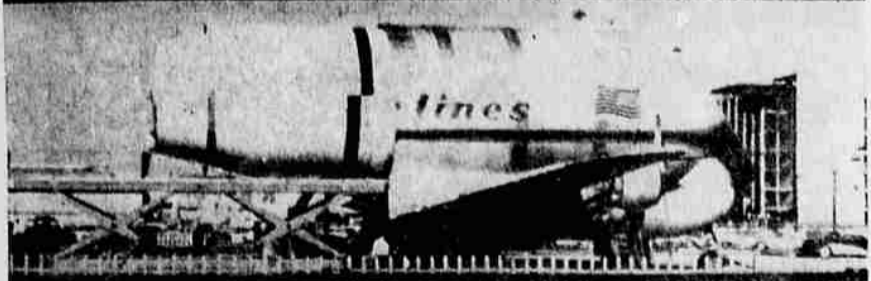
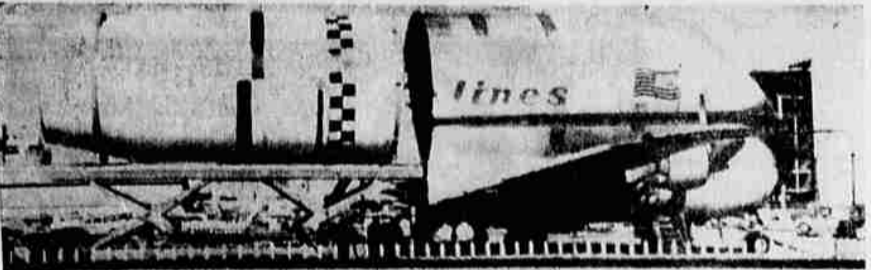

The airplane is the only one capable of carrying the 18 1/2-foot diameter Saturn IV rocket. It received official FAA certification this week and departed from Los Angeles for Cape Canaveral carrying the inert S-IV for the first time as a test run. The first live S-IV for launching from Cape Canaveral, will be flown to the launch site within 30 days. Flight time is approximately 10 hours as compared to three weeks by the current method of transport through the Panama Canal.



