Callahan Trail was the connecting link between Roseburg and Marshfield. The trail began about 15 miles west of Roseburg and extended about 50 miles west to Coos Bay. The homesteading area extended about 16 miles.

The trail was started about 1853 by George Callahan, who built the trail up the mountain to log the virgin timber. He had a camp on the top of the mountain where he kept his oxen, which were used in his logging. He skidded the logs to the top of the mountain and dropped them down a chute to a mill.

About this time a few families went into this area and took up homesteads along this trail. The
