Babe Ruth Tournament Play Slated

The District 4 Babe Ruth baseball crown will be up for grabs this week when four local all-star contingents participate in tournament play.

In addition to winning the championship, one of the four teams will earn the right to represent the Douglas County Babe Ruth League in the state tournament at Klamath Falls, Madison of Portland is the defending state champion after a second place finish in the national Babe Ruth World Series last year.

Tournament action will open Tuesday at Sutherlin and Myrtle Creek.

At Sutherlin the number one Roseburg All-Star team will take on the Central Douglas All-Stars in a game under the lights at 8 p.m. The number two Roseburg All-Star team will play the South Douglas All-Stars in the tourney opener at Myrtle Creek at 5:30 p.m.

Wednesday's action will pit the winners of the opening games at Myrtle Creek in a 4 p.m. encounter, with the losers meeting in an earlier battle on the same field at 1:30.

The winner of the first game Wednesday and the loser of the second outing will square off Friday at Sutherlin to decide which team meets the winner of Wednesday's second game for the championship. Friday's game is set for 8 p.m.

Sunday the championship will be decided at Roseburg's Legion Field when the winner of Friday's battle takes on the team that wins the second game Wednesday. The championship duel could last through two games if Friday's winner takes the opening game Sunday. Action Sunday at Legion Field will start at 7 p.m.

The South Douglas All-Star team is composed of players from Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Canyonville and Days Creek. Competing under the banners of the Central Douglas All-Stars will be stars from Sutherlin, Oakland, Winston, Tennesse and Lookingglass.

Roseburg's two all-star teams will be made up of players from Riverside, Eastwood, Fremont and Roseburg.

Pee Wees Set For Tourney Play Today

Action will be fast and furious tonight when the first group of Roseburg Pee Wees invade Legion Field for the opening of the annual Kiwanis Pee Wee Baseball Jam-boree.

Tonight's action will feature the Midget League (8-9 year olds) teams in six three-inning encounters. Tuesday the Minor League (10-11 year olds) will play, with the wrap-up of the Jamboree being set for Thursday when the Major League (12-13 year olds) steal the spotlight. The first games each night will begin at 5:30.

The schedule for tonight will begin with the Winchester Wolves playing the Green Rams, followed by a 6:20 game between the Fullerton Bears and the Riverside Tigers. At 7:10 the Eastwood Twins will battle the High School Cardinals, at 8 the Riverside Yankees will clash with the Eastwood Bulldogs, at 8:50 the Fullerton Cougars will square off against the Winchester Wildcats, and at 9:40 the High School Braves, currently undefeated in league play, will take on a team of all-stars.

Tuesday the first game for the Minor League teams will pit the Eastwood Vikings against the Winchester White Sox. Following the opening game the Eastwood Owls will meet the High School Dodgers at 6:30, the Fullerton Cubs will play the Riverside Angels at 7:30, the Eastwood Athletics take on the High School Pirates at 8:30 and the Winchester Senators will battle the Fullerton Cubs at 9:30.

The Roseburg Pee Wee program is sponsored jointly by the Kiwanis Club, the Roseburg School District and the City of Roseburg. Darl Thornton is co-ordinator of the program.

Nicklaus Wins PGA Title

Shrine Teams Appear Even For Contest

PORTLAND, (Special) — Neither team will have a decided weight advantage in the annual Shrine's hospital all-star football game Aug. 17 in Multnomah Stadium.

A check of the 27-man rosters of the State and Metro teams showed that the Metro backfield will average 173 pounds, against 174 for the Shrine. Up front the Shrine will have a 2-pound edge — 196 pounds to 194.

The game—often called "football's finest hour"—brings together outstanding senior high school players of last year on a State versus Metropolitan basis.

Although there will be no advantage in the left department, States does figure to have an edge in the fact that Head Coach Fred Spiegelberg will have his quarterback back from last year's championship Medford team, Dan Miles.

Miles' familiarity with Spiegelberg's style of play is considered by most coaches to be a "real plus" for the Shrine since Spiegelberg won't have to "break in" a signal caller. Bob Hull of Jefferson in Portland, will not have his own quarterback.

