Lockwood Motors of Roseburg could take a couple of giant steps towards clinching the Doug-Lane Legion title Wednesday when it plays host to second running Pitchford's (South Eugene).

The Roseburg crew heads the list with a perfect 12-0 record, and sports a 31-7 season mark. Pitchford's rests in third place in the current league standings with a 6-6 record.

Wednesday's 6:30 p.m. doublebill at Legion Field will kick off a busy week for the Lockwood Motors nine. Friday the local team will head for Grants Pass and at 3:30 p.m. twin-bill with the Southern Oregon power, then will be back at Legion Field Saturday for a 6:30 p.m. doubleheader against the Cummings Movers of Albany.

Sunday it will be back to league play for the local wrecking crew

when it travels to Springfield to take on a powerful Legion crew composed mainly of ball players off the state A-2 champion McKenzie team.

Ace lefty Ran Cool is set to pitch one game of each league doubleheader. If things run according to schedule, Cool will be up against South Eugene's Jerry Gjesvold and Springfield's Dennis Baldrige in the league encounters.

Cool, the strikeout artist of the Roseburg staff, has fanned 139 batters in 71 innings, while being lagged for a mere 27 hits and 12 runs. The flashy Drain star has a perfect 10-0 record on the mound.

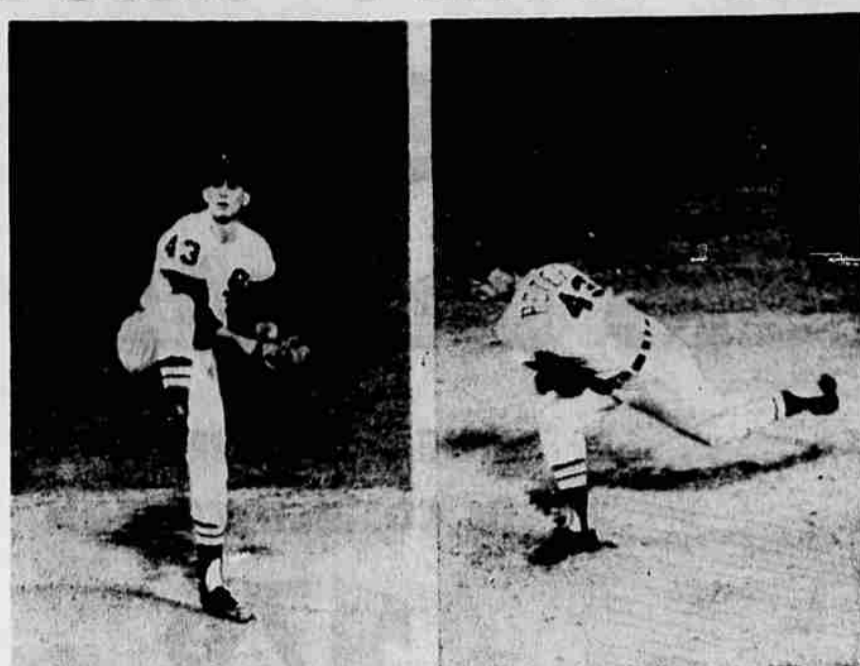

Opposing Pitcher Singles To Rob White Sox Hurler

The odds against a perfect game are better than 1,000 to 1 and they're even higher that you'd never guess who ruined Gary Peters' bid for one.

The villain was rival pitcher Robin Roberts, who has seen a number of his own no-hitters ruined but never before had acted as the spoiler himself.

Peters, a 26-year-old southpaw for the Chicago White Sox, struck out 15 batters and did not walk any in beating the Baltimore Orioles, 4-0.

Were it not for Roberts, the kind of hitter no pitcher ever really worries about, Peters would have become the first man ever to hurl a perfect game in regular major league competition since 1922 when Charlie Robertson did so for the White Sox. The only other perfect game since was Don Larsen's World Series masterpiece in 1956.

Can't Beat It

"No one can ever beat that," Larsen still quips. "The best anyone can ever do is tie it."

