Solon Hopes For Approval By Weekend

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Democratic congressional leaders said after a meeting with President Kennedy today that "every effort will be made" to get approval of his proposal to break the railroad impasse before a threatened strike materializes.

The leaders shied away from any forecast of when the bill might be approved but Senate Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., said "prospects look favorable" for passage of the legislation to turn over the dispute to the Interstate Commerce Commission for binding determination.

Mansfield told reporters at the White House that he hoped the Senate Commerce Committee, which plans evening hearings if necessary, will approve a bill before the end of this week. Rail unions have threatened a strike next Tuesday.

"We will act as expeditiously as possible," Mansfield said. Speaker John W. McCormack agreed with Mansfield's assessment.

McCormack said the consensus at today's weekly breakfast conference of legislative leaders with Kennedy was "that every effort will be made to have early action as possible — to have speedy action."

Initialing Is Due On Eve Of Communist Summit Meet To Unite Against Red China

MOSCOW (UPI)—The United States, Russia and Britain today ended historic talks that diplomatic sources said sealed final agreement to end East-West nuclear tests in space, in the atmosphere and underwater.

The major nuclear powers were expected to initial the agreement Wednesday, just as East European Communist leaders convened for a summit conference designed to close Red ranks against Communist China.

The East-West talks that diplomatic sources said might prove to be one of the major disarmament breakthroughs in the post war period ended at 6:30 a.m. PDT. The negotiators plunged immediately into additional discussions on other topics that could thaw the cold war.

Presidential trouble-shooter W. Averell Harriman, Britain's Science Minister Lord Hailsham and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko dismissed their advisers and discussed "other matters of mutual interest."

Although Harriman and Hailsham came to Moscow with authority only to work out agreement on a nuclear test ban, the informal discussions which followed their formal bargaining could lead to talks settling additional issues.

Wants Risk Eliminated

President Kennedy was reported to have asked Harriman to sound out the Soviets on Premier Nikita Khrushchev's proposal that East and West exchange observers who would report from strategic areas to cut the risk of surprise attack.

Such recognition, some Western diplomats feared, might imperil Allied rights in West Berlin.

As the negotiators would up the nuclear talks, sources in Washington said Secretary of State Dean Rusk plans to fly to Moscow with a bipartisan delegation of congressional leaders to initial the agreement.

A communique issued after the negotiations here Monday said the three men had achieved "further progress."

Following ratification by the U.S. Senate and the British government, the agreement would come into force. It would represent an historic step in the present easing of East-West relations.

No problem of Soviet ratification can arise once Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev approves the agreement.

The treaty would be the first fruit of the Geneva technical experts' meeting of the summer of 1958 which laid the original groundwork for banning nuclear weapons tests under scientific control.

This was the eighth day of the current set of talks, and there were no indications of progress in cold war issues outside the testing field.

Hailsham and Harriman conferred together before meeting later with the Soviet delegation headed by Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

The sources said a ban on underground testing will be discussed later. But they said a possible compromise number on five on-site inspections a year had been discussed. In the past, the West insisted seven inspections were the minimum needed to police an underground test ban, and the Soviets were willing to allow no more than three.

(Communist China, as expected, came out strongly against the prospect of agreement, charging in Peking broadcasts that in Tokyo today that President Kennedy wants only to "prevent other countries, primarily the socialist countries with the exception of the Soviet Union, from becoming nuclear powers.")

Monday's communique reported only that "further progress" had been made on the negotiations to ban testing in the atmosphere, outer space, and under water, and that "other matters of mutual interest" had been discussed.

The sources said these subjects included the East-West non-aggression pact that Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev wants to conclude and Khrushchev's weekend suggestion that the two cold war blocs reduce the risk of war by exchanging inspectors to check on troop buildups and movements.

Hailsham and Harriman are empowered to discuss such outside issues but not to make commitments. A pact between NATO and the Warsaw treaty powers would require NATO approval, and the troop inspection idea would require further examination in Washington and London.

City Council Adopts Ordinance To Annex N. W. Roseburg Areas

An ordinance was adopted by Roseburg's City Council Monday night annexing Garden Homes and adjoining properties in the northwest Roseburg area.

