

New Zealand Lefty Snarers Lead In British Open Play

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England (UPI)—Bob Charles of New Zealand, the world's best left-handed golfer, shot a remarkable third-round 66 today for a 54-hole total of 206 that gave him a one-stroke lead over Australia's Peter Thomson and two over America's Jack Nicklaus and Phil Rodgers.

Thomson, who is seeking his fifth British Open crown, shot a 25-36-71 for a 207 total. Rodgers, the 25-year-old La Jolla, Calif., pro who led by one stroke after Thursday's second round, had a third-round 38-35-73, and Nicklaus, the U.S. Masters champion from Columbus, Ohio, shot a 32-38-70.

Rodgers and Nicklaus thus each had a 208 total as the field of 47 survivors teed off on the final round of the tournament on the Royal Lytham and St. Annes course.

Arnold Palmer, golf's leading money-winner and British Open champion for the past two years, shot himself out of contention with a third-round 32-39-71 that left him 12 strokes off the lead at 218.

The 33-year-old Palmer, who won this tournament the past two years and was a 2 to 1 favorite to repeat this year, thus was left with little chance of even finishing among the top 10. Palmer

shot rounds of 76 and 71 Wednesday and Thursday.

Palmer, a heavy favorite to win this tournament for the third year in a row when it opened Wednesday, barely escaped elimination Thursday when he finished the second round 12 strokes off the lead. Not even Arnie's staunchest backers thought he could pull this one off, but the Pennsylvania muscle-man promised to give it a try.

"Tell those guys at the front that 12 strokes is nothing," he said with a wide grin. "Tell them to look out."

Then, in a more serious tone, Palmer offered the hope that "maybe I'll hit the ball better today."

"I've sure got to pull out something to get even a mention," he added.

The rugged Yank added a one-over 71 Thursday to his disastrous 76 in the opening round.

Rodgers, a brash ex-Marine, approached the final two rounds with supreme confidence.

"It doesn't bother me to be out in front," he declared. "That's where I like to be. I'd like to be leading at the halfway mark of every tournament I play."

In Thursday's second round, Rodgers fired a two-under-par 68 for a 125 total. Thomson, who had a 67 in the opening round, tied Rodgers for the lead, added a 69 that dropped him one stroke off the pace.

Nicklaus, the bulky U.S. Masters champion from Columbus, Ohio, charged into contention with a 67, the best score of the second round, to take over third place with a 138.

Kel Nagle of Australia followed with a 139 and Bob Charles, the popular New Zealand southpaw, was fifth with a 140.

Four Yanks failed to make the 149 cutoff. They were Doug Sanders of Ojai, Calif. (75-75-150); Jack Isaacs of Langley Field, Va. (78-75-151); Herman Barron of White Plains, N.Y. (75-80-155); and Bob Marshall of Huntington Beach, Calif. (79-77-156).

The bookies revised their odds after the second round, installing Rodgers as the new favorite at 7-4. Thomson was 2-1, Nicklaus 3-1, Nagle 7-1 and Charles 10-1. Palmer didn't even get a call.

Lone Oregonian Left In Tourney

Miss Jennett ousted Mrs. Walter Martin, Spokane, 8 and 6 Thursday and was scheduled to meet defending champion Mrs. Edean Ihlanfeldt, Seattle.

Mrs. Pat Leaser Harbottle, Seattle, defeated Mrs. Tina Powell, Portland, 3 and 2 in another quarterfinal match. Had was matched with Karen Ford, Seattle, in the other semifinal.

It will be father against son in one of the men's semifinals. Medalist Tom Storey, Seattle, eliminated Leighton Tuttle, Portland, 6 and 5 in two matches Thursday. His father, Ken Storey, a former champion, also won twice.

Bob Ihlanfeldt, husband and one of the women's semifinalists, defeated Bob Price, Longview, Wash., and Dr. John Harbottle, Tacoma, to advance into the semifinals against Mahlon Moe of Spokane.

