Lumber Industry Strikes Continue Spreading Today

Strikes in the Northwest lumber industry continued to spread today, after any hopes for a settlement soon were scuttled by the outcome of negotiations in Portland Monday.

The Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) and International Woodworkers of America (IWA) extended their strike against Georgia-Pacific Corp to its Springfield operations, idling between 1,000 and 1,100 men.

Pickets appeared at 8 a.m. at two plywood mills and a fiber-ply mill near Springfield, at logging operations in the Mosby Creek and Row River areas south of the city, and across a private logging road.

Monday the LSW struck a Georgia-Pacific plant at Toledo, idling 400 workers at a sawmill and a plywood mill. IWA members working in the woods were not affected.

Other Georgia-Pacific operations at Coos Bay, Coquille and Pilot Rock, Ore.; Olympia, Wash.; and Feather Falls, Samoa and Woodleaf, Calif., were working today.

About 22,500 idle

The Springfield closures bring to about 22,500 the number of men idled in Oregon, Washington, Montana and California by the dispute.

The two unions Monday turned down a wage increase of 26 cents per hour over a three-year period. The offer was made by the Big Six bargaining group in a seven-hour negotiating session arranged by federal mediators in Portland. The unions reportedly asked 35 cents.

No more meetings were scheduled with the Big Six, which represents U.S. Plywood, Crown Zellerbach, Weyerhaeuser, St. Regis Paper, International Paper and Rayonier.

The unions struck U.S. Plywood and St. Regis June 5 and the other four firms shut down the next day on the basis that a strike against one is a strike against all.

Pair Indicted By Grand Jury

A Josephine County Grand Jury Monday indicted Gerald Richard Oden, 25, of Wolf Creek, and Norman Stewart Thomas, 22, of Grants Pass, on charges of first degree murder.

They are charged with the slaying of Lloyd Miles Harper, 48, also of Grants Pass, during an alleged robbery attempt late last Friday night.

The two men were arrested by a state police officer from Roseburg Saturday afternoon and have been held in custody in the Douglas County Jail since Saturday. They were returned to Grants Pass about 10 o'clock this morning.

Oden and Thomas were scheduled for a hearing today in Douglas County Circuit Court, but that hearing was postponed after the indictment was returned by the Josephine County Grand Jury.

Purpose of the hearing, scheduled before Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders, was to determine if a crime had been committed and if there was reasonable cause to believe the accused had committed it. The action by the grand jury eliminated the need for that hearing. Judge Sanders signed the order releasing the two to Josephine County this morning.

Josephine County Dist. Atty. Lawrence Aschenbrenner told The News-Review that a hearing in juvenile court is planned next week for a 16-year-old girl from Walla Walla, Wash. who was with the two men at the time of the alleged fight which resulted in Harper's death and who was also with them when they were arrested.

Aschenbrenner said the indictment returned by the grand jury late Monday alleges that Harper was killed by the two men by beating him with hands and fists on his head, neck and body in the course of robbing him of an estimated amount of money and a gold wrist watch.

Red Spy Suspects Get Delay In Arraignment On Charges

NEW YORK (UPI)—The attorney for a Russian employee of the United Nations and his wife won a delay in their arraignment on espionage charges today in a move to establish the couple's diplomatic immunity.

Ivan Dmitriyevich Egorov, 41, a U.N. Secretariat personnel officer, and his wife, Aleksandra, 39, were indicted by a federal grand jury Monday on charges of attempting to send U.S. atomic and military secrets to Moscow. Judge Jacob Mishler this morning, but attorney William Kleinman obtained adjournment of the arraignment until Aug. 29.

Kleinman told Mishler he needed at least a month to prepare motions challenging U.S. jurisdiction in the case. He said he would object to "every proceeding" in the case against the Egorovs on the grounds that Egorov was ad-

Wallace Says He Won't Attempt To Enforce Civil Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace told Congress today that if the proposed public accommodations section of the administration's civil rights bill becomes law, he will make no effort to enforce it in his state.

Wallace testified for the second day before the Senate Commerce Committee, one of three committees holding hearings on different sections of President Kennedy's civil rights package.

A scheduled appearance today by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy before the Senate Judiciary Committee was called off when the committee decided to hear some of its own members ahead of the attorney general.

