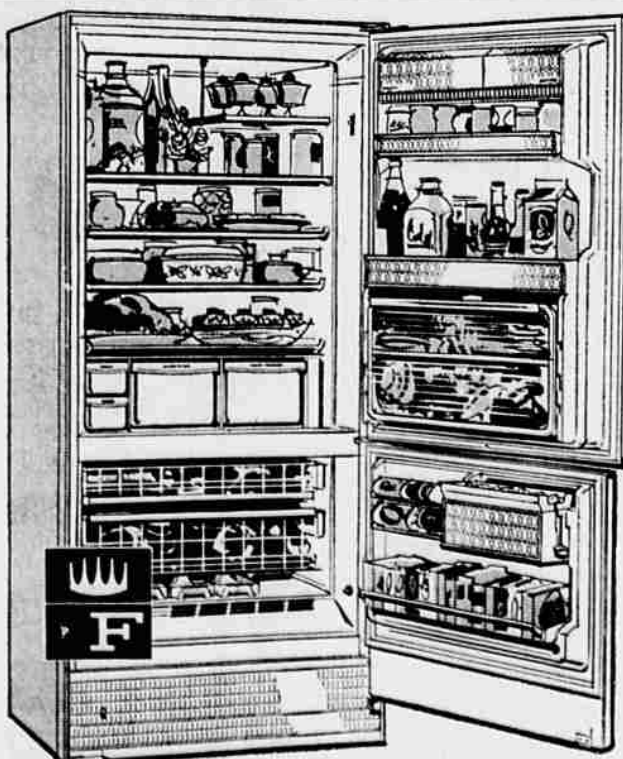
The couple has four children, 11 grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren.
