

Young, Dornsife Paces Bees To 3-1 Extra-Inning Win

Stan Young and Charles Dornsife emerged as the heroes in the Roseburg Bees' spine-tingling 3-1 triumph over the Elmira Falcons Tuesday at Elmira.

Young gave the local Legion team its initial lead, but it was Dornsife who provided the necessary punch in the eighth inning after the host nine had tied the score at 1-1 prior to the end of the scheduled seventh and final frame.

The Bees grabbed the lead in the low-scoring pitcher's duel in the sixth stanza when Ray Shepherd was safe at first on a throwing error by the Elmira shortstop. Young followed with a mighty triple to break a five-inning scoreless dead-

lock and move the invaders out in front by a slim one run margin. In the bottom of the sixth Elmira, a member of the Summer High School League in Lane County, bounced back. Gary Dragt started things off as he led out with a sharp single. With two away a fly in short right field in back of first untouched between the first baseman, second baseman and shortstop for a single. Dragt who had gone to second on a ground out was off and running at the crack of the bat and came around to score on the cheap base rap.

Roseburg loaded the bases in the top of the seventh, but was unable to push across a run that would have ended the game. When Elmira failed to score in the bottom of the seventh the game extended into extra frames.

In the top of the eighth the Bees picked up a pair of runs, then despite a pair of Elmira hits in the bottom of the inning, managed to halt the home team.

The winning rally was started by Young who worked his way for a free pass. Young stole second while two Roseburg batters were going down swinging. With two away Dornsife, who had come on as a pinch runner in the seventh, rapped a single to score Young, then on an error at second base from the catcher's throw attempting to get the runner Dornsife gathered a full head of steam and did not stop until he had crossed the plate.

Russ Hubbard picked up his second win of the season as he went the full eight inning route for the Bees. Hubbard fanned 12 Elmira batters, was tagged for six scattered hits, issued six walks and hit one batter. Hubbard now sports a 2-1 record for the season.

At the plate the Bees managed to pick up only four base hits off the offerings of Tim Richmond. Richmond struck out eight and walked seven.

Roseburg's big blow was Young's triple as the Glider first baseman was 1-2. Singles were slapped by Chuck Peterson, Hubbard and Dornsife, with Dornsife being 1-1.

The next game for the Bees who now sport a 5-2 record will be Thursday when the Albany Merchants come to Legion Field for a seven-inning battle at 8 p.m. Friday the Al Pierce Lumber team of Marshfield will invade for an 8 p.m. encounter.

Kiwanis Set '63 Pee Wee Baseball Play

More than 300 young baseball stars will converge on Legion Field to participate in the annual Kiwanis Pee Wee Baseball Jamboree July 22, 23 and 25.

Starting time each evening is set for 5:30 p.m.

ings. Regular Legion umpires will officiate all games of the Jamboree. Admission is 75 cents for adults, while high school students and younger fans will be admitted free. Tickets can be purchased from any Pee Wee player.

The player selling the most advance tickets will be awarded a prize during the Jamboree.

800,000 Trout To Be Planted

SALEM (UPI) — About 800,000 trout will be air dropped into Oregon lakes in the next two weeks, the Oregon Game Commission said today.

Most will be two to three-inch eastern brook and rainbow trout. A few lakes will get some golden trout.

Operations have already started from the Klamath fish hatchery. About 50 lakes in the southern Cascades and a few in the Siskiyou will be bombed with fish from that source.

About 300 lakes will be planted at a cost of \$20 per lake, a commission spokesman said.

The Metro boss man, Bob Hull of Portland's Jefferson high, echoed Spiegelberg's sentiments. The game pits outstanding senior high school players of last fall against each other on a State versus Metropolitan basis. The series currently stands at 7 wins for the Metros, 6 for the Staters and 2 ties.

The Staters last win was a 7 to 6 thriller in 1956, but they did gain a 19 to 19 tie in 1961.

Roseburg will have a quarter-back Paul Brothers, tackle Doug John and end Spike Moore in uniform for the State squad. The trio of Indian stars all made various all-state teams, while John and Brothers were prep all-America se-

What are the odds that Dick Radatz, the Boston monster who terrifies American League hitters, would be challenged by a pitcher who was once blown off the mound by a gust of wind?

You name 'em and you've got the odds against Stu Miller, a 160-pound chap whose hobby is contract bridge, being in the big leagues in the first place. Yet the ex-San Francisco Giant right-hander is doing a brilliant job of relief pitching in his own right and is the key reason the Baltimore Orioles are still within shouting distance of the American League lead.

Miller, whose equipment is described by hitters as "slow, slower and let's not get ridiculous," has been the closest pitcher in the Orioles' last seven victories dating back to July 5. He's been the official winner in only one of those games and his season record is a mere 3-4 but that only proves that records don't always tell the real story.