Hull's choices for the important quarterback position are from different schools, and he will have to acquaint them with his style of play.

Spiegelberg, probably the state's most successful high school coach, has not enjoyed too much success in the role of an all-star mentor, but the word is that he plans to bend every effort this year to turn up with a winner.

State hasn't been in the winner's column since 1956 when they scored a narrow 7 to 6 victory. The closers came to a win in 1961 when the teams ended in a 19 to 19 deadlock.

The two squads will report here Aug. 4 for two weeks of intensive practice.

Jim Standley Cops Honors At Saturday Night Races

Jim Standley paced the field in the weekly hardtop races held Saturday at the Roseburg Speedway. Standley ran off with top honors in the featured A-Main as he nipped fellow Roseburg drivers Jay Eaton and Bud Van Osten in a thrilling finish.

In the 28th lap of the 30-lap race, Don Hein tangled with Van Osten while jockeying for second place and both drivers spun out. The flagman stopped the race and sent Hein to the rear of the pack for causing the mishap.

Hal Welker, Roseburg, won his first trophy of the season on the A-Trophy Dash. Standley had won each of the hardtop trophy dashes in previous outings.

Heat winners in the hardtops found Dan Pitt winning the first heat and Van Osten the fast heat. Standley set the fast time in the time trials by circling the track in a blazing 15.77 seconds. Carl Martin tried to beat this time in a go-kart to prove the smaller vehicles have more speed, but failed as he was timed at 17.04.

In the jalopy action Fred Senkbeil came out on top in the 25-lap main event. In the fourth lap Sam Gossio tangled with Bob Johnson when their bumpers hooked. Gossio ended astride the retainer wall. Vern Dystra, the top jalopy racer to date, was leading the pack by eight seconds when his engine quit as he went into the final lap.

Jalopy heat winners were Jerry Kenniman and Johnny Johnson. Dave Johnson drove two laps in the first heat without a right front wheel before the flagman had to stop the race.

Three cars ran out of steam before the end of the first lap in the jalopy trophy dash, leaving only Johnny Wilson of Eugene on the track, and he was declared the winner.

The hardtops and jalopies will be back in action this Saturday night at the Speedway. Time trials will start at 7:30 with the races beginning at 8.

Long Birdie Brings Title Over Ragan

DALLAS (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus, at 23, figured today he was "a grown man."

For now he has won 'em all that he set out to win when he turned professional golfer a year and a half ago. He won the U. S. Open in June of 1962, and the Masters last April.

After that victory he said he didn't think he still had arrived. "Wait until I win the PGA," he declared. "When I win that one, I'll consider myself a man."

He won that Sunday when he broke the hearts of those chasing him with a 30-foot birdie putt on the 15th hole of the heat-seared Dac Country Club course before a 110-degree sweat-soaked crowd of 12,500.

The triumph swelled his bankroll \$13,000 to a total of \$75,140, leaving him only \$10,815 behind Golden Boy Arnold Palmer, who finished in a tie for 40th place—and \$410 prize money—as once again he failed to win the only major golf tournament that has eluded him.

That 15th hole birdie in the searing heat turned back the bids of two 27-year-olds, Dave Ragan and Aussie Bruce Crampton. They had been charging Nicklaus down to the wire until that big putt on the 15th.

After sinking that long one, Nicklaus, the 210-pound, six foot Ohio belter played it cozy, being satisfied to par the last three holes. That 34-34-68 over the 7,046-yard par 36-35-71 Dac Country Club course, gave him a 72-hole of 279 — five under par for the distance — and two shots ahead of the second place Ragan, who finished with a 33-36-69 for 281. Ragan started the day four strokes behind Crampton. Crampton with a two over par 74 finished in a third place tie with former PGA champ Dow Finsterwald at 282. Finsterwald closed with a one over par 72.

Klamath Falls Hosts South Curry 9 Tonight

Klamath Falls' Falcons will play host to South Curry (Brookings) tonight in the second of a two-out-of-three playoff series for the sub-area title.

