

Lumberjills Capture State Softball Crown

Pounding out 15 hits in the finale, the Roseburg Lumberjills brought home all the bacon from the Oregon State Softball Association's B tournament at Albany.

The Lumberjills clobbered the Portland Missprints, 15-5, in the final game to win the state crown.

To reach the championship game the local girls had opened with a lopsided 32-1 victory over Woodburn, then handed the Missprints a 7-3 setback. In the semifinal tilt Roseburg ousted Mt. Angel with a 9-6 triumph.

Six members of the Lumberjills were selected to the all-tournament team. The large group of Roseburg all-stars consisted of pitcher Brenda Solnicka, shortstop Joanne Davenport, second baseman Shirley Zeigler, third baseman Cheryl McCoy and outfielders Rexi Nicholson and Joan Heeter.

In the final game, Miss Solnicka picked up her second win of the tournament as she set the Portland nine down on seven scattered hits.

At the plate Miss Davenport and Miss Heeter clobbered bases-clearing triples for a total of five RBIs, and Miss Nicholson came through with three hits in four appearances.

In their opener, the Lumberjills cut down the Woodburn team with a 30-hit attack in five innings. Glenna Wolford tossed the victory and Miss Davenport was 4-6 at the plate, including a home run. Miss Heeter and Pam Jackson also collected four baggers.

The Lumberjills, sponsored by Jackson's Wholesale, behind the pitching of Miss Solnicka, handed the Missprints their first loss, 7-3, in Roseburg's second game in tournament play. The heavy hitting was provided by Miss Davenport with a homer, Miss Zeigler with a double and Miss Heeter with a triple.

To gain the finals Roseburg spotted Mt. Angel four runs in the initial frame, then tightened up to record a 9-6 victory. Miss Wolford limited Mt. Angel to just three hits after the first inning. Power hitting by Nancy Crenshaw, Miss Davenport, Miss Heeter and Miss Nicholson provided Roseburg with its runs. The four all belted round-trippers.

In the slugging department Miss Davenport had three home runs and a triple. Miss Heeter slapped two round-trippers, two triples and a double, and Miss Zeigler had a 10-18 record during the tournament.

Dodgers Hold Biggest NL Lead Of Decade

The Los Angeles Dodgers are opening up such a huge lead that they may be able to let the New York Mets play out the last month of the schedule for them. It's been almost a decade—1965, to be exact—since any National League team held a six-game first-place lead at this stage of the race, and last it be forgotten, that was the year in which the Dodgers gave Brooklyn its one and only world championship.

Apparently determined to avoid a repetition of the collapse that cost them the 1962 pennant, the Dodgers increased their 1965 lead to six games Sunday when they beat the Philadelphia Phillies.

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lies, 3-2, in a game shortened to six innings by rain. The victory was their seventh in their last 13 games. Johnny Podres continued the excellent pitching which has marked the Dodger drive with a seven-hitter for his eighth victory against six losses. Dodger pitchers have given up only eight runs in the seven-game winning streak and have allowed two runs or less in 12 of their last 18 games.

McLish Was Loser
Maury Wills' triple and Jim Gilliam's sacrifice fly gave the Dodgers a run in the first inning and they added two more off loser Cal McLish in the fourth when he hit Ruben Amaro's error, plus singles by John Roseboro and Willie Davis. Home runs by Johnny Callison and Amaro produced the Phillies' runs.

The Chicago Cubs defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-3, after a 10-3 loss, the Milwaukee Braves won, 7-6, after losing to the Cincinnati Reds, 5-3, and the Houston Colt .45s scored an 8-3 win that extended the New York Mets' losing streak to 15 games in other National League action.

The Cardinals unleashed a 16-hit attack, featuring homers by Ken Boyer and Bill White, to beat the Cubs behind the eight-hit pitching of Ray Sadecki in

Charles Nabs British Open Title In Playoff

LYTHAM ST. ANNES, England (UPI) — Bob Charles, the New Zealand southpaw swinger with the soft putting touch, is headed toward the richest year of his brief professional golfing career.

A former banker who turned pro in 1960, Charles sealed the third spot in the World Series of golf at Akron, Ohio, Sept. 7, by winning the British Open over Phil Rodgers of La Jolla, Calif., by eight strokes in a 36-hole playoff Saturday.

Charles joined Masters champion Jack Nicklaus and U.S. Open king Julius Boros in the September tourney that features a first prize of \$50,000. The fourth slot in the rich event goes to the PGA winner at Dallas, Tex., next weekend.

This leaves Arnold Palmer with one more opportunity, the PGA championship, to gain the fourth berth. If Charles, Nicklaus or Boros win the PGA, Palmer still can back into the World Series event as the top pro money winner this year.

Before leaving for the U.S. Sunday and the PGA championship, Charles said the British Open playoff had exhausted him but he planned to return next year for the event when it is held at St. Andrews in Scotland.