Preserved Victory

Miller—he was "blown" off the mound by a sudden gust of wind during the 1961 All-Star game in San Francisco—turned in a typical clutch relief job Tuesday night to preserve the Orioles' 5-2 win over the Detroit Tigers. The win moved the Orioles to within 6 1/2 games of the first-place New York Yankees, who were rained out in Minnesota.

The Los Angeles Angels shaded the Cleveland Indians 2-1, the Washington Senators downed the Chicago White Sox 3-1, and the Kansas City Athletics routed the Boston Red Sox 11-0, in other AL action.

Miller was called in Tuesday night after the Tigers got runners on first and second base with one out and the Orioles leading in the eighth. He yielded a walk and run-scoring hit but then retired Rocky Colavito and Bill Bruton to end the inning and went on to shut out the Tigers in the ninth. Homers by John Powell, Jim Gentile, Brooks Robinson and Bob Johnson produced the Orioles runs as they dealt winless Frank Lary his third loss.

McBride Wins 10th

Ken McBride pitched a three-hitter and struck out five to win his 10th victory for the Angels. The Angels scored both their runs in the third inning which McBride led off with a double and which Lee Thomas capped with a run-scoring single. Jim Grant suffered his ninth loss.

Claude Osteen's four-hit pitching earned him his third win and the Senators their 10th in their last 12 games. An error by catcher Camilo Carreon on a foul pop paved the way for the Senators to score all their runs in the second inning. Osteen singled home one run and Marv Breeding tripled in the other pair.

McCovey Blasts Two Homers As Giants Split With Bucs

Willie McCovey is closing in on a National League home run record and there'll be no asterisk alongside his name if he makes it.

The free-swinging San Francisco Giant outfielder hit his 27th and 28th homers of the season Tuesday night when the Giants split a pair of 3-2 decisions with the Pittsburgh Pirates. The two blows gave him a total of 10 for the month—only six fewer than the NL mark set in 1949 by Ralph Kiner of the Pirates.

Kiner's mark doesn't have the prestige of Babe Ruth's 60 in 1927 so there won't be any national uproar to disturb Willie's comic-book reading. Baseball's poobahs put an asterisk alongside Roger Maris' name when he hit 61 homers in 1961 on the grounds the season was longer than when Ruth set his record in 1927. But as far as anyone knows nobody in baseball has suggested that the month of July is longer now than it used to be.

It only seems longer to NL pitchers, who have been coping with McCovey during his current rampage. The big guy has hammered away at a .323-clip since June 30 and has lifted his season average to .281.

McCovey's 27th homer came in the ninth inning of Tuesday night's opener and gave the Giants their victory. Willie also homered in the first inning of the nightcap and had a second hit during the game but the Pirates earned the split on the strength of a nine-hit attack that included two triples by Dick Schofield, one by Bill Virdon and doubles by Roberto Clemente and Bill Mazeroski.

McCovey has now hit safely in 21 straight games during which he has hit 14 homers and drove in 24 runs.

The Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-2, before suffering a 10-2 loss, the St. Louis Cardinals nipped the Cincinnati Reds, 5-4, in 10 innings, the Chicago Cubs defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 1-0, and the New York Mets topped the Houston Colts, 4-3, in other NL games.

In the American League, Washington downed Chicago, 3-1, Baltimore defeated Detroit, 5-2, Kansas City routed Boston, 11-0, and Los Angeles scored a 2-1 victory over Cleveland.

Sandy Koufax pitched a perfect game for six innings and wound up with a six-hitter that earned him his ninth straight victory and his 16th of the season. Wally

Moon's homer, a single by John Roseboro and a double by Jim Gilliam were the big blows of the Dodgers' 12-hit attack.

Dallas Green pitched an eight-hitter in the second game as John Callison hit two homers and Tony Taylor and Roy Sivers had two hits for the Phillies.

Tim McCarver's two-strike bunt, which started foul and then rolled fair, brought in Bill White from third base with the winning run for the Cardinals. Bobby Shantz struck out eight batters in 3 2/3 innings to win his fourth game while Joey Jay, appearing in relief, suffered his 14th defeat.

Bob Buhl pitched 6 2/3 innings of hitless ball and allowed only one hit before retiring because of the heat after seven innings to post his ninth win for the amazing Cubs. Ken Hubbs homered in the fifth inning for the Cubs, who moved to within 5 1/2 games of the NL lead.

The Mets broke a 3-3 tie in the ninth inning when Norm Sherry's bad-hop single went over shortstop Jim Wynn's head and enabled Rod Kanehl to score from third. Galen Cisco, who pitched a hitless ninth, won his fifth game while Hal Woodeshick suffered his fifth loss.



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
