Wedding vows were exchanged by Gayle Lorraine Harris and Richard Edward Withnell at an early evening, candlelit ceremony July 13 in the sanctuary of the First Presbyterian Church of Roseburg, the home church of the bride. Mr. and Mrs. Wayne H. Harris are parents of the bride, and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Withnell, of Seaside, formerly of this city.

For her wedding, Miss Harris was radiant in a full-length gown of taffeta-faced sheer organza. The simple lines of the gown were enriched with Venice lace applique and pearl beadwork on the bodice, with three-quarter length sleeves and scoop neckline. The skirt was bell-shaped with controlled fullness in the lines. For "something borrowed" she wore the lovely Swedish veil of her new sister-in-law, Mrs. Michael Harris.

Floral length of silk illusion, held in place by a pearl crown, centered on a flower-shaped base of delicate lace petals, edged in seed pearls. The crown was ornamented with rhinestones and pendant pearls. She carried a crescent of pink rosebuds, white stephanotis and green bells of Ireland, centered with a white orchid, and arranged on a white Bible, a gift from her mother. She was escorted to the altar by her father.
