

Russians Expected To Keep Defector Under Wraps Today

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Russians today were expected to keep under wraps the latest defecting U.S. intelligence employee until they can exploit his propaganda value in a press conference.

Victor Norris Hamilton, 44, naturalized American of Arab extraction, announced Monday through the government newspaper Izvestia that he sought political asylum in Russia because he was "outraged" by U.S. espionage activities in Washington and the Midwest.

An "open letter" indicated that Hamilton informed Communist officials of elaborate U.S. monitoring systems in the Mediterranean area. He was the third U.S. intelligence employee to go behind the Iron Curtain in as many years.

In Washington, the Defense Department said Hamilton was let out of the National Security Agency (NSA) four years ago because psychiatrists believed him on the verge of a mental breakdown. They said he was employed as a \$6,400-a-year research analyst in 1957, but that he had had "no knowledge" of American codes.

Two other NSA employees, William H. Martin and Bernon F. Mitchell, fled to Moscow in 1960, reportedly because of their disgust with U.S. spy methods.

Martin later married a Russian girl but told a Western newsman he was "disillusioned" with Communist life. The U.S. Embassy in Moscow refused all comment on Hamilton. But an initial flurry of publicity was expected to be followed by a long period of silence until the Soviets announce a press conference for him. Martin and Mitchell were presented to newsmen two months after they defected.

There was no indication how Hamilton got to Moscow, or whether he was accompanied by his wife, identified by him as Lillian Drake.

If the Soviets treat him like his predecessors, Hamilton is likely to settle down quietly to a new way of life. Like Martin, he may be paid his old salary and be permitted to receive Western Magazines. The Communist regime probably will provide him with an apartment.

New Satellite Keeps Facing Toward Earth

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Navy has put a satellite into orbit with an ingenious stabilization system that keeps the same face of the moonlet toward the earth. The device, involving a long boom and a springlike "yo-yo," takes the sway out of the satellite as it spins around the earth, the Navy said recently. The value of the device is to make radio communication easier and, in the case of weather satellites, to keep the cameras aimed earthward.

The Navy did not say when the satellite was launched.

Brando Plans Talk With Race Leaders

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI)—Actor Marlon Brando, 39, home today after six days in a hospital for treatment of a kidney ailment, planned to talk with Negro leaders to make new arrangements for his participation in civil rights demonstrations in the South.

The actor was released from St. John's Hospital Monday but his physician said it would be at least two weeks before Brando could leave his home.

Dr. Robert J. Kostichuk also made official records public "because of talks over the weekend that Brando was faking illness" in order to avoid flying to Cambridge, Mass., to take part in a demonstration and also to dodge a paternity suit filed against him. Brando continued to refuse comment on the paternity suit filed by Marie Cui, an actress from the Philippines who said he fathered a daughter by her. A process server presented the papers to Brando while he was in the hospital.

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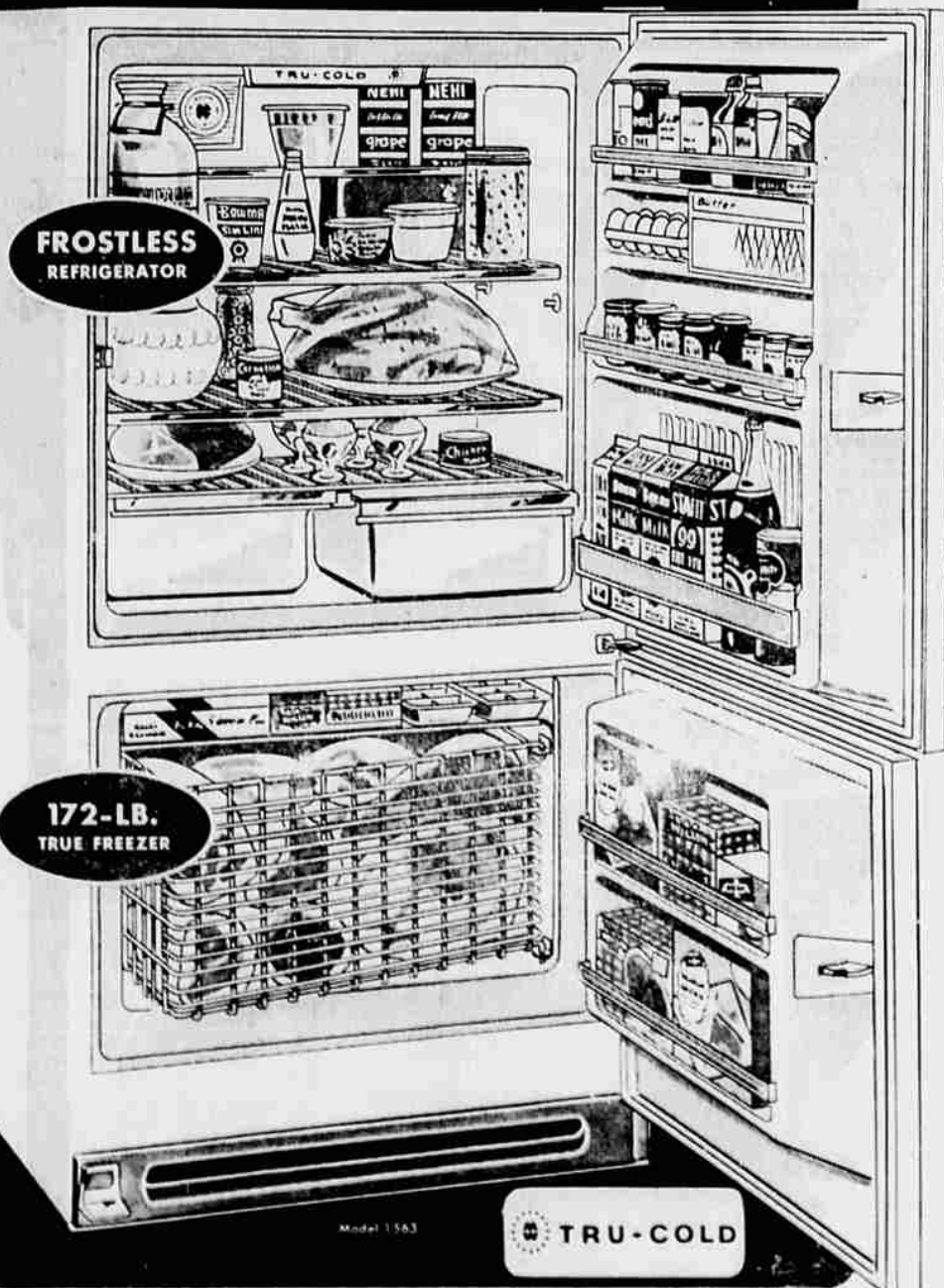
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