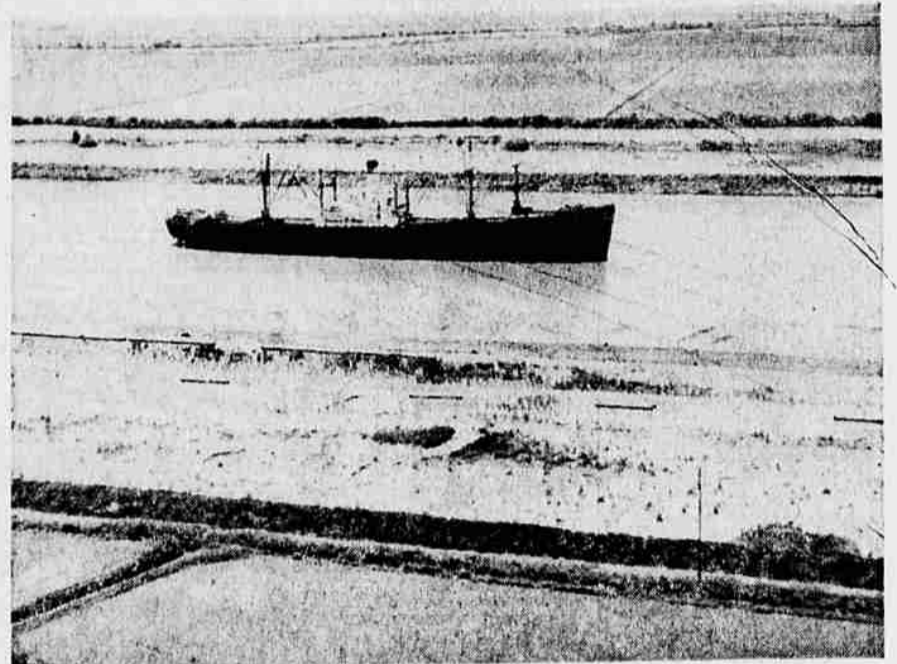
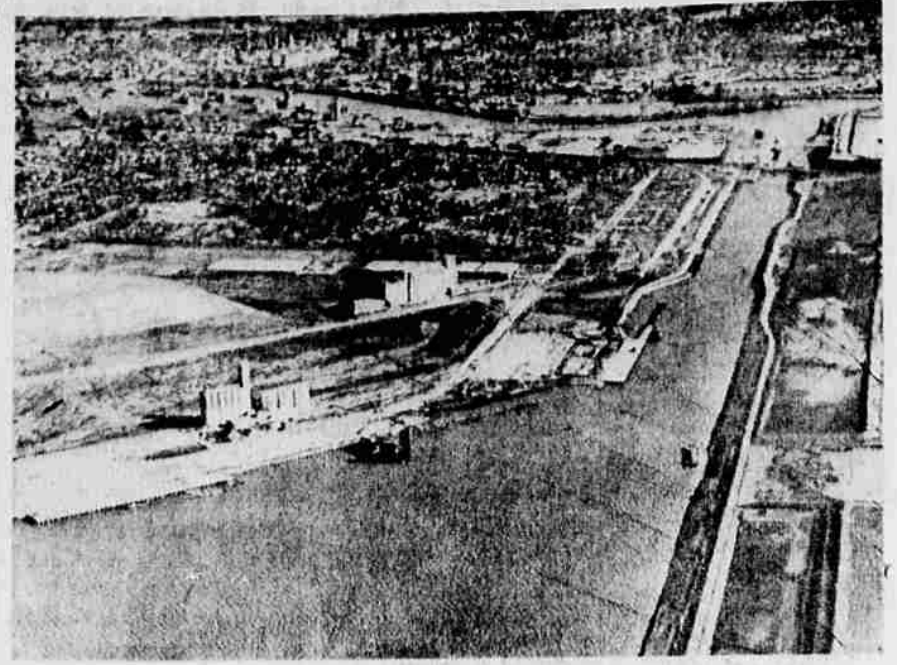

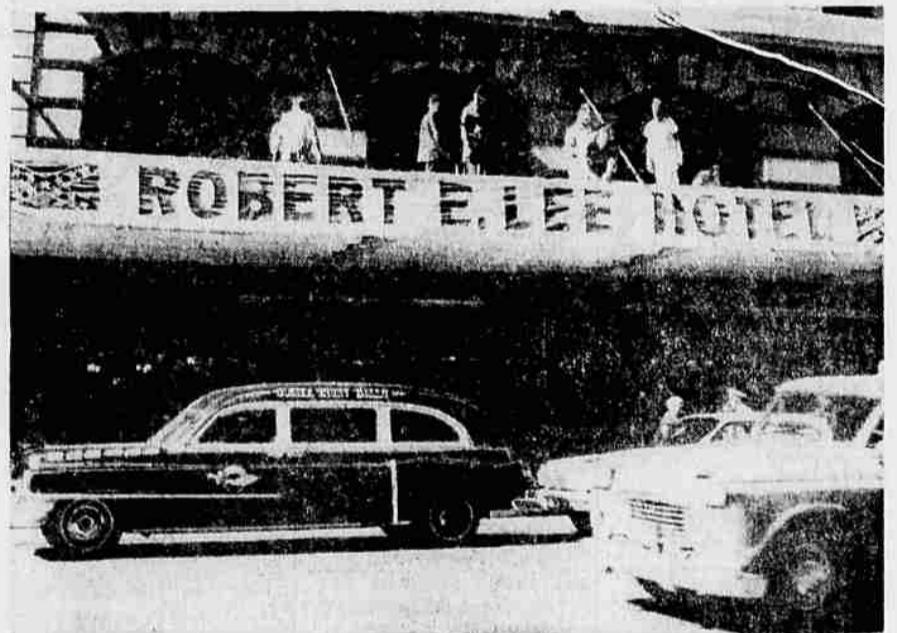