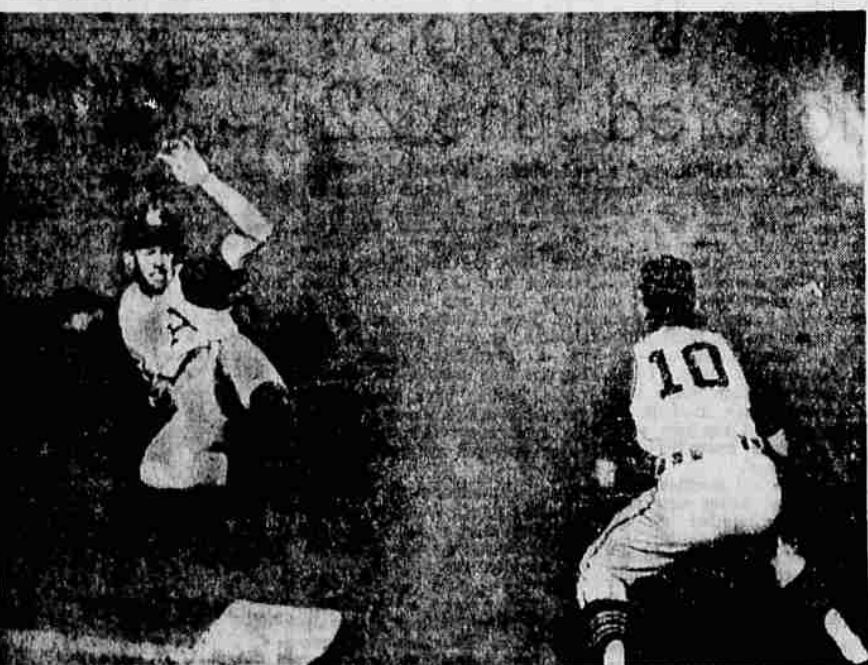
Winston also collected 11 hits, with Carleton, Westley and Bissonette each having 2-4 records. Carleton and Westley each connected for four-baggers.

Maloney Wins For Reds; Dodgers Edge Mets, 4-3

Strike for strike and win for win, Jim Maloney is a match for Sandy Koufax—and that's no baloney.

Big Sandy, the Los Angeles Dodgers' flame-thrower, holds the National League's season streakout record of 269 and with a 14-3 record is well on his way toward a 25-victory season.

There's no inclination in Cincinnati to question Koufax's talents, but the good burghers of the Ohio city point with pride to the fact that Maloney's current 14-3 record matches Koufax's mark and that Jim has struck out proportionately more batters this season. Koufax has 150 strikeouts in 156 innings while Maloney has 129 in 128 innings.

A 6-foot, 2-inch, 200-pound right-hander from Fresno, Calif., Maloney won his 14th victory of the season Thursday night in beating the Chicago Cubs, 7-3, after the Reds dropped the 11-inning opener of the two-night doubleheader, 7-0.

Something of a hard-luck pitcher in previous seasons, Maloney's 1963 win total is only three short of his total victories in three other years with the Reds. At the moment, he's potentially the Reds' biggest winner since Bucky Walters posted 27 victories in 1939.

Maloney yielded all the Cubs' runs in the sixth inning but the Reds broke a 3-3 tie with four runs in the eighth with the aid of a two-run double by rookie Pete

Jose. Vada Pinson had two doubles and a single and drove in two runs for the Reds in the eighth.

Dick Ellsworth pitched an eight-hitter and struck out eight in the opener, which the Cubs won with a parade of 13 batters to the plate in the 11th. A two-run double by Ken Hubbs, two defensive lapses by Charlie Neal and a two-run triple by Don Landrum keyed the big inning.

The Los Angeles Dodgers nipped the New York Mets, 4-3, the San Francisco Giants shaded the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Houston Colts, 3-0, and the Milwaukee Braves beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3, after a 6-3 defeat in other National League games.

Don Drysdale yielded a pair of homers to Jesse Gonder but got his 11th win for the Dodgers on the strength of a three-run fourth-inning rally and Ron Perranoski's sturdy close-out relief. The win was the fourth in a row for the Dodgers and the loss the 12th straight for the Mets.

Juan Marichal received credit for his 14th win against four defeats when Bob Bolin came to his rescue after Tony Gonzalez hit a triple and Roy Sievers homered in the ninth to close the Phillies' gap to one run. Willie McCovey hit his 24th homer and Jim Davenport had two RBI-singles to lead a 10-hit attack that dealt 10-game winner Ray Culp his seventh loss.

Don Cardwell pitched a two-hitter for the Pirates, who scored once in the fourth inning and added two insurance runs in the eighth on Donn Clendenon's two-run double. Dick Farrell suffered his seventh loss for the Colts.

Bill White's two-run homer and Dick Groat's double sparked the Cardinals' decisive five-run seventh-inning rally in their first game, but the Braves kayoed teammate Lew Burdette in seven innings and took the nightcap behind Bob Shaw's nine-hitter. Lee Maye and Hank Aaron homered for the Braves.

Hydroplanes Set Action