Sen. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., made an unsuccessful effort to

have the attorney general testify ahead of the Judiciary Committee members, since Kennedy and his aides were on hand and ready to begin.

Mrs. Gloria Richardson, a militant Negro integration leader in Cambridge, said demonstrations in the eastern shore town would continue even if it meant the arrest of every integrationist willing to march.

Philip Savage, a field secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), promised new demonstrations today and a rally tonight.

The two leaders spoke several hours after 14 demonstrators were arrested and released by National Guardsmen, called in last week to enforce limited martial law in Cambridge. Mrs. Richardson was among those arrested and later released.

In Savannah, Ga., a racial boiling point last week, Negroes who were thwarted in a demonstration march Monday night turned to vandalism and harassment. The demonstrators, mostly youths, broke up in small groups.

Police said one group mounted an overheard railroad crossing and hurled passing cars with rocks and bricks. They also reported that the rear windows of two automobiles had been demolished by gun fire.

A police riot squad moved into an intersection in the Negro quarter and dispersed a large crowd. Earlier in the evening two groups of Negroes, numbering about 150 persons, attempted to march from the Flamingo Club, a Negro night spot, but were

Blaze Razes Olalla Home

An Olalla Road family in the process of moving back to the area from a temporary stay at Sixes lost their frame home and all its contents in an early-morning fire today.

The fire victims, Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Swift and their five children, had returned to Sixes for a final load of household effects and were not at home.

The Tennessee Volunteer Fire Department responded to the fire call at 2:30 a.m. following an alarm turned in by a neighbor who saw flames in one corner of the frame dwelling. The DFPA at Tennille also responded. According to Mrs. Walter Coats, Tennille correspondent, the fire had progressed too rapidly to be contained, resulting in total loss of house and contents. Cause of the fire has not been determined, and it is not known if insurance was carried. The Swift family was due back from Sixes today. Mrs. Coats said.

In at 315—Out at 184; Foodoholic Feels Great

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Mrs. Elaine Johnson, 39, who walked into Wadsworth Veterans Administration hospital six months ago weighing 315 pounds, walked out Monday weighing 184 pounds.

"I feel great," said Mrs. Johnson who existed for 117 days on liquids and vitamin pills.

Since May 25 when the extreme diet was abandoned, Mrs. Johnson has existed on 300 calories a day. Now she is up to 500 which is the equivalent of one poached egg, a slice of toast and tea for breakfast, a small piece of meat, tablespoon of vegetable, lettuce salad and tea for lunch, and two poached eggs, bouillon and tea for dinner.

But Mrs. Johnson emphasized the battle wasn't over yet.

"It never will be because I'm a foodoholic."

Winchester Zone Unit Established

The Douglas County Court Monday signed an order formally organizing the Winchester Zoning Area, Unit No. 2.

This area begins at Page Road and extends south to, but not including, the Crystallite Tile plant. It runs from the freeway on the west to the natural hill boundary on the east, including the NE Pleasant and NE Club Streets areas.

According to County Planner James Slattery, the new zoning area will include residential, multiple residence, general commercial and heavy, medium and light industry areas.

The area around Keller's Mill will be heavy and medium industry area and the land between the freeway and the railroad tracks will be light industry, which involves those industries which create no smoke, odors or offensive noises.

Store Owners Refute Strike Conditions Exist At Market

Owners of Byrd's Low Cost Market — which was being picketed Monday by a retail clerk's union — today refuted the existence of strike conditions at the store.

Harold E. Carlson, Portland, secretary of the Oregon Independent Retail Grocers Association and a labor relations consultant, said all grocery and produce clerks are on the job.

"Since all employees are working, there is no evidence of any dispute as to hours and wages by employees," Carlson said.

Carlson said he met with Jerome Kramer, secretary-treasurer of Retail Clerks International Association No. 201, at Eugene Monday.

Offer Made

He said an offer was made to settle any verified wage claims which they claim in behalf of union members. No claims have been presented as of this date, he said. He said the same offer was made last week.

Carlson said it was also agreed to submit the question of employee representation to the NLRB and "we agreed that we would abide by their ruling."

"Inasmuch as there is no actual strike of the retail grocery and produce clerks at the market this would indicate to us that representatives of the union from Eugene are not fully informed." All employees of the meat department who do not work Monday had returned to their jobs today.

