Area Bean Growers Request Delay For School Opening

A delegation of Roseburg area farmers, representing a half-million dollar bean industry, appeared before the Roseburg School Board Wednesday night and requested a delay in the opening of school this fall.

The farmers said that unless they can recruit pickers from the ranks of the district's youth, the bean crop will be lost. The cool and wet summer which has prevailed in Douglas County has set the growing cycle back at least two weeks.

The School Board voted to act on the request at its next meeting, July 31. The board also called on the school administration to study the effect of such a move would have on the school year and make a recommendation at the next meeting.

The growers requested a delay in the opening of school until Sept. 16. Presently, the opening date is set for Sept. 3.

John Richardson of the Oregon Employment Service appeared at the meeting and backed up the growers' claim that farmers cannot depend on laborers other than the youngsters to get the crop harvested.

School Board member Dr. Nels Lindell said he did not see how the board could justify holding up an educational program for 6,000 students when only a small percentage of them would be involved in the bean picking. He suggested the board make a policy to authorize all students who take part in the harvest to be excused from school while they're working.

The farmers contended that once school is open the students will not want to miss classes, and their parents will want them in school.

School Board Vice Chairman Don Reed said "I feel we must remember that agriculture is our second biggest industry. It seems to me that perhaps we should go along with the farmers on this request."

Members of the growers' delegation contacted following their appearance before the School Board said there is no room for a delay in the harvest. They said the price of the beans decreases every day they're ripened. Starting at a top price of \$170 a ton, they can drop to the point of being useless for anything but fertilizer or cattle feed rapidly.

The growers are anticipating a crop of about 1,700 tons of beans this year. Average paid here last season was \$121 per ton. The growers state that better than half the money received for their beans goes to the pickers, adding \$250,000 in wages to the community.

Big Three Near Partial Accord On Test Ban

Berlin Issue Talks May Be Due At Meet

MOSCOW (UPI)—Top-level U.S., British, and Soviet negotiators met anew today in the Moscow three-power nuclear conference amid increasing indications an agreement may be reached soon on a partial test ban.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, U.S. Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman and British Science Minister Lord Hailsham opened the fourth session of the Big Three talks at 6:30 a.m. PDT.

The negotiations resumed in the wake of a Washington news conference statement by President Kennedy that he was "hopeful" the negotiators would agree to halting nuclear tests in the atmosphere, underwater and in space.

Progress Noted

A three-power communique issued in Moscow Wednesday night said that "progress" had been made in drafting treaty provisions. The rival East and West drafts already put forward at the Moscow nuclear talks were understood to be fairly close in positions.

The Big Three talks began an hour and a half later than scheduled today because of a lunch Gromyko gave for visiting East German Foreign Minister Lothar Boltz.

East German sources said Boltz was in Moscow to discuss the Berlin problem in connection with the three-power talks.

The consultations between Soviet and East German leaders during the nuclear conference led to speculation that another move might be in the works to try to solve the Berlin problem.

Other Topics Discussed

The conference although primarily devoted to the nuclear issue, was understood to have already held soundings—but not negotiations—on a number of cold war issues, including an East-West non-aggression pact and the problem of Laos.

While the Soviets wanted to link a partial test ban treaty with a non-aggression pact between NATO and the Warsaw Pact nations, the Western Allies were opposed on the grounds such a pact would involve Western diplomatic recognition of Communist East Germany.

Oregon Surplus Near \$2 Million

SALEM (UPI)—The State of Oregon ended the 1961-63 biennium with a surplus of nearly \$2 million, State Finance Director Freeman Holmer announced today.

The figure is well over \$1 million more than expected when the 1963 legislature closed up shop early last month.

Holmer also estimated that under the new tax program passed by the 1963 legislature the state would end the 1963-65 biennium with a \$4.9 million surplus.

Holmer said today that unexpected increases in corporation excise tax collections and state liquor revenues last month were responsible for the additional \$1 million in the 1961-63 surplus.

The state ended the biennium with \$1,943,779.

Holmer said corporation tax collections in June were \$608,000 more than was anticipated and that the liquor commission raised \$37,000 more than was expected.

Personal and corporation tax collections for the biennium amounted to \$233,775,532, which was \$22 million less than the 1961 legislature had estimated in preparing the 1961-63 budget.

However, state spending was out from \$265 million to \$358 million.

In order to balance the last biennium's budget the state also transferred \$5.5 million from the veterans loan sinking fund to the general fund.

Liquor sales during the biennium brought in \$3 million more than was anticipated in 1961 while gift and inheritance taxes produced an added \$4.8 million and interest earnings were \$1.4 million over estimates.