No protests were presented at a public hearing held on the proposal. The ordinance annexing the territory was introduced and given first and second readings following the public hearing. The measure contained an emergency clause allowing the council to present the ordinance for third reading and adoption in the same council session.

Administration officials advised the council that engineering aspects on a proposed sanitary sewer improvement for the newly annexed area are now in progress and plans and specifications should be ready for the council's consideration at its next meeting. Officials are aiming toward a mid-September work start on the project.

Jarvis Was Aboard Trans-Pac Yacht

The yacht Patronilla, owned by William F. Forrest of Roseburg, finished third in its class and eighth overall in the race from San Diego to Honolulu, reports Curt Jarvis, a member of the crew. Jarvis, basketball coach at Roseburg high school, was one of eight men making up the crew. Mrs. Jarvis flew to Honolulu to join her husband upon his arrival. They returned to their home in Roseburg Monday.

Mr. and Mrs. Forrest and their four children are expected home later in the week. Jarvis reports, as they remained in Honolulu for the awards dinner and other activities connected with the race.

Soviet Spy Suspects Enter Innocent Pleas At Hearing

NEW YORK (UPI)—A man and a woman, accused of helping a failed Russian couple spy for the Soviet Union, pleaded innocent to espionage charges Monday and had their trial set for Sept. 30.

The two, who used the names of unsuspecting Americans to conceal their true identities, entered the pleas in federal court to indictments against them and the other couple, Ivan D. Egorov, 41, and his wife, Aleksandra, 39.

FBI agents arrested the Egorovs here, and their alleged accomplices in Washington, on July 2. Authorities said the latter couple, Robert K. Balch, 39, and Jo Ann Garber, 33, were using the names of a Roman Catholic priest and a Connecticut housewife.

All four were held without bail here.

The indictments, returned by a federal grand jury here last Wednesday, charged the four conspired to send the Soviet Union information about such U.S. defense matters as atomic weapons shipments and rocket launching sites.

Egorov, who was a personnel officer at the United Nations secretariat, and his wife were charged to enter pleas on the charges Aug. 20.

around Fullerton IV School; W. Shenandoah from W. Bradford 77 feet south and W. Fair St. from W. Bradford 80 feet south. Also requested is a five-foot sidewalk on the north side of W. Bradford from W. Broccoli to W. Oriole.

It was reported the school district has funds budgeted for their assessment share of the project. Estimated front foot cost is \$8.11 with the total project cost estimated at \$36,853. The city would have a participating cost on certain construction aspects.

Resolution Approved

The council approved a resolution approving the plans and specifications for the proposed work and setting public hearing Aug. 14. In the event the legal procedures move as planned, bids could be opened Aug. 26 and the work started early in September, officials reported. The council will possibly hold special meetings to expedite the legal procedures.

A public hearing was also held Monday night on the proposed sale of unused city-owned properties. Purpose of this hearing was to determine if it is in the public interest to sell the properties. No comments were submitted and the council moved to proceed with said plans. City Manager Craig McKinnon outlined a proposed sale procedure and this proposal was referred to the city Planning Commission and Parks and Playgrounds Commission.

Properties involved are: 1. All of block 8, first addition to Kinney's; 2. lot 10, block 10, Miller's Addition; 3. lots 9 and 10, block 5, Terrace Park addition.

Glide Couple Quits Teaching Positions

A husband-and-wife team which has been teaching 11 years in schools in the Glide School District resigned Monday night.

The resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Forsythe were accepted by the School Board. The Forsythes are planning to teach in Arizona. They expect to leave for Arizona in about two weeks.

Forsythe was arts and crafts teacher at Glide High School, and his wife, Jean, was a first grade teacher in the Glide Elementary School.

It was also decided at the meeting to hire Edward Joseph Royley to teach sixth grade at Deer Creek. He is a recent graduate of the Oregon College of Education in Monmouth.

The board also accepted the resignation of Bert Allenby as a School Board member and appointed Don Brown of Young, Brown and Young Logging Co. Inc. as his successor. Allenby had been a member of the board for the past five years.

