lost 11 consecutive games.

Pace Phil's Attack

Roy Sievers had three hits and Don Demeter, Johnny Callison and Tony Gonzalez two each to lead the Phillies' 14-hit attack. Errors by Jose Pagan and Willie McCovey paved the way for two three-run Philadelphia rallies that brought Cal McLish his ninth win and Billy O'Dell his fifth defeat. McCovey and Orlando Cepeda hit homers for the Giants.

Joey Jay, already a 12-game loser, flashed his 21-victory form of 1961 and 1962 by striking out 10 and yielding seven hits in 8 1/3 innings against the Cubs. Marty Keough's two-run triple in the first inning was the big blow for the Reds against Glen Hobbie.

The victory was only Jay's fourth. Relief star Hal Woodeshick struck out Smokey Burgess with the bases filled in the eighth inning to preserve the Colt victory for Ken Johnson. The Colts got both their runs in the first inning on Ernie Fazio's double, a bunt single by Al Spangler, extending his hitting streak to 14 games. Pete Runnels' single and Carl Warwick's forceout.

Jack Nicklaus Takes Lead In Second Round Of Open

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England. (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus, 23-year-old U.S. Masters golf champion from Columbus, Ohio, shot a three-under-par 67 today that gave him the early second-round lead in the British Open Golf Championship.

Nicklaus, 1962 U.S. Open champion and golf's third-leading money-winner this season with earnings of \$82,140, started the second day's play four strokes behind the co-leaders, Phil Rodgers of La Jolla, Calif., and Peter Thomson of Australia.

Nicklaus' lead did not stand up for long as Thomson came in soon afterward with a 69 that put him in first place with a two-day total of 136. Thomson, who has won the British Open title four times, went out in 35 and came back in 34.

Rodgers, who shot an opening-round 67 Monday, and Arnold Palmer, the tournament favorite who had a disastrous 76, teed off nearly four hours after Nicklaus.

Warm sunshine and a mild breeze greeted the second day of the 72-hole tournament on the 6,757-yard, par 70 Royal Lytham and St. Anne's course.

Nicklaus shaved three strokes off par as he went out in 31. He carded a birdie and a bogey on the incoming nine for a 38. Coupled with Monday's 71, this gave him a 56-hole total of 138 strokes.

His lone bogey came on the 356-yard 16th hole, where he drove into the rough, hit his second shot over a boundary fence, and missed a 15-foot putt after a good recovery.

His three birdies on the first nine were shot on the 208-yard first hole, where he put his tee shot four feet from the pin, on the 392-yard fourth, where his second shot rolled 10 feet from the cup and he sank the putt; and on the 553-yard seventh,

where he chipped from short rough to within three feet of the hole.

Palmer, who won this tournament the last two years, hacked his way to a 76 in Wednesday's first round while Rodgers, a wise-cracking ex-Marine from La Jolla, Calif., and four-time winner Thomson tied for the lead with three-under-par 67s.

Only four other players broke par in their opening tour over the 6,757-yard Royal Lytham and St. Anne's links. Scotland's Tom Halliburton and southpaw Bob Charles of New Zealand posted 68s, one stroke ahead of Spain's Ramon Sota and Australia's Keri Nagle.

Jack Nicklaus, the burly U.S. Masters champion from Columbus, Ohio, was bracketed with four others at 71 and considered still a threat. However, the remaining four Americans will have to improve greatly if they hope to survive the second round cut when the field will be reduced to the low 45 and ties.

Doug Sanders of Ojai, Calif., and Ilerman Barron of White Plains, N.Y., opened with 75s. Jack Isaacs of Langley Field, Va., posted a 76 and Bob Marshall of Huntington Beach, Calif., came in with a 79 — the poorest score of the seven Yanks in the starting field of 120.

Palmer admitted his opening round, ruined by four bogeys and two double bogeys, was his worst since he took a 77 in the third round of this year's U.S. Open.

"I don't ever recall winning after opening with a 76," the La Jolla, Pa., shotmaker moaned. "My putter was all right and my driver was all right. The only thing wrong was the man behind the gun."

The popular Pennsylvanian figured he needed at least a 72 today just to qualify for Friday's windup 36 holes.

Coach Jerry Droscher reports that he will be making phone calls today to get games for his crew, and a revised schedule will be carried in the News-Review as soon as games are set.

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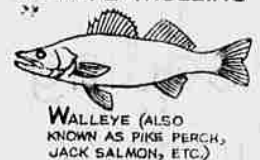
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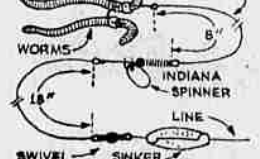
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Maris To Undergo Surgery On Friday

NEW YORK (UPI) — The New York Yankees, who have been looking forward to the return of Mickey Mantle, today faced the loss of Roger Maris for an estimated 10 days.

Maris will undergo minor surgery Friday at Lepox Hill Hospital for a rectal fissure. The operation will be performed by Dr. John Donaldson of the hospital staff.

Mantle has been out of the Yankee lineup since June 5 when he suffered a broken left foot in a game at Baltimore. He planned to rejoin the club today at Los Angeles but may not be ready to play for several more days.

Maris and Mantle have played together in only 23 of the Yankees' 51 games this season. Maris pulled a hamstring muscle in his left thigh during spring training and missed the first seven games of the season. He has since been sidelined several times with a bad back.

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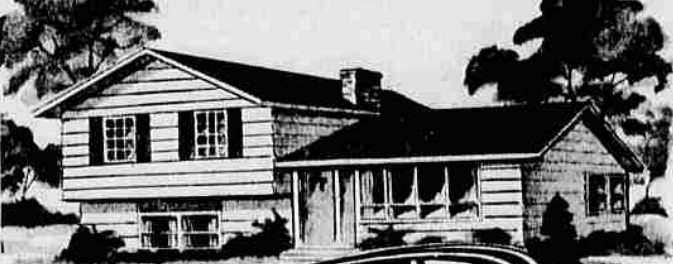
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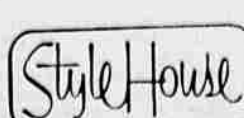
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
