

Khrushchev Renews Proposal For On-Site Inspections

Russian Premier Gives Stinging Rebuke To China

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev, in a stinging rebuke to Red China, said today that only cowards seek war and warned the Chinese Communists their attempts to force him from power in the Soviet Union would be "futile."

Khrushchev challenged anyone seeking to overthrow his government to visit any factory or plant in Russia and see how firmly the Soviet people are behind him.

"Futile are the attempts of those who are trying to change the leadership in our country," Khrushchev said in a Kremlin speech that was considered perhaps the toughest language ever fired by the Soviet leader against the Red Chinese in the widening breach between the two Communist giants.

Reaffirms Soviet Stand
Khrushchev lashed out at the Peking regime for insisting on "the necessity of unleashing a world war to dispose of the destinies of peoples." He reaffirmed the Soviet stand of peaceful coexistence with the West and said despite what the "cowards" thought, communism will conquer capitalism without a war.

The Soviet leader's remarks, delivered as Russian and Chinese Communist leaders met once more to try to settle their ideological differences, was seen as probably a death knell for the already chilled efforts to seal the rift between Moscow and Peking.

Some diplomats considered Khrushchev's remarks almost an ultimatum to the Chinese Communist delegation currently in Moscow either to toe the party line or clear out for home.

Khrushchev said "imperialism"—which the Peking Communists want defeated by war if necessary—"trembled" before the strength of socialism.

"So why be in a hurry to go to war at all?" the Soviet leader asked in an obvious jibe at Peking.

"Those who are bitten by the bug of war are not motivated by bravery, but by cowardice, by their lack of faith that socialism can win in peaceful competition with capitalism."

Talks Getting Nowhere
Khrushchev spoke as Soviet and Chinese delegates met elsewhere in Moscow in another round of ideological talks that appeared to be getting nowhere toward solving the widening dispute between the world's two Communist giants.

In a warning directed apparently as much at the Western powers as at the Chinese, Khrushchev told a Hungarian newspaper meeting in the Kremlin palace:

"If all the nuclear weapons were exploded, they would contaminate the atmosphere and how would people live? This is the question."

"We did not need a revolution for war, we need no war," Khrushchev departed from his prepared text to make these remarks at the very moment the three-power Moscow nuclear test ban talks entered their fifth session, with optimism high for a

partial nuclear test ban agreement between East and West.

Most Direct Snub
Western observers saw the speech as a major olive branch of peace toward the West and perhaps the most direct Soviet snub to Communist China so far.

Khrushchev was welcoming Hungarian Communist chief Janos Kadar to Moscow.

Pointedly shaking his finger while delivering remarks obviously directed at China, the Soviet leader said the Socialists who could not convert words into deeds were nothing but "jabbermouths."

Khrushchev made his remarks—which diplomats believed could spark the final explosion splitting Moscow and Peking—a "digression" and returned to his prepared speech reviewing Hungarian history.

But diplomats said the points he made in the digression would not be used by the Red Chinese delegation here for the ideological talks.

Khrushchev said some persons believed "there must be revolution, there must be war and society would be built on corpses."

"Do these fanatics know," Khrushchev asked, "that if all nuclear means were used, those who survived would perhaps envy the dead?"

While Khrushchev spoke, Soviet and Chinese delegates met in another round of their talks after a 24-hour recess called to enable the Peking team to get new instructions from home, Communist sources reported.

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New Adventist School Framework Collapses

Man Escapes Injury As Timbers Fall

Wood framing for the new Roseburg Seventh-day Adventist School on NW Calkins Road just west of Roseburg was flattened to the ground early today when trusses apparently gave way.

Workmen struggled glumly separating the nailed timbers and lumber this morning, while refusing to comment on the mishap.

Trusses at the end of the building had been set up Thursday. This morning as men arrived to start working, the trusses toppled over. This set off a chain reaction which pushed over the entire structure. Not a board was left standing upright.

One man was up in the roof area when the trusses gave way at the west end of the building. He was at the other end of the building when he saw it going down. It fell so slowly, the man had time to climb down and out of danger's way.

Dr. Gerald Casebolt, chairman of the building committee, said when the first trusses went down, the rest of the structure toppled "just like jackstraws."

Dr. Casebolt said there was apparently very little material damage. He said the trusses would be lifted out with a crane and then the walls put back together and tilted back up. "Maybe I'm being a little optimistic," he said, "but we may have been set back a couple of weeks."

Richard Callis, who is in charge of construction, would make no comment on the mishap.

The new school is being built to replace an old school in Roseburg. Preparation for the site started June 9, and construction has been under way about a month.

The new school will contain four classrooms, a library, principal's room and a covered play area. Future plans call for an adjoining auditorium.

