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Days Creek Farmers Report Damage From Late Rainfall

Late June and July rains have caused considerable loss and extra work for Days Creek farmers harvesting hay, as well as delays in sheep-shearing and loss of cherries in home orchards due to splitting.

Fire Hazard Noted
Baled hay still in the field can resist some wetting, but prolonged rains penetrate deeper causing spoilage and heating, which in turn could cause a fire later. Breaking the bales for loose storage with the addition of salt can lessen the hazards to a degree, but all cases more work, area farmers report.

Hay in windrows during a storm has to be turned over with the side-delivery rake, sometimes repeatedly, before drying enough for baling. Ray Wright may be able to claim the record with eight turns of the same hay. To date he has managed to bale and store half of it.
