

Koufax Fires 6-0 Shutout Over Mets

Sandy Koufax, the Los Angeles Dodgers' amazing fireballer, is enroute to becoming the first hurler in a quarter of a century to wear pitching's triple crown.

The feat—leading the league in victories, won-lost percentage and earned run average—hasn't been accomplished in the National League since 1938 and in the American League since 1934. Only eight pitchers in modern history have done it and they read like a page from baseball's Hall of Fame: Walter Johnson, Lefty Grove, Lefty Gomez, Carl Hubbell, Grover Cleveland Alexander, Adolph Lique, Lon Warneke and Bill Lee.

Koufax, however, now leads the NL's pitchers with 15 victories, an .833 percentage and a 1.63 earned run average and is on a hot streak of three consecutive shutouts and eight straight wins.

The 27-year-old left-hander added another brilliant game to his 1963 collection Friday night when he beat the New York Mets, 6-0, with a three-hitter. It was his ninth shutout of the season—more than any NL pitcher since Mort Cooper had 10 in 1942 and seven short of the league mark set by Alexander in 1916.

Strikes Out 13

In addition to firing his third straight three-hitter, Koufax struck out 13 batters to raise his league-leading total to 163. He thus leads NL pitchers in five key departments—shutouts and strikeouts plus the three that would qualify him for the rare triple crown.

The Dodgers sailed away Koufax' latest triumph, increasing their first-place lead to five games and dealing the Mets their 13th straight loss, with a three-run

burst in the first inning. Tommy Davis started the rally with a single and there were key doubles by Frank Howard and Ron Fairly in addition to an error and a walk.

The Philadelphia Phillies enabled the Dodgers to pick up a full game when they beat the San Francisco Giants, 7-5, the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 5-3, the Chicago Cubs topped the Cincinnati Reds, 4-1, and the Pittsburgh Pirates nipped the Houston Colts, 2-1, in other NL games.

In the American League, New York edged out the Los Angeles Angels, 4-3, Boston downed Minnesota, 3-2, Detroit beat Chicago, 7-6, and Baltimore topped Washington, 4-3.

Roy Sivers' three-run double and two run-producing hits by Don Demeter helped the Phillies pin a ninth defeat on ex-teammate Jack Sanford despite Willie McCovey's 25th and 26th homers of the season for the Giants. Art Mahaffey, aided by Jack Baldschun's relief, won his sixth victory. Harvey Kuenn also hit a homer for San Francisco.

Gary Kolb's two-run homer keyed a four-run third-inning rally which carried Bob Gibson to his ninth win for the Cardinals. Gene Oliver and Mack Jones homered for the Braves.

Bob Buhl gained his first win over the Reds since 1957 behind a 13-hit Cub attack that included Ernie Banks' 16th homer of the year and the 35th of his career. Steve Boros, Banks, Ken Hubbs and Dick Bertell had two hits each for the Cubs.

Dick Schofield's sixth-inning homer touched off a two-run rally which gave Don Schwall his fifth victory. Bob Bruce lost his 11th game for the Colts.

Corvallis 9 Is Foe Tonight For Two Games At Roseburg

Roseburg's rampaging American Legion nine added two more victories to its already impressive season's record Friday at the expense of the invading Sweet Home Merchants.

Lockwood Motors unleashed a nine-hit attack in the opener of Friday's twin-bill to walk to a hard-fought 6-3 triumph, then came back in the nightcap with a 5-2 victory without the aid of a base rap.

The double win gives the local wrecking crew a 28-6 mark for the year going into tonight's doubleheader at Legion Field against the Corvallis Elks. Game time tonight is 6:30. Sunday Lockwood Motors will be out to pad its league margin when it travels to Eugene to face Snellstrom Lumber (Sheldon) in a pair of counters. The games will start at 1 p.m. on the Cal Young Junior High diamond.

In posting the opening victory over Sweet Home, the local team grabbed an early lead with a four-run explosion in the initial frame. Walks to Artie McDonald and Mike Blomberg started the rally, with Bob Manning providing the power as he tripled to deep right-center to score two runs.

Catcher Jim Beamer followed Manning with a single to drive in the third tally of the inning, moved to third on Jon Burnham's double and scored on a throwing error at second base. A double play when Burnham tried to score on a fly to center ended the inning.

Sweet Home broke into the scoring in the top of the fourth on a single by Jon Edwards, a walk and a Roseburg miscue.

However, the defending state champs more than made up for the run in the bottom of the inning when four consecutive base raps after two were away added a pair of counters. McDonald, Blomberg, Manning and Beamer belted back-to-back singles to account for the scoring.

The invaders wrapped up the

fourth with a walk and Blomberg slapped the ball at the third baseman. The throw to second hit McDonald in the back of the neck and the spunky Drain infielder had to be removed from the game. A fielder's choice, a walk to Markham and a walk to Sevall scored the run.

Sweet Home picked up eight hits off Rojalio Gutierrez to get two runs. The Merchants scored in the fourth when Edwards tripled and Gary Yunker got a single. In the seventh inning consecutive singles

Gutierrez worked six full innings before Dick Williams was called to apply the stoppers in the seventh. Gutierrez struck out six and walked one. Williams came on to strike out the first two men he faced, then got Seiber to ground back to him to end the game.