In other school business, the board decided to receive bids on the Bungalow School property it recently found it owned until Aug. 12, reports correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

TWO SHIPS COLLIDE

MAYPORT, Fla. (UPI)—A Navy tug, experiencing a failure in its electrical steering mechanism, Monday collided with a destroyer in the St. John's River.

Nine crewmen were rescued by another tug minutes before the stricken vessel sank in 35 feet of water. No one was hurt.

Russia Leaps Into Debate On Portugal

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—Russia today seized the first available chance to leap into the Security Council debate on the overseas policies of Portugal, a member of the North Atlantic Alliance.

Without waiting for presentation of the case against Portugal to be completed by the four African countries designated to do so by the recent Addis Ababa conference, Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko inscribed himself to speak at this afternoon's council meeting.

The council's hearing of the unanimous demand of 32 African countries for U.N. discipline of Portugal and South Africa for repression of natives began tensely Monday under doubled security precautions.

A brief sit-in at U.S. delegation headquarters was led by William Worthy, a reporter for the Baltimore Afro-American, to demand Washington's support for the exclusion of South Africa from the United Nations because of its racial policy of apartheid — a demand not made formally by the Africans — and for discipline of Portugal for its colonial policy.

Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson told Worthy's delegation that U.S. policy would be unfolded after the Africans put forward specific demands for U.N. action.

The Africans limited themselves Monday to demanding unspecified action against Portugal and South Africa lest the other African states be moved to act against the two countries on their own.

J. Rudolf Grimes, foreign minister of Liberia, opened the case. He and Foreign Minister Mongi Slim of Tunisia, who also spoke Monday, together with representatives of Madagascar and Sierra Leone, were designated by the Addis Ababa conference to argue the case here.

Finance Minister Victor Miadana of Madagascar was scheduled to speak today and Foreign Minister John Karefa-Smart of Sierra Leone Wednesday as the council devoted its debate first to the Portuguese question.

Yoncalla Man's Body Found In Car Wreck

The body of Caleb McDaniel, 22, Yoncalla was found near his wrecked car, a 1949 model, off Interstate Highway 5 about three miles north of Curtin just south of the Douglas County line Monday.

McDaniel was the subject of search when he did not arrive in Yoncalla after leaving Eugene about midnight Saturday. An Oregon Highway Department crew, headed by John Gunter, found the car about 10 a.m. Monday.

State police, who investigated, report the southbound car went over a 90-foot embankment on the west side, traveling 193 feet before coming to rest. McDaniel's body was thrown from the vehicle, and he apparently died instantly from multiple skull fractures and a broken neck. The exact time of death couldn't be determined, but it was concluded to have occurred shortly after midnight Sunday.

Police Notified

McDaniel, a student at Northwest Christian College in Eugene, had left that city after visiting a girl friend whom he planned to marry in September. When he did not arrive home, the young man's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl McDaniel of Yoncalla, notified state police Sunday morning. A check of service stations along the way was made, without results, although one attendant thought a car of that description had stopped by.

The highway crew Monday discovered a broken highway marker and, on investigating, found the wrecked car nearby.

Dr. James K. Gray, county medical examiner investigated and had the body removed to Mills Funeral Home in Cottage Grove.

Roseburg Group Ends Long Tour

A group of four Roseburg High School girls, all delegates to the International Christian Endeavor Convention in Washington, D.C., have returned to their homes following a four-week trip which took them 8,600 miles.

Marilee Currier, Aline Batton, Mary Ellen Baker and Sharon McCabe, accompanied by Mrs. Robert Keefe, arrived back in Roseburg July 18. Art Neumarkel, the second chaperone, who also did the major part of the driving, left the group by plane at Chicago to make an earlier return to his duties as pastor of the Little River Community Church.

Hardly a scenic or historic spot on the long trip east and back was missed by the Roseburg group. Week-long convention sessions in the morning hours gave way in the afternoon to sightseeing in the nation's capital, including a trip through the White House and FBI headquarters and attendance at sessions of Congress. The United Nations, Rockefeller Center, Harlem, Greenwich Village and the Bowery were highlights of the group's stay in New York City. National parks and shrines were also on the tour agenda.