Salem Fall Claims Life Of Acrobat

SALEM (UPI)—A 33-year-old circus acrobat fell 25 feet to her death during a performance of the Rudy Brothers Shrine Circus Wednesday before a crowd of about 3,500 persons.

The audience which saw Mrs. Arthur Duchek fall was not aware the fall was fatal. She toppled from a high wire during an act billed as the "Cosmos."

The show went on while Mrs. Duchek was carried behind the scenes. A doctor said she suffered a broken neck.

She was one of three persons billed in the act.

Mrs. Duchek was balancing on a ladder on a motorcycle traveling up an inclined wire towards the rafters of the armory at the Oregon State Fairgrounds. Her husband, Arthur, was driving. Suddenly, Mrs. Duchek struck a guy wire left there from an earlier act.

Fell 25 Feet

She tumbled 25 feet to a concrete floor and died minutes later en route to a hospital.

Another performer, Ronnie Weinrich, was on the ladder with her. He and Duchek managed to hang on and were unhurt.

The show went on, but people began drifting out of the audience. About half remained to see the end of the circus.

The Ducheks were part of the Cosmos act from Vienna, Austria. They had been in the United States about one year. A circus spokesman said they had never used a net in the balancing act.

Rudy Brothers Circus operates out of Alhambra, Calif. The circus was scheduled to leave for Susanville, Calif., after the night performance in Salem.

Man Injured Earlier

Just a week ago in Vancouver, Wash., a performer with the same circus fell 16 feet when he attempted a one-finger stand in a drenching rain.

Manuel Ramos, 22, escaped serious injury in the fall to a wooden platform. He was knocked unconscious and was treated at a Vancouver hospital and released.

C. Bailey Named Benson Principal

The Roseburg School Board Wednesday night appointed Charles Bailey principal of Benson Elementary School.

Bailey will replace Robert Keady as principal at Benson. Keady was appointed principal at Fremont Junior High to replace Robert McKee when McKee was named high school principal.

Bailey, a 1948 graduate of Roseburg High School, received a bachelor of science degree in agriculture from Oregon State University in 1952. He then entered the army and served two years in Germany.

Following his Army service, Bailey enrolled at Southern Oregon College, where he received a BS degree in education in 1956. He received his Masters Degree in education at SOC in 1959.

Bailey taught at the Deer Creek School in the Glendale district from 1956-58 and became fifth grade teacher at the Huerfano School in Huerfano since that time.

Bailey and his wife, Dorothy, have four sons.

Another Roseburg High School graduate, Robert Colley, was appointed principal at Eastwood School Wednesday night. Colley, who has been principal at Melrose School since 1961, will now serve as principal of both grade schools.

Colley graduated from RHHS in 1946 and received his degree at SOC. He has been teaching in the Roseburg system since 1954.

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Chamizal Transfer Due Today

Deal To End Long Dispute With Mexico

EL PASO, Texas (UPI)—Settlement of the century-old Chamizal dispute between the United States and Mexico will be announced today, United Press International has learned.

The announcement that will transfer the area to Mexico will be made by President Kennedy in Washington and by Mexican President Adolfo Lopez Mateos in Mexico City.

The U.S. is expected to give up most of the Chamizal to Mexico in return for Cordova Island, a Mexico-owned river island that sits 20 blocks into El Paso.

Negotiators have been working out details of the settlement since the President and Lopez Mateos discussed the situation when Kennedy visited Mexico City June 29, 1962.

The Chamizal — Spanish for thickets — is a section of land left on the north side of the Rio Grande when the river changed channels in 1852. It is now heavily populated and contains several schools, El Paso's only meat packing plant and a number of small businesses.

The 630 acres in the Chamizal have been estimated to be worth as much as \$20 million. Approximately 4,000 persons live there.

Former El Paso Mayor Ralph Setzinger proposed July 19, 1962 that a new channel be dredged in the Rio Grande. He said at that time that a settlement was near.

He said U.S. property owners would get about \$35 million in payment for the land turned over to Mexico.

In 1911 an impartial boundary commission recommended the line be turned back to Mexico. The United States refused to accept the recommendation.

Setzinger conferred with U.S. Ambassador to Mexico Thomas C. Mann and with Joseph Friedman of El Paso, of the U.S. International Water and Boundary Commission on the Chamizal a year ago.

The area, comprising 60 blocks, includes four elementary schools, one high school and a government housing project.

The settlement was expected to give Mexico a net gain of 437 acres, with 193 acres of Mexican-owned Cordova Island reverting back to the U.S.

Police broke up an eight-day-old sit-in demonstration at the Chicago Board of Education offices today which Wednesday night sparked a clash between Negroes and police.

