

Order Bans Troops In Uniform From All Race Demonstrations

An order by Defense Secretary Robert McNamara that uniformed troops must not participate in racial demonstrations has been sharply challenged by integration organizations.

Caught up in the controversy is the little town of Havelock which lies outside the main entrance gate to the Cherry Point Marine Air Station in the flatlands of eastern North Carolina.

Racial groups have leveled discrimination charges against the "public accommodations" of the town which derives much of its income from the 2,600 men of Cherry Point, 600 of whom are Negroes.

Floyd McKissick, a Durham, N.C., lawyer who is national executive director of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) and an attorney for the National Association for the Advancement of

Colored People (NAACP), announced that McNamara will be asked this week to declare Havelock off limits to Marines unless the places used by the servicemen are desegregated.

Clubs, Cafes Segregated
He said he based his information that at least 17 night clubs and cafes and three theaters in the town were segregated on reports from a Marine who had just transferred home from duty in Japan.

A spokesman at Cherry Point, home of the 2nd Marine Air Wing, said the base would adhere strictly to a July 16 directive by McNamara and that "we will very definitely discourage participation in demonstrations."

In that directive, the defense secretary said that military personnel "may not under any circumstances" participate in racial demonstrations during duty hours, while they were in uniform, while on military reservations, when their participation breaks a civilian law or when violence is reasonably likely to result from a demonstration in which they were participating.

Not A Direct Order
McNamara did not expressly forbid off duty servicemen not in uniform from getting into a racial incident but they also could be affected in the event of trouble and arrest.

The presence of a small number of Negro servicemen among racial demonstrators recently brought demands that McNamara issue a service-wide policy directive on the subject. A few Negro servicemen in uniform have shown up at most of the major demonstrations in the South.

McKissick did not say that Cherry Point military personnel planned to violate the McNamara order but he stressed that integration groups would turn to "direct action" at Havelock unless the Defense Department or the business houses involved move voluntarily.

Hams Vs. TV Viewers!

DEAR ABBY: Your letter "Tired of Hams" is typical. I have been an active ham for many years and a TV technician since 1949. Your complainant should be told that her interference is due to INADEQUATE SHIELDING in HER TV set! The TV manufacturers will provide a filter free if you write and tell them your make and model. I operate a TV set right next to my ham radio set (at the same time, too) and I get no interference.

DEAR ABBY: Television interference is caused by TV sets picking up the ham's transmitter signal. The frequencies for hams are very strict, and the FCC constantly polices the bands for "off-frequency" sets. When a TV set picks up ham signals, it means that the selectivity is so wide that the TV set has become a ham receiver. The ham cannot be blamed for this. It can be eliminated with an inexpensive filter. But the filter goes on the TV set — not the ham's radio set. So, if a filter is needed, the TV owner buys it.

A HAM WHAT AM

DEAR ABBY: If that lady who hates ham operators would write to the manufacturer of her TV set and request a TV-HI-PASS filter, they would send her one free. Amateur radio is not only a hobby, it is a public service, and has been very helpful in cases of emergency and disaster. I have a neighbor who watches TV morning, noon and night, and she absolutely refuses to do anything about her TV except to complain to me because of the "interference." I have the same privilege to talk on ham radio as she has to watch TV. My own TV reception stands ten feet from my ham radio equipment, and MY reception is perfect. She won't admit that the trouble could be in HER TV set.

DEAR ABBY: I am a ham radio operator and have been for years. A neighbor reported me to the FCC because she claimed my

hobby was interfering with her TV reception. I took my little portable TV receiver to my neighbor's house and went back home and talked on my ham set. She called me up and told me that she got NO interference on the portable TV set. Then she had a TV repair man check her set, and he found a burned-out tube. When your TV gets interference from a ham radio, 99 per cent of the time it's a faulty TV set — not the ham's equipment. A ham's rule is, "If you don't interfere with your own TV set, your ham equipment is okay." As we say in hamland, "73" — which means, best regards.

DEAR ABBY: If anyone gets interference on his TV because of a ham operator, all he has to do is report it to the FCC. The "call letters" will identify the ham. All ham operators are licensed by the Federal Government and most of them are high-grade, responsible people who enjoy the hobby and mean no harm.

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Action On Kennedy Railroad Bill May Halt Civil Rights Hearings

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Commerce Committee may have to delay hearings on civil rights to clear the track for President Kennedy's railroad bill, acting Chairman John O. Pastore, D-R.I., said today.

The committee called Under Secretary of Commerce Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. to a morning session on civil rights but scheduled testimony by Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz on the railroad measure for its afternoon work.

Pastore said the committee would continue civil rights hearings at least through Wednesday but said the matter could be put aside briefly in favor of the railroad bill in view of the July 30 deadline for a threatened rail strike.

Chairman Oren Harris, D-Ark., of the House Commerce Committee said his group would open hearings on the railroad bill Wednesday.

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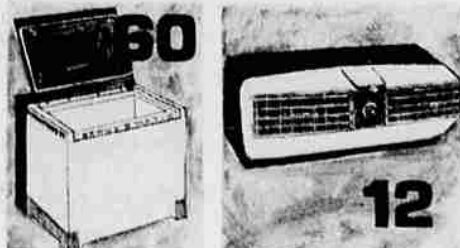