Lockwoods Break Loose With 25-Hits To Blast Springfield Twice For Loop Title

Pennant fever struck the Roseburg American Legion Juniors Sunday as they unleashed a 25-hit attack in the two-game set with Springfield to sew-up their third straight Doug-Lane League title.

Pounding the ball in every direction, the Lockwood Motors nine completely shattered any hopes the Springfield crew had of upsetting the favorites, with Roseburg winning by scores of 9-0 and 10-1.

The local team will face the winner of the Klamath Falls-Southern Curry series which is now in progress, Sunday Klamath Falls' Falcons took the lead in the series by stomping the coastal team, 10-4, on an 18-hit attack.

Ran Cool clinched the league crown for Lockwood's as he fashioned a nifty two-hit shutout in the opener at Springfield. Cool struck out nine, gave up a pair of singles to Steve Beckham, and issued two free passes.

In the nightcap Jon Burnham collected the win as he limited Springfield to just two hits in his five-inning plus stint. Burnham was relieved by Dick Williams when he ran into minor trouble in the sixth with Roseburg holding a 4-0 lead.

The two teams went into the game with Roseburg needing either one victory or one Springfield loss to win the title. The local wrecking crew now sports a 16-0 league mark, while the double loss dripped Springfield to a 9-8 mark. For the season Lockwood Motors boasts a 38-7 record.

After two innings of scoreless ball in the opener, Roseburg came through with a counter in the top of the third. A single by Artie McDonald off the pitcher's glove, a stolen base and Jim Beamer's smash to left-center field accounted for the run. In the fourth, three insurance runs crossed the plate on five safeties. Dave Sevall led off with a bingle, was advanced to second on a sacrifice. Cool singled down the third base line to singles, while Blomberg rapped a double.

Blomberg had a 3-4 record at the plate during the first game, then came back to go 1-1 in the second outing. Beamer continued to rap the ball at a hot clip as he was 2-4, while Sevall and Cool each had two hits in the opener.

Again in the second game it was the third inning before Roseburg started the scoring — then it came big with four runs crossing the plate on six base raps. Manning and Beamer started off with singles, but Manning was picked off first and Beamer was thrown out at third on a fielder's choice. Bruce Wassom followed Beamer with a single and Mike Markham accounted for the out at third before Blomberg walked to load the

bases. Rick Abrahamson collected his third hit of the year at a timely spot, driving in two runs. Burnham followed with a base blow to drive in two more runs.

In the seventh Roseburg added six more runs in between outbursts of temper. Pitcher Dick Peglow and Blomberg collided on a play at the plate which nipped Blomberg, and on the next pitch Peglow threw high and inside to move Sevall to third, then the lead runner crossed the plate on Mike Blomberg's base rap.

Roseburg kept the rally alive when McDonald forced Blomberg at second as Cool romped home, and Bob Manning singled. Beamer's double which went under the left field fence scored McDonald.

In the fifth the champs iced the win with a five run uprising on three hits and three Springfield errors. Sevall and Cool collected Ron Westbrooks which led to a warning over throwing at the batters. Westbrooks retaliated as he bat sailed by the mound as he swung at the next pitch — a move that brought coach Bill Harper back to the plate and the batter was led to the bench with Sevall coming in to face Peglow.

Four errors and three walks in the inning, along with the three

hits by Wassom, Blomberg and Beamer accounted for the final six runs.

Springfield scored its lone tally in the bottom of the sixth on a hit by Mike McGuire, a walk, a fielder's choice and a ground out.

Manning, Westbrooks, Beamer and Wassom each had two hits for Lockwood Motors in the second outing.

Roseburg's final league games will be played before the home fans Wednesday when Snellstrom Lumber (Sheldon) invades for a pair of make-up encounters. Game time is 6:30 p.m. Wednesday's games have been officially declared Bill Harper Night to honor the Roseburg coach who will be leaving this fall to join the Oregon State physical education staff.

Twin Victory Over Albany Set Stage For Loop Wins

Lockwood Motors of Roseburg and the Cummings Movers of Albany warmed up for Legion playoff battles with a pair of thrillers Saturday night at Legion Field—with the local crew scoring a sweep of the twin-bills.