In spite of the dispute, the consultant said he is confident the dispute can be settled within a few days.

Picket On Duty

A single picket was on duty at the store today. Yesterday four persons carried signs indicating a protest of wage and working conditions.

Rescue Attempt Proves Futile

SAN DIEGO (UPI)—Jon Lindbergh, 31, son of the famed aviator, swam 100 yards from an ocean barge in a futile attempt to rescue a man from a crashed helicopter, it was disclosed today.

Authorities said Lindbergh, a deep-sea diver for the metropolitan sewage system, cut the man free from the pontoon of the copter to which he had been strapped and which was submerged in the sea by the crash.

The man, Calvin Hall, 48, El Cajon, Calif., a pile-driver foreman, died a few minutes afterward either of injuries or drowning.

Hall and two other men were injured Monday when a boom collapsed on the barge which was doing work on the metropolitan sewage system project. The helicopter flew out to the barge to pick up the injured workers.

Hall was placed on a stretcher which was lashed to a pontoon of the helicopter, piloted by Merle Handley, 34, Pacific Beach, Calif. The two other injured men, pile-driver Bryce Saylor, 28, and operating engineer Leonard Smith, both of San Diego, were taken inside the copter with Handley.

The helicopter plunged into the sea and overturned, trapping Hall underwater. Lindbergh swam to the crash scene, dived underwater and cut Hall free of the pontoon, but it was too late.

Saylor and Smith were taken to Sharp Memorial Hospital.

Fort Lewis MP Held For Bank Robbery

TACOMA, Wash. (UPI)—A young military policeman stationed at Ft. Lewis was accused today of robbing the Thunderbird branch of the Puget Sound National Bank in Lakeview, Wash., of approximately \$2,400 Monday.

Spec. 4 James F. Bray, 19, was arrested at his home by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents about six hours after the robbery.

Agents said they found \$500 in Bray's car and he led them to a place near the Tacoma Narrows Bridge where another \$1,900 was buried along with a gun, a briefcase and clothing.

Scheme Raises Possibility Of East-West Summit Meet At 1965 General Assembly

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—The Soviet Union has proposed that the heads of state and government of all member nations attend the 20th anniversary session of the U.N. General Assembly in 1965.

The suggestion raised the possibility of a summit meeting between the major East and West powers in conjunction with the U.N. session.

The Soviet proposal was disclosed by U.N. sources and the official Soviet news Agency Tass.

The Soviet recommendation was contained in a letter from Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko handed to U.N. Secretary General Thant Monday by Nikolai Fedorenko, chief of the Soviet mission, the U.N. sources said.

Gromyko's letter was a reply to a message from Thant asking for the views of all member governments on an "international co-operation year" for 1965 voted last year by the General Assembly.

Advocates Free Zones

According to Tass, Gromyko also advocated nuclear-free zones separating nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) from Warsaw Pact countries, normalization of trade between all countries and an end to colonialism by 1965.

The General Assembly has voted to set up a 12-member committee to make plans for the 20th anniversary of the founding of the United Nations in 1945. Thant polled the 111 U.N. members on their views on the resolution.

The Soviet suggestion came at a time when East-West cordiality at the nuclear test ban talks in Moscow led to hope for a relaxation of tensions and the possibility of a top-level meeting among leaders of the major world powers.

Diplomatic sources in London said Monday that President Kennedy does not favor a summit meeting with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and other Western leaders at this time.

But they said if the Moscow talks opened up the prospects for further cold war settlements he was not believed likely to refuse.

Eager For Meeting

Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, according to the diplomatic sources, is eager for an early summit meeting and would press for one if the Moscow talks are encouraging.

The sources said a three-power summit meeting among Kennedy, Macmillan and Khrushchev could be arranged on the occasion of

Plans for completing the paving of the North Umpqua Highway this summer got a shot in the arm Monday when an official of the Bureau of Public Roads announced bids will be opened on July 25 for the final stage of the paving.

Douglas County Commissioner Ray Doerner said N. B. Wood, federal highway projects engineer for the BPR office in Portland, will make the North Umpqua Highway a fully-paved route all the way from Roseburg to Diamond Lake, will have a dual completion date. The rock base must be in this fall, but if weather holds up the paving can be completed by the end of the year, however, it is anticipated the project can be completed this year.
