

Eugene Wedding Of Interest Here

A very beautiful June wedding of interest to many in Douglas County took place at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Eugene at 4 p.m. June 15, when Ruth Ann Bartle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William W. Bartle of that city, became the bride of Lt. Roger Allan Johnson, only son of Col. and Mrs. Kermit Johnson of Beaverton. The bridegroom is the grandson of the late Judge and Mrs. R. W. More than 400 were invited to attend the impressive double ring ceremony performed by the Rev. Steen Whiteside.

Blue and white flowers formed the altar and church decorations. Given in marriage by her father, the bride was very beautiful in a full length sheath of white silk organza with wide border applique of Chantilly lace over which was worn a redingote of the organza with chapel train trimmed with tiny tailored bows down the back.