Cool Nips Sheldon On Three-Hitter; Williams Twirls Second Triumph

Rolling on undefeated in Doug-Lane League play, the Lockwood Motors Legion crew of Roseburg moved two steps closer to clinching its third consecutive conference crown Sunday.

The local wrecking crew invaded Cal Young Junior High in Eugene to take on the spunky Snellstrom Lumber (Sheldon) team in a crucial twin-bill. When the dust had cleared Roseburg had posted 3-0 and 11-4 victories to boost its league mark to a perfect 12-0.

Han Cool, ace lefty of the Roseburg mound staff, and Bob Craven locked horns in a pitchers duel in the opener. Cool emerged with his 10th win against no losses as he set the host team down with a minimum of trouble. Cool gave up three hits, struck out 12 and did not walk a batter.

Roseburg tagged Craven for six hits and picked up four free passes — three on walks and one hit batter. Craven struck out seven.

Roseburg broke a scoreless deadlock in the fourth inning when Bob Manning doubled with one away and Jim Beamer followed with a single to drive in the initial run.

In the sixth two additional rallies crossed the plate for the winners. An error put Cool on to lead off the inning, and with one out Artie McDonald beat out a bunt single. Beamer walked to load the bases. Tom Morrison was hit by the pitcher to force in one run and Mike Markham walked to bring McDonald home with the second count of the inning.

The high point of the game for Sheldon came with an unusual triple play in the seventh inning. With the bases loaded and no outs McDonald hit sharply to the pitcher who threw to the plate and the relay to first caught the batter. Thinking the inning over Sheldon started to leave the field, but re-

covered in time to trap Cool between third and home to complete the triple play.

A wild second game saw Roseburg bomb Snellstrom Lumber with nine hits, which combined with seven errors, 11 walks and a hit batter accounted for 11 runs.

The winners took off at a fast pace when Manning slapped his seventh homer of the season in the first inning. However, Sheldon tied the count with a single run in the second.

Lockwood Motors took the advantage in the third with three

runs. McDonald was hit by the pitcher, Manning singled and Beamer walked to load the bases. Morrison collected a hit to left when the outfielder lost the ball in the sun after a long chase and Manning was safe on a throwing error at the plate on Markham's grounder. Sevall forced Beamer at the plate and Jerry Boucock brought Morrison home with a perfect sacrifice bunt.

Roseburg went on to add three runs in the fourth, one in the fifth and three in the sixth. Sheldon came on strong in the seventh to pick up its final three scores.

Dick Williams went the distance to pick up his seventh victory of the season. The fiery Roseburg right-hander struck out seven, walked one, hit one batter and scattered nine hits over the seven inning route.

At the plate the Roseburg attack was led by Manning with a 2-5 record, including his first in-ning round-tripper. Ed Allison collected three hits for Sheldon and Kim Herzner came through with two.

Corvallis' Wood Gets No-No Game To Stop Roseburg 9

Roseburg's American Legion Juniors had a 10-game win skein snapped Saturday as Corvallis' Joe Wood twirled seven innings of no-hit ball at the host team.

Wood faced a mere 22 batters in the seven innings and retired the last 20 men in a row. The lanky Corvallis southpaw struck out five and issued one free pass.

Behind Wood's sterling performance, the invading Merchants rolled to a 4-0 triumph. Lockwood Motors came back in the nightcap to dump the invaders, 12-6.

Wood's no-hitter was the second in a row against the local power and sent the Roseburg batters into the second game looking for their first hit in 16 innings. Jim Beamer's single in the fourth inning of the first game of a doubleheader Friday with Sweet Home had been the last base rap for Lockwood Motors.

After being set down in order in the opening battle, Roseburg came on strong in the second game with nine hits. Mike Blomberg broke the hitless jinx as the lead-off batter in the first inning when he smashed a single through the box — and from that point on Roseburg was on its way.

Corvallis picked up a single run in the first inning of the opener, then added three insurance tallies in the fifth frame. Randy Summy was safe on an error to lead off the first and Terry Westfall singled to center. Ray Mertes followed with a base rap to score Summy and Roger Cox singled to load the bases before two strikeouts and a pop fly ended the inning.

In the fifth Wood led off with a single, but was forced at second by Westfall. Mertes collected another single and Westfall scored on Cox's second base rap of the game. Terry Vaughn then powered a double to deep right-center to score Westfall and Cox.

Roseburg went back into the lead with a four run explosion in the third on four hits and three walks. However, Corvallis knotted the count at 6-all with a single counter in the fourth before Rodelio Gutierrez came on to put the stoppers on the invaders.

Gutierrez took over for starter Jon Burnham in the fourth with the bases loaded and got Bill Robertson to ground out to end the inning. The lanky Glendale right-hander went on to toss three and a third innings of no-hit relief to post his fourth consecutive victory.

The winning rally for Roseburg came in the fourth as Corvallis' pitchers issued two walks, hit one batter and gave up two hits while three errors landed Roseburg's cause along. The hits in the winning rally were collected by Sevall and Tom Morrison, with Morrison's double driving in two runs. An insurance run scored for the winners in the fifth.