Estimated cost of the structure is \$30,000, not including volunteer labor, much of which is being donated by congregation members.

Earlier this week, city police had investigated a report of five young boys playing around the structure in the middle of the night. Dr. Casebolt said he would check with police to determine if they may have been at the scene again Thursday night.

McNamara Says No Military Secrets Stolen From U.S.
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said today that no current U.S. military secrets have been stolen in the recent wave of international spy cases.

McNamara also told a news conference the espionage cases in Germany, Sweden and Britain did not involve any American service personnel.

The secretary's remarks were touched off by reports of U.S. concern over the recent spy arrests and that some American secrets were lost.

McNamara said there had been no compromise of any "current" American military plans or weapons systems. He said no special action was underway to safeguard secrets but procedures are always under review to see how they can be improved.

In a wide-ranging session with reporters, McNamara also said that "all responsible leaders of this Defense Department believe it is against the interests of this nation to allow further proliferation of nuclear weapons."

He said that an enforceable nuclear test ban would forestall a further spread of atomic weapons.

McNamara turned aside two questions about the position of the chiefs of the U. S. military services on the issue. He said he did not want to comment further on the "sensitive" test ban talks now underway in Moscow.

He would not say whether his statement implied that the chiefs support a test ban.

The various service chiefs all have told Congress in recent months that they favored continued nuclear testing.

Touching on Cuba, McNamara echoed President Kennedy in stating that "I don't believe we can ever accept a Soviet satellite in this hemisphere."

He had been asked how he would react to establishing some kind of diplomatic contact with Castro.

McNamara said the United States must keep continued pressure on Cuba and Russia to bring about the removal of Soviet military personnel from the island.

The security question came up because of a published report Thursday that Col. Stig Wennerstrom, confessed Swedish spy for Russia, had obtained information through the indiscretions of a U. S. military officer.

Syria Executes Defeated Rebels

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Syria today began executing by firing squads military and civilians implicated in Thursday's abortive attempt to overthrow the government.

Damascus Radio said six Syrian army officers and men were executed at high noon.

A few hours later, it reported that four civilians had fallen before the firing squads and that further sentencing and executions could be expected.

The executions came shortly after an around-the-clock curfew throughout the country was reimposed after new street shooting broke out.

Clues Believed Found In Death Of Infant
MEDFORD (UPI)—Two assayers' crucible molds, each weighing 4 1/2 pounds, were used to weight down the body of an unidentified two-year-old boy found last week in the Keene Creek Reservoir east of Ashland, Jackson County Dist. Atty. Alan B. Holmes said Thursday.

The molds are of a type used frequently 50 years ago in Southern Oregon and Northern California, but now are rare items, Holmes said.

He said police believe the molds were either kept by someone as antiques or were taken from an abandoned mine at the time of the boy's death.

Gov. Mark O. Hatfield received a Roseburg delegation, headed by D'Ann Fullerton, Miss Oregon of 1963, who traveled to the state capital to help publicize a slate of coming events in Roseburg.

The trip developed as a spin-off from the Chamber of Commerce-sponsored Payroll Development program, after the governor had expressed interest in ceramic plates produced by Vileta West of Vileta's Arts and Souvenirs in Roseburg.

Plate Okayed
Mrs. West gave the governor a design for a proposed state of Oregon souvenir plate, Gov. Hatfield approved the design with some suggested changes and gave Mrs. West the go-ahead to produce the souvenir plate. It will feature a gold design of the Capitol Building in the center, within a blue outline of the state's boundaries and two thin gold lines around the rim.

Following the appointment with Gov. Hatfield, the Roseburg delegation toured the capitol building and had lunch at the Oregon Room in Salem.

Reports Claim Simpson Lumber Contract Near

Negotiators for Simpson Lumber Co. met with two labor unions in Portland today amid unconfirmed reports that an agreement was near.

James Farmer, chief negotiator for the big independent firm, reported some progress at the last session Tuesday.

Today, the Portland Oregonian newspaper quoted an unnamed "reliable source" as saying the two sides would agree on a contract calling for a wage increase of 32 to 35 cents an hour over three years. That would be about eight cents more than the company's last offer.

The International Woodworkers of America originally demanded 40 cents and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers 50 cents.

Simpson officials met at 8 a.m. and then went into a meeting with the union negotiators about two hours later.

A dispute over a new contract in the Douglas Fir belt to replace one which expired June 1 already has idled more than 25,000 workers in Oregon, Washington, Northern California and Montana.

There was no further spread of the strike against Georgia-Pacific Corp. today. All its plants have been closed except a pine mill at Pilot Rock, Ore., and logging operations and mills at Woodleaf and Feather Falls, Calif.

RABORN RETIRES
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Vice Admiral William F. Raborn, "father of the Polaris missile," is retiring as deputy chief of Naval Operations for Development.

