Mrs. June, a most attractive native New Zealand, stated she hopes to visit this country again. She and her husband have four sons, 18, 13, 9 and 5. They came to this country via Canadian Pacific Airlines stopping over in Honolulu, where they were entertained by friends, and then landing at Vancouver, B. C., after which they came to Roseburg for a visit. Friends of the Bingham family here greatly enjoyed meeting the Junes. Mr. June had gone to New Zealand 26 years ago from Canada and this was his first trip back to this country since that time. He found a great many changes in the time he had been away.
