

Charles In 3-Stroke Lead For British Open Golf Title

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England (UPI) — Lethander Bob Charles of New Zealand putted magnificently to take a three-stroke lead over young Phil Rodgers of La Jolla, Calif., today after the morning 18 holes of their scheduled 36-hole playoff for the British Open golf championship.

The lanky, 27-year-old Charles, shooting to become the first left-handed golfer ever to win a major international tournament, fired a one-under-par 33-69 on the first 18 holes compared to Rodgers' 35-72.

Charles birdied five holes but also shot two bogeys and took a double-bogey six on the 17th hole. Rodgers carded only one birdie and shot three bogeys as he fell behind in the quest for the \$4,200 first prize.

In addition to that money, the winner of the British Open will qualify for the "world series of golf" at Akron, Ohio, Sept. 7 and 8, and a shot at the \$50,000 first-place prize in that tournament.

Charles' approach shots and putting were superb as he required only 26 putts on the first 18 holes and one-putted 11 greens. His longest putt was a 45-footer on the third hole.

Warm sunshine bathed the 6,757-yard Royal Lytham and St. Annes course for the playoff.

Rodgers, a 25-year-old ex-Marine, was out to become the 11th American to bring back the British Open title. The 10 previous United States champions won the tournament 15 times. The group included Walter Hagen, Bobby Jones, Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan and Arnold Palmer.

Charles and Rodgers tied for first place with 277 totals Friday after 72 holes of regulation play. Both were happy to wind up in

the playoff after Friday's exciting two rounds.

Rodgers, a chunky 5-8 ex-Marine with sandy hair and a wisecracking manner said "I'm not complaining. (Jack) Nicklaus had his chance and blew it, so we are both lucky to be here I guess."

Charles, a contrasting 6-foot-2, agreed he, too, was happy and had no regrets.

"There were several occasions on which I thought I'd lost out," he said.

Gained Two Strokes

Rodgers gained two shots on Charles in their head-to-head duel in the second of Friday's two rounds to gain the tie. He shot a one-under-par 34-69 to Charles' 35-72.

Nicklaus, the Masters champion from Columbus, Ohio, was the leader with nine holes left to play but blew himself right out of the running when he bogeyed the last two holes. Even pars would have given him the title outright. As it was, he finished third with a 72-hole total of 278.

The last title playoff was in 1958 when Australia's Peter Thomson defeated Dave Thomas of Wales.

Rodgers wound up with 67-68-73-69-277 and Charles finished at 68-72-66-71-277. That's three under par for the Royal Lytham-St. Annes 6,757-yard layout.

Charles' only big win has been in the Houston Classic this year. There is more at stake today than the \$4,200 first prize and the British title. The winner today will automatically qualify for the World Series of Golf at Akron, Ohio in September with much bigger monetary rewards.

Sutherland's Babe Ruth nine holds a two-and-a-half game lead over its nearest competitor in the Central Division of the Douglas County Babe Ruth League.

Billy Meeks fanned 15 of 21 batters he faced in Lookingglass' lone victory.

After a slow start the Dillard 9-10 year olds have posted three straight wins to move out in front in the current league standings. The leaders dropped their opener, 14-2, to Winston, then came on to defeat Lookingglass, 22-18, Tennille, 11-10, and Winston, 16-11.