Capitalizing on a minimum of hits, Roseburg eked out a 3-1 victory in the opener, then came back to nip the invaders, 1-0, in the five-inning nightcap.

Both teams have won league titles and await playoff action, with Roseburg meeting the winner of the Klamath Falls Falcons-Southern Curry series, while Albany will play the winner of the Capital Post 9 (North Salem) series against the winner of the David Douglas-Oregon City playoff.

Ron Westbrooks scattered six hits over the seven inning route in the opener for his seventh win of the season. The classy Myrtle Creek lefty struck out four and walked two. Rich Hibbard limited the local nine to six hits, but some

costly errors proved his downfall.

In the five-inning nightcap, Rojelio Gutierrez tossed a nifty three-hit shutout at the Cummings Movers. Gutierrez fanned five and walked two.

Roseburg took the lead early in the opener when Mike Blomberg led off with a smashing double down the first base line and Artie McDonald beat out a bunt single. The catcher fielded McDonald's bunt, and on an attempt to catch Blomberg after he rounded third threw into left field to allow the first run to score. A second throwing error allowed McDonald to score from third after Tom Morrison had singled.

In the third, Bob Manning singled to deep short, stole second, took third on an error and scored on Jim Beamer's shot to left field.

Albany scored in the top of the sixth as Russ Isom led off with a when Ron Malone walked. Brad Heckman's single scored Isom, but the rally was nipped on a foul ball play started by pitcher Westbrooks.

A streak of wildness in the second inning of the second game cost Albany's Guy Costello a possible victory. With two away Dave Sevall rapped a single into left field, then consecutive walks to Rick Abrahamson, Gutierrez and Blomberg brought the first baseman around with the winning run.

Gutierrez was tough on the Cummings movers as he never allowed a runner past first base. The talented Glendale right-hander put one runner on in each inning, either by a hit or a walk, then came on strong to retire the side without meeting any further trouble.

The Movers invaded Roseburg with a 21-5 record, and had won their league crown with a 15-0 mark. Roseburg raised its season's record to 26-7, then came on with a mighty barrage of hits Sunday at Springfield for two more wins and clinched the Doug-Lane League title with a 16-0 record.

Frank Lary Gets First Win Of Season By Topping LA

It was an old familiar baseball tableau: Veteran Frank Lary of the Tigers struggling along the comeback trail to save his pitching career while young Al Downing of the Yankees jauntily strode the road to World Series gold and glory.

There was satisfaction for both Sunday.

The 32-year-old Lary scored his first victory in more than a year when he pitched a four-hitter as the Detroit Tigers defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 8-2.

And the 22-year-old Downing pitched his sixth victory to start the New York Yankees off in the Cleveland Indians, 5-2 and 5-4 in 11 innings. The wins widened the Yankees' American League lead to seven games—their widest margin of the season.

All three other games in the AL Sunday were decided by 3-2 scores the Minnesota Twins edged the Washington Senators, the Boston Red Sox beating the Chicago White Sox, and the Kansas City Athletics topped the Baltimore Orioles. Rain forced postponement of a scheduled twin bill second game between Boston and Chicago.

It was a long time between major league victories for Lary, who returned to the Tigers three weeks ago after a stretch with Knoxville of the Sally League, where he had been sent to pitch his ailing shoulder back into shape.

Lary struck out five batters and walked only two in pitching the distance. A 13-hit Tiger attack with four stolen bases, and four Los Angeles errors, all helped Angels starter Dean Chance admit Lary's cause with an error during Detroit's three-run sixth inning.

Meanwhile, Downing pitched an odd game in which he struck out 10 batters and walked nine before tiring in the ninth inning and requiring relief from Hal Reniff. This was the fourth straight game in which Downing fanned 10 or more hitters. Harry Bright hit a two-run homer for New York.

Won in the 11th
Bobby Richardson's one-out, 11th inning single off old Early Wynn produced the Yankees' nightcap victory and stretched the Indians' losing streak to nine games. Wynn who scored the 300th win of his career eight days ago, entered the game in relief after Woody Held's triple had tied the score in the ninth. Reliever Steve Hamilton was the winner.
