## Tim Kash, Zonga Set To Make Bid For National Arabian Title

Oregon has never had a national Arabian horse show championship, but this year, and the onslaught may be carried by a slight, 18-year-old Dillard lad and his handsome Arabian gelding.

The youth, Tim Kash, who was just graduated from Douglas High School, earned the championship with his horse Zonga last weekend. In the Washington All-Arabian Show at Yakima, they claimed three firsts and a second in the four classes they were allowed to enter.

They took second in the three-gaited mare and gelding class; firsts in the combination class, formal driving class and the three-gaited championship stake class.

It was the victory in the last class which qualified the two for the national championship competition in Houston, Tex., in October.

The trip to the nationals depends on whether or not officials at the Arizona State College in Tempe will allow him the time to attend the championship show. He will just be starting his freshman year at college when the show comes along.

The victory at Washington was the culmination of a career in horsemanship which has already made young Tim a veteran in horse show competition. He has 31 trophies to his credit, as well as uncounted ribbons which line all walls of a room in the Kash home.

Among the wins for Tim and his 6-year-old purebred Arabian gelding bay are the Arabian three-gaited \$500 stake class at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland two years running; three-gaited class and informal driving class at the Emerald Empire Horse Show; All-Arabian Horse and Pacific Coast Championship Classic at the Cow Palace in San Francisco in the three gaited mare and gelding class.

The thrill of competition will keep the youth and the horse busy every weekend until school starts, as well.

This weekend they go to the Portland Meadows Horse Show, followed by the Highland Hunt Club Show in Portland, the Glendale Acres Hunt Club Show in Salem, the Arabian Horse Show at the State Fair and the Pacific Coast Championship Classic again at San Francisco.

The rise to the giddy heights of top-flight riding competition started for young Tim when he was 12. It was then he began taking riding lessons from A. C. Sherlock of Winston. His horse, Zonga, came on the scene three years ago when it was broken and given its original training. For the last two years, the training job has been all Tim's. Since then the boy-horse team

has steadily improved. By last year, the duo was reaching a high peak of performance. Zonga was named reserve champion in the Associated Hunt Clubs of Oregon and also in the Oregon Horsemen's Association.

With the moral support of his

parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Kash, the two are expected to climb even higher. Tim explains that Arabian horses generally don't reach their peaks until they are 7 years old. It sounds as if much more will be heard of Tim Kash and Zonga.

## Arnold Palmer Is Favored In PGA Tourney Thursday

**DALLAS (UPI)** — Favored Arnold Palmer laughed off the suggestions of his fellow pros today that if he doesn't win the PGA golf championship this week he may develop a defeatist complex which will keep him from ever capturing it.

"Maybe it's wishful thinking on their part," Palmer smiled. "At least, I haven't stayed awake nights worrying about it and I'm not likely to start. Of course, if I don't win it pretty soon I'm liable to start wondering if I ever will."

"But right now, I'm not worried. I'm worried more about my head cold and my driving."

The PGA, which starts Thursday over the 7,046-yard heat-seared Dac Country Club course, is the only major title Palmer hasn't won. He has taken the Masters three times, the British Open twice and the U. S. Open once.

**Palmer Is Favorite** — Despite his poor showing in the British Open last week, Palmer is regarded as the man to beat in this 45th annual tournament for the nation's golf professionals.

"You never want to sell Palmer short," said big George Bayer, who thinks his chances on rolling course "are as good as anybody's."

"I see where a lot of the pros don't think that Palmer, Jack Nicklaus or Gary Player (the defending champion) can win this one," Bayer added, "all I can say is that any one of them can win any tournament they play in."

"I'm not saying one of the three will win here, but I wouldn't want to have to bet against it."

A lot of pros, who didn't want to be quoted for fear they might

offend Palmer, said they thought that Palmer may develop a "Sam Snead complex" if he failed to win the PGA in his sixth try. Snead has won all the big ones except the U. S. Open and at 50, he isn't likely ever to win the one major tournament that isn't on his 112 tournament victory list.

# Roseburg Aquatic Aces To Host Willamalane On Saturday

Roseburg's swim team will host the powerful Willamalane contingent from Springfield Saturday in the first home meet of the season.

The two clubs will square off at the Roseburg Municipal pool at 12:30 p.m. for competition in age-group swimming races and diving events. Admission for the dual meet is free.

Roseburg is fresh from a fifth place finish in District II competition of the Emerald Empire Swim Conference. The local crew racked up 148 points to follow four teams that have a year-round practice schedule.

Winning the district title was the powerful Reedsport Aquatic Braves with 396½ points. Medford finished second with 282, the North Bend Aquatic Club was third with 222 and Grants Pass ended fourth with 213½ points. Trailing fifth place Roseburg was Lakeview with 51 points and Klamath Falls with 25 points.

In the District II meet the Willamalane swimmers finished second to the red-hot Eugene Y team. Eugene racked up 660½ points, while Willamalane had 249.

Roseburg's only first place awards in the district meet were won by Laurie Hicks in the girls 9-10 diving competition, Jim Weaver in the boys 9-10 diving, and Ron Frashour in the boys 13-14 100-yard backstroke event. Frashour was timed at 1:13.6 for his victory, while Miss Hicks racked up 28½ points.

Second places for Roseburg went to Jeanne Forrest in the girls 13-14 diving with 71 points, Ron Frashour in the boys 13-14 100-yard freestyle race with a time of 59.7, Chris Longfellow in the boys 13-14 100-yard breaststroke with a time of 1:17.2, the 13-14 100 individual medley with a clocking of 1:16.6 and both Frashour and Longfellow swam a leg of the second place

200-yard freestyle relay team, the senior girls 200-yard relay team with a time of 2:06.4, Kathy McMullen in the senior girls diving and Bill Zimmerman in the senior boys 100-yard breaststroke with a clocking of 1:11.4.
