

Sherry Paces Win As Dodgers Blast Past Pirates 10-5

All this and Larry Sherry too! That's the feeling in the camp of the Los Angeles Dodgers today as their National League pennant bandwagon keeps rolling along.

The World Series hero of 1959 hasn't done too much this season but he suddenly seems to have "rejoined the team." And if there is anything the Dodgers' National League rivals can't stand it's another proven star adding his weight to the Dodger drive.

Sherry, the sensation of the '59 Dodgers' closing NL spurt and World Series triumph over the Chicago White Sox, came out of the bullpen Thursday night to preserve Johnny Podres' ninth victory of the season and the Dodgers' 10-5 decision over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The win preserved the Dodgers' 6 1/2-game lead over the second-place Chicago Cubs, who beat the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, in an afternoon game.

The San Francisco Giants shaded the New York Mets, 6-5, the Cincinnati Reds brushed the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-3, and the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Houston Colts, 5-1, in other National League action.

In the American League, Minnesota whipped New York, 9-3, Baltimore topped Detroit, 8-6, and Boston defeated Kansas City, 10-6.

Minnesota Tops Ralph Terry As Yankees Lead Cut To Six

Babe Ruth summed it all up 35 years ago when after a tough night on the town he heard the boos of his fair-weather friends.

"In this game," he said, "you are a hero today and a bum tomorrow."

Ralph Terry, the New York Yankees' World Series hero of 1962, knows today what the old Bambino meant.

Terry became the toast of the baseball world last October when he beat the San Francisco Giants, 1-0, in the seventh straight world title under manager Ralph Houk.

He was the all-American cover boy of the national mags, the former Boy Scout who made good in a tough, competitive field and a young man with a seemingly limitless future.

Today, he's a bewildered 27-year-old pitcher with an equally bewildering 9-10 season won-lost record.

Terry's 1963 record dipped below the .500 mark—compared with his resplendent 23-12 mark of 1962 when the Minnesota Twins

Bees Seek Seventh Victory Against Marshfield Tonight

Timely hitting and costly errors by the invaders added up to a victory for the Roseburg Bees Thursday before the home fans in American Legion Junior baseball action.

The Bees came to life late in the game to grab the lead for good with a four-run uprising in the bottom of the fifth inning. The rally in the fifth paved the way for a 6-4 triumph over the invading Albany Merchants.

Tonight the Bees will be after their seventh victory when the Albany Lumber Co. (Marshfield) team invades for a single nine-inning game starting at 7:30 at Legion Field. Thursday's victory gave the second Roseburg Legion crew a 6-2 record.

Doug Malsen went the distance to pick up his first victory of the season. The husky right-hander fanned six batters, walked one and scattered seven hits over the seven inning route.

At the plate the power was provided by Chuck Person with a triple and two singles in four appearances, while Ray Shepherd was 2-4.

The Bees pounded nine hits off two Albany hurlers, and wasted little time in drawing first blood. In the bottom of the first inning Person slammed a triple to left field and Shepherd followed with a single.

Albany's Merchants surged into the lead in the second inning with a three-run rally. With one away Tom Holbert singled to right field for the first hit off Malsen. Rich Shelton followed with an infield single through the shortstop and Holbert raced to the plate to score the equalizer. A walk to Dick Maurer loaded the bases with two outs and a wild pitch allowed Shelton to score the go-ahead run. The final run came when Vern Loy slapped a sharp single to left.

In the top of the third the Merchants threatened to pad their lead when the first two batters singled. However, a strikeout and a fast double play from Dan Withers at short to Jim Kiser at second to Stan Young at first ended the threat.

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Liston Looks For Knockout Over Floyd In First Round

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Heavyweight champion Sonny Liston said today he hoped to knock out Floyd Patterson in about 84 seconds of the first round of their return title fight Monday night at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

Sonny, who has become an expert on percentages from his scholarly discussions of the noble art of rolling dice with pit-men and stick-men at the Thunderbird Hotel, said:

"I took me 2:06 of the first round to flatten Patterson at Chicago last September. Well, on the way I took care of Cleveland Williams in our two fights. I figure I should put Patterson away one third faster this time."

Sonny, praising Williams of Houston, Tex., as the "best man I ever fought," said he knocked out Williams in the third round in 1959 and in the second round in 1960.

Meanwhile, promoter Al Bolan announced that the advance sale of \$160,000 indicated a gate of between \$250,000 and a sellout of \$320,000.

He said he was sure the gate would beat the Nevada record of \$270,775, established by the Jack Johnson-Jim Jeffries fight at Reno, Nev., in 1910. The capacity for paid spectators at Monday's fight is 7,691.

Liston is favored at 4-1 in very light betting.
