Eymann Reports Rent Is On Way
SALEM (UPI) — Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Marcola, said Wednesday the rent money he owes the state board of control is on its way and charged the board "is evidently starting the political campaign early."
Gov. Mark Hatfield, Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. and State Treasurer Howard Belton of the all-Republican Oregon Board of Control must relish the opportunity of using personal attack and smear on a political opponent, Eymann declared.
The board voted Tuesday to seek a garnishment of the Lane County lawmaker's legislative pay to get \$79.65 rent he hadn't paid for a state-owned house he occupied during the session.
Eymann said today he was "amazed at the board's sneaky personal attack," especially after he had discussed a number of state and national issues with Appling just before the board's meeting Tuesday.
"Appling made no effort to inform me of the final amount due or of any action planned by the board," Eymann declared.

PARIS (UPI) — "The woman in the gray flannel suit" will be on the commuter trains this year.
Designer Guy Laroche, presenting his collection in the fall-winter Paris fashion week, paraded his pretty mannequins in charcoal gray wool suits and dresses, as did the House of Nina Ricci Tuesday.
One suit that could be paired with a lady executive's briefcase, for example, had a collarless jacket to mid-hip, loosely cinched with a narrow brown leather belt and garnished with four little flap pockets. His suit shoulders were natural and the narrow skirts just hid the knee.
Laroche even went gray for evening. A sky gray wool ribbed cocktail suit with a short, open jacket had a lining of dark gray oiled-silk fabric with a matching trim.
Laroche also splashed pink throughout the collections. He showed narrow wool deep pink coats, princess-line pale pink crepe cocktail dresses and pink-and-gray tweed suits.

Gray For Evening
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Decision By Federal Court Should Speed Desegregation

A concerted campaign by integration groups for faster public school desegregation has received a new boost from a significant federal court decision.
U.S. District Judge Edwin M. Stanley ruled Wednesday that a "stairstep" desegregation program in the schools of Durham, N.C., after just one year's trial, is too slow. He ordered elementary and junior high schools desegregated in September and high schools one year hence.
Stanley's decision, if upheld in the higher federal courts, could provide the legal foundation for attacking similar plans in operation in a number of other Southern school systems. It was one of the rare cases since the Supreme Court school decision of 1954 in which a court has thrown out a gradual desegregation program already in operation.
Integrates By Degrees
Durham, which began a grade-a-year integration program by school divisions in 1962, admitted to previously all-white schools 33 Negroes at the elementary level, 30 to junior high and 15 to high school.
Stanley ordered almost 200 Negroes admitted to Durham white schools this fall, gave others the chance to transfer by Aug. 12 and directed the total desegregation of everything through high school by September of 1964.
Until recently, federal courts have been inclined to accept "stairstep" desegregation plans as moves in good faith by school

National Forest Timber For Sale
Desert Fir Timber Sale
Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Federal Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 P.M., August 26, 1963, for all merchantable timber marked or designated for cutting on an area embracing 700 acres, more or less, within sections 27, 28, 33 and 34, T. 26 S., R. 3 E., and sections 2, 3, 10, 11, 14 and 15, T. 27 S., R. 3 E., W.M., surveyed, in the Umpqua National Forest, Oregon. The estimated volumes are: 2,900 M board feet of Douglas-fir, 700 M board feet of ponderosa pine, sugar pine and western white pine, 400 M board feet of western hemlock and other species. The minimum acceptable bid per M board feet is as follows: Douglas-fir \$20.25, ponderosa pine, sugar pine and western white pine \$10.40, western hemlock and other species \$9.55. This includes the following rates, per M board feet for stumpage including deposit for sale area betterment: \$3.00 base rate plus an additional \$1.50 for Douglas-fir, \$3.00 base rate plus an additional \$1.50 for ponderosa pine, sugar pine and western white pine, \$2.00 base rate plus an additional \$1.50 for western hemlock and other species and \$1.90 for slash disposal for all species. The stumpage rates payable for each species will be increased by the amortization rate in effect for that species when the unamortized estimated cost of the main haul road has been amortized by timber scaled. The unamortized estimated cost is \$15,770.00. Amortization rates are: Douglas-fir \$3.98 per M board feet, ponderosa pine, sugar pine and western white pine \$2.11 per M board feet and western hemlock and other species \$2.21 per M board feet. Amortization of estimated main haul road costs is computed on 80 percent of the estimated timber volume. The prices bid for stumpage shall be considered as tentative rates subject to quarterly calendar adjustment upward or downward by 0.5 of the difference between the average of the monthly Douglas-fir region indices, as calculated by the Forest Service or the Western Pine Association Lumber Price Index for the three previous months, and the following base indices: Douglas-fir 108.00(D), ponderosa pine, sugar pine and western white pine 82.23, western hemlock and other species 91.68 (A). Such adjustments in the price for stumpage shall be applicable to timber scaled during the three-month period following the quarter for which the adjustment is computed. In no event, however, shall the payment rates for each quarter be less than the base rates as stated above. When the adjusted rates by species are lower than the base rates, the difference between the total dollar value of the timber cut at adjusted rates and at base rates will be recorded for each species. The stumpage rate for a species will not be increased above the base rate until the subsequent adjusted rates above the base rate will develop an accumulated total dollar value for the species in excess of the recorded accumulated difference for all species. Sealed bids will be publicly opened and posted, at the office of the Forest Supervisor at 2:00 P.M., on August 26, 1963. All those who submitted a satisfactory sealed bid will be permitted immediately to continue auction bidding. A money order, bank draft, cashier's or certified check in the sum of \$5,700.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied to the purchase price, refunded, or retained for application to any claim for damages, according to the conditions of sale. If requested by the purchaser, contract terms will permit felling of timber in advance of payment up to the value of the performance bond. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately confirm the oral bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Ranger, Steamboat Ranger Station, Idleyd Park, Oregon, or the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, before bids are submitted.
