

Don Drysdale Sets Pirates Down 5-1 For 13th Victory

What a difference a year makes! Just one year ago today the Los Angeles Dodgers were rolling out in front of the National League pennant race just as they are now with a seven-game lead. The pennant was being conceded to them because no one realized that Sandy Koufax was out for the remainder of the season and Don Drysdale would soon begin to feel the effects of his absence. Today the picture appears the same — but actually it's vastly different. The Dodgers are out in front seven games, all right, but this time the two key men — Koufax and Drysdale — are gaining momentum rather than losing it. Koufax stands 16-3 with nine straight victories and Drysdale, rather than beginning to lose strength, appears to be gaining. The 6-foot, 6-inch, 230-pound sidewheeler, feared by all National League hitters, gained his 13th victory of the season Wednesday night with a five-hit, 5-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. He is the first pitcher in the major leagues to reach 200 innings pitched for the season and he says, "I'm stronger at this point of the season than I've ever been."

A Winning Trio
Koufax, Drysdale and Johnny Podres (10-6) have scored 39 victories among them and with 63 games left to play in the season shape up as one of those rare pitching triumvirates that can total 60 or more victories in a campaign. Drysdale struck out eight and walked only one in cruising to his 13th win behind a seven-hit attack that included two hits each by Jim Gilliam and Johnny Roseboro. Earl Francis, tagged for the five runs in 4 2-3 innings, suffered his fifth defeat against three wins.

The San Francisco Giants shaded the New York Mets, 4-3, the Milwaukee Braves downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-1, the Chicago Cubs edged the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1, in and the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Houston Colts, 6-3, in other NL action.

In the American League, New York defeated Los Angeles, 8-4, Chicago beat Detroit, 3-1, Baltimore downed Washington, 8-5, Minnesota swept Cleveland, 9-0.

WD Pee Wees Play Today

Double Downs Mets
Jim Davenport's two-run ninth-inning double was the winning blow for the Giants and extended the Mets' league road-record losing streak to 18 straight games. Billy Hoelt, the beneficiary of the Giants' three-run outburst, picked up his second win while Al Jackson, who allowed only three hits and two earned runs, suffered his 12th defeat against six wins. Denny LeMaster pitched a five-hitter to win his sixth game for the Braves, whose 11-hit attack featured homers by Dees Menke and Frank Bolling. Hank Aaron and Lee Maye also contributed two hits to the Braves' attack as Ernie Broglio suffered his seventh loss against 10 wins. Dick Ellsworth, en route to becoming the Cubs' first 20-game winner since Hank Wyse in 1945, pitched a four-hitter against the Reds for his 14th victory against seven defeats. Doubles by Lou Brock and Ellis Burton drove in Ellsworth and Brock in the seventh inning with the runs that handed Bob Purkey his sixth loss against four triumphs.

Ford Wins No. 12 In Row For Yanks

Anything seems possible for the New York Yankees these days so why can't the White Ford go on to equal the American League record of 16 straight victories and join the 200-win club before the season is over?

The 34-year-old left-hander is approaching both goals with a string of 12 consecutive triumphs that have increased his career total of victories to 191. His season record is 16-3 and the way the Yankees support him it looks like he can go on winning forever. Ford has gone nine innings only five times in those 12 straight victories but he has lost 15 in a row and 17 in all, and he'll tell you in a few thousand words why it's great to be a Yankee.

Ford won his 12th straight and 16th of the season Wednesday when the Yankees drubbed the Los Angeles Angels, 8-4. Johnny Blanchard, subbing for Roger Maris, drove in four runs with two singles and his fourth homer in three days to lead the Yankees' 15-hit attack. Ford retired after seven innings but Hal Reniff and Bill Stafford closed out the win for him.

Ford's winning streak is the longest in the American League since he won 14 straight in 1961. The AL record of 16 straight is shared by Walter Johnson, Smokey Joe Wood, Lefty Grove and Schoolboy Rowe. The Minnesota Twins picked up a half-game on the leaders with a 9-0 and 5-0 sweep of a two-night doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians. The Chicago White Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers, 3-1, the Kansas City Athletics downed the Boston Red Sox, 5-2 and 7-6, and the Baltimore Orioles beat the Washington Senators, 8-5, in other AL games.