About 30 policemen entered the offices and bodily carried nine persons down a freight elevator and into waiting paddy wagons. They were charged with unlawful assembly and criminal trespass.

The demonstrators, who began their sit-in July 10, had hoped to force a special meeting of the board to put new district boundary rules into effect and eliminate alleged segregation.

In another racial hotspot, Cambridge, Md., Negro leaders agreed early today to let the Maryland Bar Association mediate the dispute.

A clash flared in one North Carolina city Wednesday night, but desegregation moved quietly in two others.

The Forsyth (Winston-Salem) County Bar Association announced it had admitted nine Negro lawyers and a Negro student. Mrs. William Gamble, became the first member of her race to attend Greensboro College in the 125-year history of the Methodist-affiliated school.

Belgrade, Yugoslavia (UPI)—Bosnia will ship farm products, minerals, oil seed and other goods to Yugoslavia in return for motor vehicles, farm machinery.

The rolling strike against Georgia-Pacific Corp. by two lumber unions spread into Washington today when about 300 workers failed to report for work at two Olympia plywood plants.

Members of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) set up picket lines before 8 a.m. Harvey Nelson, Western regional president of the IWA, predicted all G-P operations in Oregon, Washington and California will be closed down by the end of the week.

The IWA and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) closed plants at Toledo, Coos Bay, Springfield and Coquille, Ore., and Samoa, Calif., earlier this week. Still operating today were some woods crews at Toledo and in the Coos Bay area, a pine mill at Pilot Rock, Ore., and woods crews and mills at Feather Falls and Woodleaf, Calif.

The strike against Georgia-Pacific is part of an industry-wide dispute over a new contract in the Douglas Fir belt. Nearly 25,000 workers now are idle.

JFK Loses Tie Clasp, Handkerchief In Wild Scamper By Students

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A crowd of 2,500 foreign students ran wild on the White House lawn today in an over-enthusiastic rush to get close to President Kennedy.

One girl grabbed the handkerchief from the President's breast pocket and a boy snatched his tie clasp in the melee.

"That's two from our bus that got something," the girl proudly announced as others in the crowd surged forward toward the President on his way back to his office from where he greeted them.

Kennedy, looking a little wilted but still smiling, got to his office without physical mishap, but one police lieutenant suffered hypotension as a result of the mob scene in the stifling summer heat.

Several other officers had neckties torn from them and a Secret Service agent even lost a shoe for a time in their efforts to protect the President—as well as the prized boxwood hedge, the flower beds and the bluegrass lawn of the garden which adjoined the area.

White House policemen, their white shirts soaked with perspiration, had to line up on the porch outside Kennedy's office to prevent the students from pushing through to that forbidden area.

Kennedy had greeted the teenagers jokingly as "not the quietest group that has come to visit us."

But he moved them to silence in a stirring speech during which he urged them, when they returned home, to work for peace, friendship and "a fair chance for all."

He said if they, as future leaders of their countries, could prevent war "you will be the most remarkable generation in history."

The President, after speaking, walked to the students who were massed behind a roped-off area. Within seconds bedlam broke loose.

The boys and girls, almost all of whom carried cameras and wanted close-up shots as well as handshakes and autographs, broke through the ropes and swarmed around Kennedy.

Secret Service agents and White House policemen formed a ring around the President and protected him from being crushed, taking the brunt of the good-natured but rough assault.

Miss Ozers, who represented Illinois in the Miss U.S.A. competition, was born in Riga, Latvia, and immigrated to the United States to escape Communist oppression 13 years ago.

The runners up were Michelle Bettina Metrinko, 21, Arlington, Va., the Miss District of Columbia; Sandra Lee Marlin, 19, Springfield, Mo.; Rhea Looney, 19, Denver, Colo., and Francine Cheryl Herack, 19, Encino, Calif.

Marita—"In Latvian you pronounce it Mah-reet"—said she entered, and lost, her first beauty contest when she was 16 years old. But a year later she was runner-up in a "Miss Oak Street" beach contest.

"I guess I'm getting better now," she said.

Marita admitted being "slightly embarrassed" the first time she modeled a bikini, but said she now wears a green bikini to the beach "if there aren't too many people around."

Soldiers Killed In Viet Ambush

SAIGON (UPI)—Three American soldiers, two of them officers, were killed early today in a Communist guerrilla ambush near Loc Ninh, 75 miles northwest of Saigon, a U.S. military spokesman said.

The spokesman said the victims were a sergeant and two captains, all members of the U.S. Special Force in South Viet Nam.

The new deaths raised to 98 the number of American military personnel killed in South Viet Nam.