While Roseburg was stopped cold in the hitting department, Miner proved to be the 'big-stick' for Sweet Home with a perfect 3-3 record.

McDonald, though he was removed from the game after being struck by the throw, was not believed to be seriously injured. He was put under observation by a doctor in attendance at the game as bad breaks continue to plague the fiery shortstop.

Berra Blasts 3-Run Homer To Lead Yanks To Victory

Yogi Berra is doing it from memory—but what a memory! He's 38 years old and on his last legs as an active player but he's still the pride of the modern New York Yankees when the team is in need. Like when \$172,000 worth of sluggers like Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris are out of the lineup.

Berra stepped in Friday night to show the young Yankee lions how the old pros do it when he exploded a three-run homer off Ken BeBride that produced a 4-3 victory over the Los Angeles Angels and boosted their American League lead to 5 1/2 games.

It was Yogi's fifth homer of the season and the 353th of his career and it enabled Ralph Terry to square his record at 9-0. It also sent the Angels down to their 10th straight loss and suggested to manager Bill Rigney that jumping off the nearest bridge might be preferable to pitching to Yogi with runners aboard and a game to be won.

Berra's homer came in the sixth inning with two out and Bobby Richardson and Tom Tresh aboard. Until then the young Yankees had been mesmerized by McBride, who had beaten them six straight times and held them to two singles in this game.

The Angels rallied for two runs in the last of the ninth but relief pitcher Hal Reniff hung on to preserve the Yankees' third straight win and their 11th in their last 14 times.

The Boston Red Sox edged the Minnesota Twins, 3-2, in 12 innings. The Detroit Tigers shaded the Chicago White Sox, 7-6, also in 12 innings, and the Baltimore Orioles topped the Washington Senators, 4-3, in other AL action. Cleveland at Kansas City was rained out.

In the National League, Los Angeles defeated New York, 6-0, Philadelphia topped San Francisco, 7-5, Pittsburgh nipped Houston, 2-1, Chicago beat Cincinnati, 4-1, and St. Louis won over Milwaukee, 5-3.

"Monster" Dick Radatz shut out the Twins for the final four innings and won his 10th game of the season when Carl Yastrzemski homered off Ray Moore in the Red Sox' 12th. Rich Rollins and Harmon Killebrew homered for the Twins. The win moved the Red Sox past the White Sox into second place.

The Tigers scored their 12-inning decision over the White Sox when Rocky Colavito doubled and scored on a single by Bill Freehan. Terry Fox, who shut out the last four innings, received credit for his fourth win while Jim Brosnan suffered his fifth loss. Ron Hansen, Pete Ward and Jim Landis homered for the White Sox.

Sherry Sevall and Bob McKee will carry the Roseburg banners to Provo, Utah, to compete in the 10th International Jaycee Tennis Championships to be held July 14-20.

Miss Sevall earned the right to compete in the International tourney by defeating Jill Izzet, Springfield, for the state crown in the Girl's Open division of the state Jaycee tournament staged on the Roseburg courts late in June.

McKee captured the Oregon Junior Men's Novice crown with a tough three-set victory over Medford's Nick Rasmussen, 4-6, 8-6 and 6-3, in the state championships.

Hutchinson Signs Contract For Two Years With Reds

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—Hatch-faced Fred Hutchinson, armed with his second two-year contract to manage the Cincinnati Reds, hoped today for a repeat of the 1961 season when he and the Reds brought home the National League pennant.

Hutchinson, 43, signed a two-year contract on Aug. 23, 1961, and his Reds responded with the pennant, the first baseball championship in Cincinnati in two decades.

Maybe General Manager William O. DeWitt remembered that Friday when he called a news conference to announce that Hutchinson had signed another two-year pact for the 1964 and 1965 seasons.

DeWitt said Hutchinson was signed to set aside all doubts that the fiery manager would return as field boss next year.

"We made the announcement at this time when so many other managers are being fired or finding themselves in disfavor with the fans and front office," DeWitt told the hastily called gathering of newsmen.

Hutchinson became manager of the Reds July 8, 1959, succeeding Mayo Smith, who was fired. Although Hutch was not originally hired by DeWitt, the two men have hit it off since DeWitt took over front office operations before the 1961 season.

Hutchinson took over a seventh place club in 1959 and finished in a tie for fifth place that season. In 1961, the Reds were tagged for another second division finish but they surprised everybody in winning the pennant.

Last season, the Reds did almost as well, winding up in third place with a 98-64 record, compared to a 93-61 mark in the pennant-winning 1961 campaign.

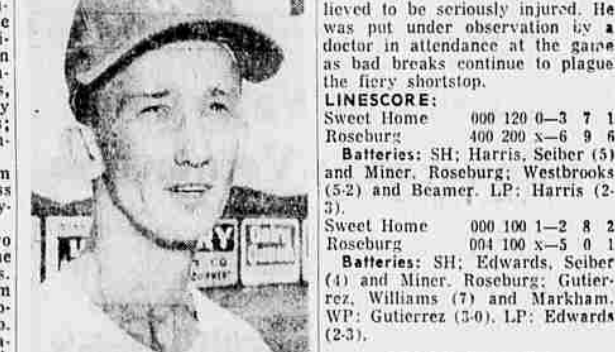
