Woodruff served as a chaplain in World War II and was stationed on this small island. He returned there as a missionary and has just completed his 15th year. The Okinawa Christian Mission conducts a Bible training school, summer camp program, publishing service, an island-wide women's organization and serves 60 villages each week with study and worship opportunities.

Woodruff was featured missionary speaker at the recent Oregon Christian Convention which registered 2,417 in early July. This past week he was the teaching missionary at Little River Christian Camp.

He will be guest speaker following a fellowship dinner at the church at 6 p.m. and will show pictures of the island work at the evening service at 8 o'clock.