Peters lost his chance to even tie it when Roberts singled up the

Injured Ankle Takes Shutout From Hardluck Houston Hurler

Everything happens to Don Nottebart.

First he pitches a no-hitter but it's not actually a no-hit, no-run game.

And then he pitches a fine fourth shutout for the Houston Colts Monday night, but technically it won't go into the books as a shutout.

"Maybe I'm just not living right," he laughed. "I guess I'll never come closer to pitching a shutout."

Nottebart missed by only one final pitch Monday night, and even though he hurled a no-hitter two months ago, he still has not pitched a shutout in the majors.

Here was the situation:

The Mets had broken a 15-game losing streak with a 14-5 victory over the Colts in the opener of a two-night doubleheader.

Injured Ankle

Nottebart zipped through the first 8 2/3 innings of the nightcap and then had two strikes on Jim Hickman with Houston leading, 8-0. He suddenly injured his right ankle pushing off the mound and needed help.

"I couldn't throw another pitch," he said.

Hal Woodeschick came out of the bullpen, made only one pitch—a strike—and it was all over with the Colts on top, 8-0.

Nottebart failed to receive credit for a shutout but he's used to minor disappointments. There was even one connected with his May 17 no-hitter against the Phillies because they scored a run off him although Houston won the game, 4-1.

"I'm not kicking as long as we win," said the 27-year-old Colt right-hander.

The victory Monday night was his sixth of the season and first since his no-hitter. Roger Craig dropped his 13th game in a row and his 15th of the season when Colt catcher Jim Campbell tagged him for a three-run homer during a five-run first inning.

Frank Malzone's 13th homer in the sixth inning off Don Lee settled matters between the Red Sox and Angels. The victory was Boston's fifth in its last seven contests and the loss was the 12th for Los Angeles in its last 14 games. Bill Monbouquette brought his record to 13-6 although Dick Radatz came on for the eighth and pitched hitless ball.

Dick Stigman's four-hit pitching and three homers by the Twins proved too much for the Indians. Earl Battey hit his 20th homer with one on in the second inning. Don Mincher belted a two-run homer in the third and Harmon Killebrew socked his 21st with one on in the seventh. All three homers came off Dick Donovan whose record now is 6-6. The victory was Stigman's eighth against nine losses.

Home runs by Chuck Hinton and Bobo Osborne off Jim Bunning of the Tigers carried the Senators to their ninth victory in 11 games. Don Rudolph registered his fifth victory although Ronnie Kline took over for him in the eighth following Bubba Phillips' three-run homer.

Sensational southpaw Pete Richert is making a strong bid to get back with the Los Angeles Dodgers. While he is at it, he is also pitching Spokane to the Pacific Coast League's Northern Division title.

The hard-throwing lefty made his PCL record 5-0 Monday night while turning in his second best performance. His best, of course, was that seven-inning no-hitter he served up June 29. Monday night, he disposed of second place Tacoma 3-0 as both teams collected but three hits.

It was a tough one for lefty Jim Constable to lose. Spokane tallied one run without a hit in the fourth and the other when Dick Berardino tripled and stole home.

Safe Margin

The win moved the Indians to a healthy 4 1/2 game lead in the northern loop. As for the 23-year-old Richert, he has now labored 47 innings and surrendered 8 earned runs for better than a 2.00 mark.

In other PCL action Monday night, Oklahoma City outgouted San Diego 6-5 to move a half-game ahead of idle Dallas-Ft. Worth in the tense Southern Division chase.

Elsewhere, it was Seattle 5 Portland 3 and Denver 12 Hawaii 0.

Oklahoma City's win over San Diego was a dogfight all the way. San Diego led 4-2 after 6 innings, but in the eighth, Dave Roberts and Hal Smith socked successive homers. Then in the 10th, Glen Vaughan and Smith doubled and Bob Boyd singled as two more 80'er runs came.

The Pads fought back when Jim Saul whacked a bases empty homer in the bottom of the 10th. Dave Gerard, who relieved Dave Giusti in the ninth, got the win.