President Kennedy announced Thursday that Raborn would be put on the retired list and be replaced by Vice Admiral Horacio Rivero Jr., now commander of amphibious force—Atlantic Fleet.

For non-professional astronomers across the land, the warning is clear: Do not look at the eclipse. Don't even peek. Experts advise that even one second's exposure to the full rays of the sun can cause permanent damage to the eyes.

Because the sun is partially obscured, no pain is felt, but invisible ultraviolet and infrared rays do their damage. Surgeon General Dr. Luther Terry says this: "Watch it on television."

For those who shun the video approach, this is recommended: Punch a pinhole in a piece of cardboard, then, with your back to the sun, hold the cardboard above one shoulder and let the sun's image reflect on another piece of cardboard held in front of you.

The eclipse will occur over Roseburg about 12:40 p.m. Saturday, when about 34 per cent of the sun will be covered.

The Oregon Optometric Association issued a warning to local residents that "Looking at the sun during the eclipse can permanently damage your eyes. Sunglasses or smoked glasses are not adequate protection."

"Play safe," the OOA warns. "Stay indoors between 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. If you must be outdoors, wear sunglasses and avoid looking at the sky."

The 60-mile wide belt of the total eclipse will cut across Alaska, Canada and central Maine.

Offer Would Permit Teams Inside Russia

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev today renewed an earlier proposal that would permit international control teams inside the Soviet Union to reduce the risk of surprise attack.

Diplomatic sources said the Soviet revival of the offer originally made by the Russians in 1958 might signal a breakthrough in negotiations between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Khrushchev revived the plan in a speech in the Kremlin at a "Hungarian friendship" meeting.

On Parity Basis
"We hold it expedient to set up in definite control spots, both of the Soviet Union and other countries, ground control posts at airports, railways, junctions, highways and major ports," he said. "Of course all this must be done on a parity basis."

The 1958 Soviet control team proposal died on the vine because the West at the time felt that the Soviets were not really interested in cutting the risk of accidental war.

In reviving the plan today Khrushchev said:

"Such a measure does not in itself guarantee the maintenance of peace, but it would be a step forward toward prevention of a surprise attack."

Khrushchev's renewal of the Soviet proposal came less than a week after American and British negotiators arrived in Moscow for nuclear test ban talks. It also came as the United States and the Soviet Union were preparing to set up a "hot line" direct communications link between Washington and Moscow to prevent an outbreak of war by accident.

The test ban negotiators today were discussing a limited agreement in an optimistic atmosphere.

Khrushchev said in his Kremlin talk that there is "now a hope" of concluding a partial test ban, barring a radical change in the position of the United States and Britain.

Calls For Treaty
The Soviet premier also: —Called anew for an East-West non-aggression pact between NATO and the Communist Warsaw Pact Alliance.

—Defended his denunciation of the late dictator Josef Stalin at the 20th party congress in 1956 and again attacked the "personality cult" of Stalin's regime.

—Insisted, despite Peking counter-charges, that Lenin supported the policy of co-existence in peace.

—Said settlement of the German problem would be a very good thing but could come only through signature of a German peace treaty.

As they came on today's negotiating session the Soviets ignored a warning from Communist China against negotiating with "sinister, fraudulent" Americans.

Western sources said the Soviet and Allied negotiators, finding no obstacles to agreement on a partial test ban, were going on to discuss other cold war issues such as Berlin.

U.S. Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and British Science Minister Lord Hailsham met in the fifth session of the big three talks as optimism continued high in Moscow on prospects for success.

China Claims "Fraud"
Even as the three-power negotiators met in Moscow, a warning came from Peking that Red China would not be bound by an atomic test ban agreement.

Communist China, which is known to be pushing development of its own atomic weapons, accused the United States through its official newspaper, the People's Daily, of perpetrating "fraud," and of planning to use a partial test ban agreement to continue to stockpile nuclear weapons.

Viewers Get Warning As Sun Spectacular Nears

For a fleeting moment Saturday afternoon day will turn into night in a narrow path across the Atlantic and part of North America when the moon moves between the sun and the earth.

For most Americans the eclipse will be partial; the moon will obstruct only part of the sun. For a few, mostly in Maine, it will be total. The most zealous of these will be astronomers in jet planes and 20 teams of scientific observers perched atop Cadillac Mountain in Maine.

The airborne observers, traveling at nearly twice the speed of sound, will pursue the shadow as it speeds across the face of the globe at 1,750 miles an hour. They will not catch up to it, but they will be able to see the total eclipse for longer than the 59 seconds it will be visible to teams on the ground.

More important, they will be able to see much of the earth's atmosphere, and thus able to take clear photographs of the rare event and study it with precision.
