



DON CARTER, well-known pro bowler, has been signed as an entrant in the \$20,500 City of Roses Open bowling tournament which will be staged at 20th Century Lanes in Portland in September. Carter and 95 other top kegglers will be making their first Oregon appearance in the tourney. The tournament is a benefit for the Mt. Hood Kiwanis Camp for handicapped children.

Don Carter Heads List Of City Of Roses Kegglers

"Mr. Bowling" Don Carter has been signed to enter the \$20,500 City of Roses Open professional bowling tournament booked for 20th Century Lanes in Portland on Sept. 19-22. Carter is generally considered to be the pin world's number one performer and is the only man in the history of the game to have won every major tournament title.

Last year Carter easily ruled as Professional Bowlers Association dollar king with total winnings of \$40,017.50. So far this year Carter has cashed checks of \$12,607.50 for a tenth place standing on the PBA money list.

The St. Louis pinblaster has won the National All-Star four times and counts five victories in the prestigious World Invitational tourney. He has won the ABC Masters in 1961 and has captained two teams to victory in the ABC.

In 1962 Carter was voted Bowler of the Year for the sixth time by the Bowling Writers of America and last year he made the All-American team for the ninth time.

Last weekend Carter returned to action on the PBA Summer Tour after a layoff of five weeks. He missed the finals by only 16 pins in the Rockford, Ill. PBA Open which was held at Don Carter Lanes in Rockford.

With Carter's name signed on the dotted line, the City of Roses Open now counts eight of the top ten PBA money winners as definite entrants. Ray Bluth, Harry Smith, Billy Welu, Andy Marzich, and Jim St. John are other top PBA stars already signed for a Portland appearance.

The City of Roses Open is being operated for the benefit of the Mt. Hood Kiwanis Camp for Handicapped Children. Tickets for the pinfest are now on sale through Kiwanians in Oregon and Southwest Washington.

Al Lary Pitches Three Hitter To Lead Salt Lake To 1-0 PCL Win Over Seattle

Al Lary, one of the pitching brothers who hasn't been too much in the limelight, apparently is anxious to move up to the

major leagues and his recent mound performances make the trip seem possible soon.

The 33-year-old Salt Lake City right-hander turned in a neat three-hit package Thursday night

in defeating Seattle 1-0. All of the hits were singles and it marked Lary's ninth victory against seven losses.

It was the second consecutive air-tight outing for Lary, who gave up but five hits July 14 in downing Portland 6-3.

Another former major leaguer, Ted Willis, pitched and batted himself to a four-hit 3-0 shutout over the Oklahoma City 89ers. The southpaw drove in shortstop Tommy Helms with the first run in the third inning and that proved enough.

The Padres added insurance tallies in the sixth and eighth innings. First baseman Rogelio Alvarez banged a homerun with none on in the eighth.

Willis struck out 10 and walked two, facing only 34 men.

Seattle came back in the nightcap to win 1-0 with Dave Busby, rookie right-hander tossing the victory. He just reported from the eastern league. He hurled six hit balls, striking out four and walking one. The Rainiers got their tally off Wayne Garlander on a walk, a sacrifice and a single by Felix Maldonado.

In other games, Portland slaughtered Tacoma 17-5, and Spokane took a pair from Dallas-Ft. Worth 5-2 and 4-3.

The Beaver-Giant game was close until the sixth when Portland scored three runs on Bill Bryan's homerun with two aboard. The Beavers added three in the seventh and seven in the eighth frames to give Bob Flynn his sixth victory in nine decisions. The loser, Bob Garibaldi, now has a record of 9-8.

Summer Steelhead Set Record Pace At Winchester Station

Summer steelhead continue to pour through the counting racks at Winchester Dam on the North Umpqua River at a record setting pace. During the period of July 1-15 a total of 1,036 summer steelhead were reported. This brings the total for the year to 2,325 — almost 1,000 above the counts for the same period that have been recorded in the past 10 years.

In addition to the summer steelhead, 197 spring chinooks and 185 chinook jacks were counted at the dam, bringing the totals for the season to 8,862 and 1,613 respectively.

With the heavy up-stream migration of summer steelhead the fishing has been good in the Whistler's Bend, Glide and Steamboat areas of the North Umpqua.