Seattle scored four runs in the sixth to defeat Portland 5-3 before a Shrine's night crowd of 4,931.

Pete Smith, almost kayoed in the first, yielded only three more hits the rest of the way and fanned 12. It was the eighth win against nine losses for the work-horse hurler.

Outburst in Sixth

Jose Santiago pitched hitless ball for four innings, but gave up one in the fifth and then saw Seattle pile across five hits and four runs in the sixth. A two-run double by Chico Fernandez proved to be the difference.

Santiago is now 8-7 for the Beavers.

Denver's shutout win went to Dick Kelley, although he had to leave the game at the top of the seventh after pulling a hamstring muscle while running out a grounder. John Seale finished in flawless style.

Salem skipped by Lewiston and Wenatchee and into first place Monday night in the hot four-team race for the second half championship of the Northwest League by defeating the Chiefs 6-5 while Lewiston took an 8-4 drubbing from Tri-City.

Fourth place Yakima closed to within one game of the Dodgers, beating Eugene 5-2.

The Dodgers, trailing 2-0, picked up five runs in the seventh inning, including a solo homer by Roy Gleason. Norm Rasmussen pitched a six-hitter and struck out eight to register his fifth win against four losses. Moe Morehart had a home run for Wenatchee in the first with none on.

A single by pitcher Billy Harris and a triple by Ernie Foli, both in the sixth, and each driving in two runs, proved the undoing of Lewiston. Don Marrs and Luis Rodriguez had homers for Lewiston, both with the bases empty.

Winning pitcher Dick Smith hit a two-run double in the fourth inning to spark Yakima to its win. Eugene's Andy Rubiotta was the loser.

Schayes To Concentrate On New Coaching Chore

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Dolph Schayes, high scoring star of the Syracuse Nationals who has been named as coach of the club shifting to Philadelphia, indicated today he would retire as an active player unless "the occasion arises" when he is needed on the court.

Schayes signed a two-year contract Monday to coach his former teammates, now representing Philadelphia in the National Basketball Association. He succeeds Nats' coach Alex Hannum, who declined to make the shift to Philadelphia.

The 35-year-old Schayes, who scored more points and played in more regular season games than any other performer in pro history, was asked if he would play in any games.

"If the occasion arises where we are short of players because of injury," Schayes replied, "I will be available to play." He added however, "I contemplate coaching."

The 6-foot-8 Schayes starred for New York University in college basketball and joined Syracuse in the 1948-49 season when the franchise was in the National League. The Nats joined the NBA the following season.

Marlene Hagge Wins First Major PGA Crown

It was her first victory on the ladies' PGA circuit since the Hoosier State Open in Indianapolis in 1960.

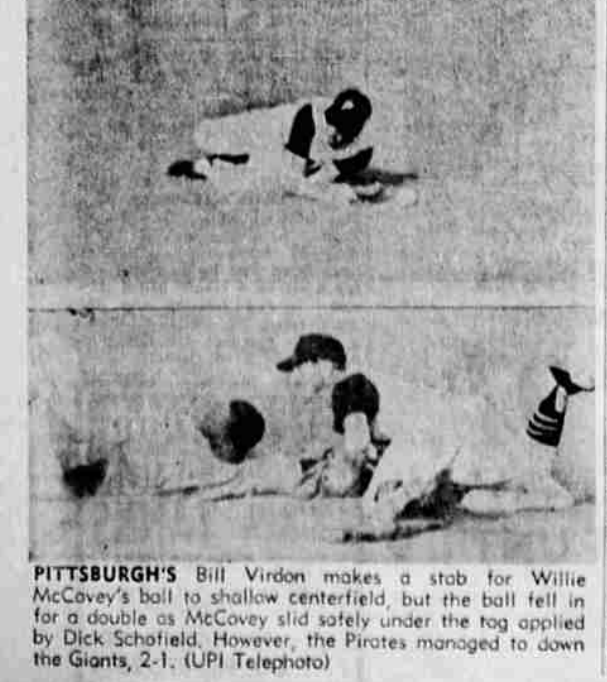
