He could not have made it against a heart lead, but West opened the ace of trumps and shifted to the queen of clubs and from then on Eddie was in complete control of everything.

He took his ace of clubs, led a heart to dummy's king, discarded his last heart on dummy's king of clubs, ruffed a low heart, entered dummy with the ten of trumps, ruffed another low heart, cashed his last two trumps in order to draw the rest of East's trumps and also to get rid of dummy's last low club and seven of diamonds. Then he led a diamond to the ace and announced, "The board is good."

The whole play is worthy of study. Most players would have simply drawn trumps and played for a 3-2 heart break, but Eddie guarded against the 4-1 split.

Negotiator Sees Long Shutdown In Lumber Dispute

SEATTLE (UPI)—Lowry Wyatt, chief negotiator of the Big Six lumber companies, Tuesday forecast a long shutdown as the result of the labor dispute in the Pacific Northwest lumber industry.

Wyatt, a vice president for the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., said the companies have submitted their final offer to the two unions involved in the dispute which has idled more than 24,700 workers in Washington, Oregon, Northern California and Montana.

Wyatt, in Seattle for a news conference, said the companies simply could not meet the demands of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union and the International Woodworkers of America.

Wyatt forecast a short supply and higher prices for lumber and plywood unless there is a sudden change in demands by the unions.

The industry offer made in a long session at Portland Monday included a 26-cent hourly wage increase during the next three years. The unions were reported to have asked for a 35-cent hourly boost.

No further meetings are scheduled between the union representatives and the Big Six, which includes U.S. Plywood, Crown Zellerbach, Weyerhaeuser, St. Regis Paper, International Paper and Rayonier.

Racial Tension Appears Easing In Southern States' Demonstrations

There appears to be a slight easing of racial tension on the part of demonstrators in the South.

There was no cause for optimism yet but these developments were encouraging.

A 24-hour truce was called in Cambridge, Md., after days of demonstration that had put the area under limited martial law.

—Despite widespread continuing acts of vandalism from a fringe group, major demonstrations appeared to have eased off at Savannah, Ga., one of the Dixie tinderboxes.

—A local leader of the Na-

tional Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) called for a 60-day moratorium on racial demonstrations in Columbus, Ga.
—Negroes apparently were playing a wait-and-see game in Jackson, Miss.
—Negroes postponed for one week a scheduled demonstration for better job opportunities and equal booking of persons arrested in East St. Louis, Ill.

The respite coincided with formation of a group in New York which hopes to raise \$1.5 million this summer to finance the campaigns of six leading civil rights groups. The thinking of the group was that financial security might slow down the aggressiveness of the integration groups.

What does it all mean?
A prominent Negro leader put it this way: "Don't read too much into what has happened. It is largely coincidence that there was an easing off in several places at one time. But it is true that Negro groups are in a period now of re-assessing the situation."

A spokesman for Dr. Martin Luther King's Southern Christian

Leadership Conference (SCLC), one of the more militant of the racial organizations, said there definitely was no spirit of "retreat" on the part of SCLC.
The NAACP, one of the dominant leaders in the racial field, recently has taken a double route on strategy. It has encouraged direct demonstrations and at the same time has taken one of the strongest stands against violence.
The NAACP spoke forcefully against the trouble in Savannah, where its organization was in competition for leadership with King's "non-violent" group.

Rule of Thumb
A top NAACP spokesman in New York said a rule of thumb

for the current racial picture is to "treat each situation individually."
"A lot depends on the white posture in each separate situation," he said. "We are willing to discuss and negotiate as long as it is useful. Responsible organizations want to win objectives, not trouble. Unless the hot-heads take over, we can have peace so long as there is a willingness to negotiate."

"One main reason for these surges of demonstrations is that the Negroes—mainly the young adults—have pretty much lost faith in the white power structure in these communities to deliver on their promises."
"The older adults are often

willing to be a little more patient than the younger Negroes but then they get embarrassed when the business and political leaders fail to live up to promises.
"Unless we can get some negotiations in good faith, I don't know where this is going to end because that is the thing that produces these huge unruly demonstrations."