Funds for the trip were raised in part by work projects of Christian Endeavor members during the past year. All report having had a "wonderful time" and "unforgettable experience."

Israeli, UAR Planes Clash Over Desert

CAIRO (UPI)—Israeli and United Arab Republic fighter planes clashed today over U.A.R. territory above the Sinai Desert and one Israeli plane was shot down, an Israeli spokesman said.

(In Jerusalem, an official spokesman claimed it was Israeli territory which was violated by two U. A. R. planes. The spokesman said Israeli fighters chased the U.A.R. planes back across the border, hitting one in a brief dogfight, and then returned safely to their bases.)

The U. A. R. spokesman said four Israeli planes infiltrated Egyptian territory over the Sinai, which is the U. A. R. frontier province with Israel and which lies far to the east of Cairo.

The alleged violation of the U.A.R.'s frontiers came as President Gamal Abdel Nasser was reviewing a massive military parade in Cairo marking the 11th anniversary of his revolution.

(An Israeli military spokesman in Jerusalem said that two U.A.R. MIG-17 jets had violated Israeli territory this morning near Nitzana and had been intercepted by Israeli fighters.)

(One of the MIGs was hit in a brief dogfight and the two planes returned to U.A.R. territory, he said, adding that all Israeli planes returned to their bases undamaged.)

Logger Is Injured In Woods Accident

Kenneth Alexander, of Dillard, suffered severe injuries in a logging accident while working for the R. A. Briggs Logging Co. Monday afternoon.

According to information received by the News-Review, Alexander was felling a tree on Weaver Road in the Reston area sometime around 3 a.m.

The tree apparently fell over backwards upon him, rolling over his body causing injuries. He was brought by Mohr's ambulance to Mercy Hospital.

Man Found Shot In Parked Truck

HAGERMAN, Idaho (UPI)—A Portland, Ore., man was found shot to death in a pickup truck parked alongside Highway 30 Monday night.

Gooding County Sheriff Keith Anderson said the victim tentatively had been identified as Richard A. Harold, 31. There was no identification in the man's clothing or in the pickup, Anderson said, but Harold's boss, George Owen, Portland, furnished a physical description that matched the dead man.

Law enforcement officers throughout southern Idaho set up roadblocks Monday night but failed to net any suspects, Anderson said. The roadblocks later were pulled down. Anderson said he questioned three men about the case but later released them.

The body was found in a pickup truck parked in a roadside park about 2 1/2 miles south of the head.

The vehicle, which bore Oregon license plates, was traced to Owen. At first, it was believed he might be the victim, but officers later spoke with him by telephone. It was Owen who suggested the victim might be Harold.

"It looks like someone probably shot him in his sleep," Anderson said. He added the motive appeared to be robbery.

Four Car Prowl Suspects Being Held In County Jail

Douglas County sheriff's deputies, working in cooperation with Reedsport City Police and Lane County deputies, have cleared up four reported car prowls, with the arrest of four persons.

The four, each charged with larceny over \$75, are Kenneth Francis Eckley, 25, of West Lake; Charles Olin Monroe, 20, of Empire; Lawrence Lee Kirk, 25, of Coos Bay; and Beverly Rose Leonard, 26, Empire.

The four are in the Douglas County jail on charges of receiving and concealing stolen property, growing out of the Douglas County case, and the sheriff's office here reports warrants for their arrest, as hold orders have been prepared and will be served on them in Eugene. Bail is set at \$2,000 for each.

They are accused in connection with the alleged prowls of a car belonging to Palmer King, Rte 3, Eugene; while parked at Winchester Bay and from which articles of clothing, groceries, a sleeping bag and other items were taken, also, a 1957 Buick Wildcat, of Peter Klocki, Phoenix, Ariz., parked at the same lot, and from which a leather jacket, trench coat, a suit and other items were taken.

The third car was that of E. C. Mix of Smith River, parked in the rear of the Shell Service Station at Gardiner, and from which a chain saw was taken. A fourth car in Reedsport also was prowled.

The four were traced from an automobile license number when the car was traced to Eckley. They were located at a home in western Lane County, where the stolen property was recovered, according to the sheriff's department.
