

Important Clues Soon Will Show Path Of Desegregation Movement

The next few weeks probably will provide important clues to the route the desegregation movement will follow in the immediate future.

Two factors are critical: —Can Negro leaders be persuaded to declare a moratorium on street demonstrations during the weeks it will take to consider a strong new civil rights bill now before Congress?

—Can Negro groups settle their differences and join forces in one unified drive for the "civil rights" they are demanding?

President Kennedy has proposed a bill that would for the first time guarantee access by

Negroes to privately owned facilities such as hotels and restaurants which generally are used by the public traveling across state lines. The Senate Commerce Committee has started on one phase of the bill.

Negro leaders are under the strongest pressure from both the President and Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy to call off racial demonstrations while the measure is under consideration.

Attitude Is Negative
So far, the attitude of major groups running the nationwide desegregation campaign has been completely negative to any proposal, even from the White House, for a moratorium on "direct action" demonstrations.

In keeping with their "no truce" policy Negro groups are moving ahead with plans for a massive demonstration in the nation's capital Aug. 28, timed when they expect the bill to hit the Senate floor. They say the demonstration would point up the urgency of passing the bill and would be a deterrent to an expected Southern filibuster.

Kennedy administration officials, sympathetic with the Negro cause, have warned that a major demonstration could have just the opposite effect. Administration Democrats know they will need strong bipartisan support to shut off debate on the bill. They don't think they could attract much Republican interest — and might lose some from the Democratic side — if demonstrations outside are being used to pressure congressmen inside.

Optimistic Figure

Negroes speak of promoting a crowd of 100,000 demonstrators. Granted the figure is optimistic, a crowd even half that size would present a monumental problem at best and a possible riot at worst.

Who among the Negro leadership would be responsible for the conduct of such a crowd?

Many groups, principally the NAACP, have found it necessary to campaign for Negro support.

Rep. Charles C. Diggs, D-Mich., a Negro congressman, proposed a "summit meeting" of Negro organizations "where we start concentrating on objectives and forget the differences which may exist among our leadership with respect to the pace and approach."

Aside from reducing the overall effectiveness of the desegregation campaign—a point that was being cheered by arch-segregationists — the division in the Negro command could have drastic repercussions in effective control of a demonstration like that being planned for Washington.

PASSES DRAFT BILL
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House passed and sent to the Senate Monday legislation that would exempt from the draft the sole surviving son of a family whose father died as a result of military service.

Under present law, if one or more sons of a family die because of military duty, the surviving son is exempt. The new measure would broaden the law to include fathers. House approval was by voice vote.

Discoverer Of Krebiozen Asks Hold On Cancer Drug

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Dr. Steven Durovic's withdrawal of an investigational plan for Krebiozen during the weekend automatically made all interstate distribution of the so-called cancer drug illegal, a Food and Drug Administration (FDA) spokesman said today.

Durovic, discoverer and owner of the drug, wrote to Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare Anthony Celebrezze during the weekend and asked that his plan for distribution of Krebiozen on an investigational basis be withdrawn. The plan had been filed June 7.

An FDA official said current law prohibits interstate shipments of any new drug that is not licensed and is not distributed under an investigational plan.

PREDICTS WEATHER

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The weather bureau forecasts below normal or normal temperatures for most of the eastern half of the nation during the next 30 days.

The bureau predicts below normal temperatures for the Pacific Mountain states, and above normal in the southwest central plains and upper Great Lakes.

Subnormal rainfall was forecast for the southwestern states and the upper Great Lakes and east Gulf states. Above normal rainfall is expected in the Northwest and from the Appalachian Mountains to the Atlantic Coast. Elsewhere, rainfall will be near normal, the bureau said.

It also was reported that the FDA was preparing a "cease-and-desist" order against further distribution.

Red Chinese Draw Soviet Accusation

MOSCOW (UPI) — Russia Monday accused Red China of war-mongering and racism at the same time that Premier Nikita Khrushchev was meeting in friendly nuclear talks with U. S. and British negotiators.

"What do the Chinese want? Is it war?" asked the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia on its front page.

The official government paper's blast at the Chinese Communists followed a bitter weekend attack on Peking by the Kremlin and coincided with the Moscow opening of a three-power conference on a nuclear test ban.

Monday's Izvestia editorial accused the Chinese Reds of advocating the "un-Marxist theory" of dividing the world into races and setting the colored race against the whites.

The new blast came after Soviet and Chinese negotiators went through the motions of meeting in their ideological talks. But informed sources said Russia's bitter and unprecedented attack on Peking's militant Communism had already sealed failure of the talk and it was believed the Chinese delegates may leave for home at any time.

More than a week of talks have only deepened the split between the two Communist giants, and even if further meetings are held the only result expected is a non-committal final communiqué, they said.