In the National League, Los Angeles defeated Pittsburgh, 5-1, Milwaukee downed St. Louis, 8-1, Philadelphia topped Houston, 6-3, San Francisco edged New York 4-3, and Chicago nipped Cincinnati, 2-1.

'Bill Harper Night' Success Aided By Twin Loop Victory

It was Bill Harper night at Legion Field Wednesday night and the fans joined forces with the Lockwood Motors Legion players to make it a night the popular Roseburg coach will never forget. Riding high on the crest of brilliant performances by four pitchers and a hitting outburst by center fielder Bob Manning the Lockwoods handed Harper his first undefeated Doug-Lane League championship in 10 years of coaching here.

And between games the American Legion and 1,444 fans took everything from a television set to a wheel barrow full of money.

Pitchers Shine
Harper took advantage of the final outing before heading into the Area 4 playoff series this weekend by treating the fans to a dazzling array of the pitching the Lockwoods will be banking on when they face the Klamath Falls Falcons starting Saturday night. Four pitchers made the mound and limited the Snellstrom Lumber Co. (Sheldon) squad to one run over the 14 innings.

Left-hander Ron Westbrook took credit for a 3-1 victory in the opener and right-hander Dick Williams came back with a brilliant one-hit performance in his five innings in the nightcap to win 5-0. And the relief chucks shone too, as Rojelio Gutierrez retired six men in order in his two-inning stint in the first game and Ran Cool gave up one hit and struck out six in his two innings of the nightcap. Harper indicated he'll start Cool against the Falcons in the playoff opener at 8:30 p.m. Saturday at Legion Field. The second game will be played at 8:30 p.m. Sunday at Klamath Falls. If a third game is needed, it will be played at 8:30 p.m. Monday here.

Blomberg Triples
In the opening game, left fielder Mike Blomberg got the Lockwoods started off on the right foot as he blasted a fastball into deep left-center field for a standup triple. This was the only extra base hit of the game, and Blomberg scored moments later on a wild pitch. Blomberg put Roseburg out in front 2-0 in the third inning, when he reached first on an error on the second baseman, moved to second on a sacrifice by Artie McDonald and scored on an infield grounder by Bruce Wassom.

Snellstrom's lone run of the night came in the top of the fourth inning, when they pieced together three singles and took advantage of a Lockwood error to make it 2-1. **Manning Bat Booms**
Manning, who boosted his batting average to .305 with four hits in five trips to the plate, singled with two outs in the fifth and went all the way to third on an error by the left fielder. Jim Beamer then walked and later started a perfect double steal to allow Manning to score the third and final run of the game.

Between games, it was time to pay tribute to Bill Harper, who has made American Legion Junior baseball in Roseburg a by-word throughout the state. Snellstrom coach Mel Krause was the first to put in his words for Harper, as he took the mike from emcee Lyle Fenner and said that in his opinion Harper was one of the finest coaches in the game today. Legion official Bill Gray then presented gifts from the Legion to Harper's family, a dress and a sweater-skirt, each from his wife, Anne, and \$50 Savings Bonds to his daughters, Barbara and Kim.

Fans Thank Coach
Fenner then called for the wheelbarrow, which the fans had filled with money as they filed into the ballpark to honor the popular diamond mentor. The Legion presented Harper with a portable television set and Mike Coen provided the humor of the evening as he presented an official crying towel from the umpire's association.

At the end of the ceremony, Harper took the mike and said, "I just can't express in words the gratitude I have for Roseburg. I have never seen such support of American Legion baseball. You can't go anywhere and find people who'll support the program like they do here. It's real tough to leave."

Harper will join the physical education department staff of Oregon State University, his alma mater, this fall. **Williams Hot**
In the second game, it was the Lockwoods' turn to do the presenting again, and Dick Williams presented Harper with 12 straight outs before giving up a single in the top of the fifth inning. That lone runner was erased when Manning made a diving shoestring catch of a sinking line drive and doubled him off second. Williams struck out seven and walked none in his five-inning stint.

Blomberg and McDonald led off for Roseburg in the first inning by drawing walks and scored on a single by Manning and an error. Manning made it 3-0 moments later when he scored on a pass ball. In the fourth inning, Mike Markham led off with a single, stole second and scored on a single by Blomberg. The final run came when Manning singled, stole second and then just kept on running to score on a double error on the Snellstrom catcher.

This double win gave the Lockwoods a perfect 18-0 record in Doug-Lane League play and a 40 won and 7 lost record for the season.
