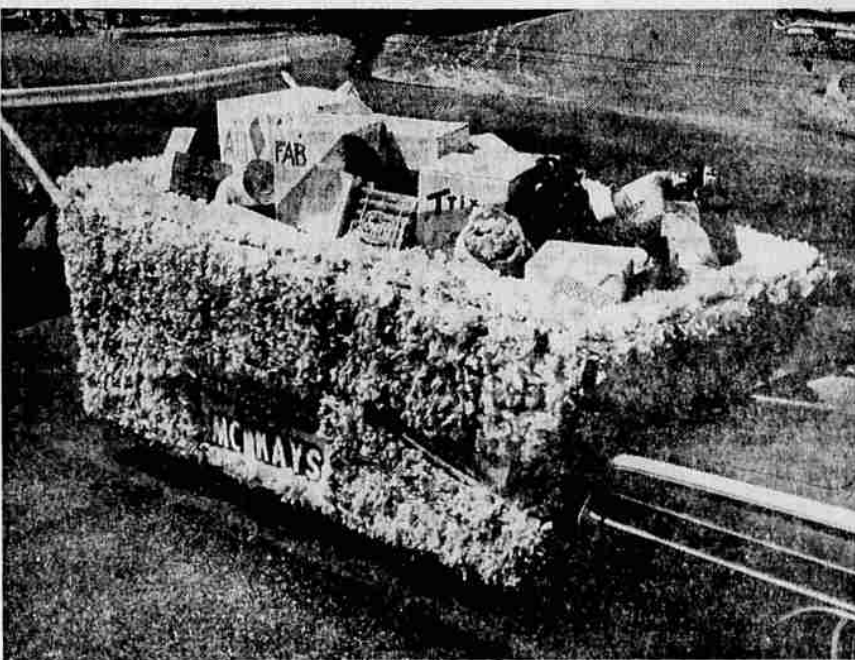

Murder Count Holds Klamath Falls Man

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI)—John Wesley Dean, 57, Klamath Falls, was being held on a charge of second degree murder in the Klamath County jail here today following the death of his brother, Hagan. Arraignment was scheduled later in the day. Hagan Dean, 54, died Saturday morning at a Klamath Falls hospital from knife wounds suffered during a fight last Monday. His brother was arrested Wednesday on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. The charge was changed after the death.

Freida Sales Hit 1 Billion

PORTLAND (UPI) — Sales of national timber felled by last year's Columbus Day storm now exceed one billion board feet, J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester of the U.S. Forest Service, reports. In the national forests of Oregon and Washington, 958 sales have been made. Stone said the most recent estimate on a regionwide basis indicates there are about 390 million board feet yet to sell. Total volume of blowdown timber actually harvested to June 30 is estimated at 403.3 million board feet, he said. He added that the current lumber industry strike-lockout has slowed removal of damaged timber in certain areas.

Portland Racial Problem Is Cited

PORTLAND (UPI)—Dr. Richard Frost, vice president of Reed College, said in a speech that the Portland Negro still faces the "grotesque merry-go-round" of discrimination. Dr. Frost, speaking before the City Club, described the "merry-go-round" as that of inappropriate education, making the Negro less employable, which in turn keeps him from decent housing, which leads back again to educational problems. He said that discrimination exists in employment in public agencies in Portland. He cited the Housing Authority of Portland and the City Bureau of Parks as examples of public agencies with less than "open" employment policies.
