

Mays Leads Giants To Vital Victory; Dodgers Lose 6-2

Willie Mays is on the move but even a .419 batting surge may be too little too late for the San Francisco Giants.

The \$100,000 centerfielder who had been bogged down close to the .250 mark this season has made 13 hits in his last 31 at bats to boost his average to .281. The Giants have moved with him — six victories in their last 10 games — but that isn't going to be enough to overtake the Los Angeles Dodgers unless they do an el fold to end 'em all.

The Giants ran their current winning streak to four games Thursday when they whipped the New York Mets, 8-6, as Mays drove in four runs with a home run, double and single. Willie McCovey also weighed in with three hits and knocked in two runs in San Francisco's 12th attack.

The loss was the 19th in a row on the road for the Mets — equalling a 47-year old major league record for futility away from home.

The Mets made 12 hits, including a run-producing single and a two-run homer by Duke Snider, but left 10 runners on base against the combined pitching of Billy Pierce, Bob Bolin and Billy Hoelt. Bolin, who yielded one run and six hits in 3 1/3 innings, scored his sixth victory against three losses.

The victory enabled the third-place Giants to move within 7 1/2 games of the Los Angeles Dodgers, who lost to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2, ending Sandy Koufax' nine-game winning streak.

The St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 3-1, the Cincinnati Reds nipped the Chicago Cubs, 3-2, and the Houston Colts shut out the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-0.

In the American League, Los Angeles defeated New York, 5-0, Chicago shaded Detroit, 4-3, Kansas City beat Boston, 2-0, Cleveland edged Minnesota, 3-2, and Baltimore topped Washington, 4-2.

Roberto Clemente's three-run homer and Tom Sisk's strong five-inning relief pitching enabled the Pirates to end Koufax' streak which dated back to June 1. Koufax struck out 12 batters but never was even after Clemente's homer with Bill Virdon and Manny Mota aboard in the third inning. It was Clemente's 10th homer of the season and Sisk's first big league win.

Lew Burdette topped Warren Spahn in a pitching duel between former roommates when the Cardinals scored two fourth-inning runs on Bill White's double, singles by Stan Musial and Tim McCarver and errors by Denis Menke and Gene Oliver. It was Burdette's eighth win of the season.

Spahn, pitching for the first time since July 7 when he was sidelined with a sore elbow, yielded eight hits and no walks in eight innings. It was his fifth setback against 12 victories this season.

Johnny Edwards' ninth-inning sacrifice fly drove in the winning run for the Reds, who beat Bob Buhl for the 10th time in 12 lifetime decisions. Until Edwards' homer, Buhl had shut out the Reds since the first inning when a walk, Vada Pinson's single, an infield out and Frank Robinson's single produced two runs. Billy Williams had three hits for the Cubs.

Hal Brown pitched a four-hitter, struck out five and didn't walk a batter to win his fourth game for the Colts and hand 10-game winner Ray Culp his eighth loss. The Colts scored all their runs in the third inning on Brown's leadoff single, a double by Al Spangler, singles by Pete Runnels and Carl Warwick and Jim Wynn's sacrifice fly.

Fox Paces Chisox Victory As Yanks Lose To Angels

Nelson Fox, who already owns eight major league records, will soon achieve another statistical goal that will place him among the greatest second basemen in baseball history.

The combative little Chicago White Sox second baseman — who just might be the only fellow in the American League who hasn't conceded to the New York Yankees — needs only three more hits to reach 2,500 for his career. That's a total reached by only five second basemen — all hall of famers — Eddie Collins, Nap Lajoie, Frankie Frisch, Charlie Gehringer and Rogers Hornsby.

Fox knocked in three runs with two singles and scored the White Sox' fourth run of the game Thursday in a 4-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers. The win enabled the second-place White Sox to move within eight games of the Yankees, whose six-game winning streak was ended by a 5-0 loss to the Los Angeles Angels.

The Cleveland Indians edged the Minnesota Twins, 3-2, the Kansas City Athletics defeated the Boston Red Sox, 2-0, and the Baltimore Orioles downed the Washington Senators, 4-2, in other American League games.

In the National League, Pittsburgh defeated Los Angeles, 6-2, San Francisco beat New York, 8-6, St. Louis topped Milwaukee, 3-1, Cincinnati downed Chicago, 3-2, and Houston beat Philadelphia, 3-0.

Fox, 35, singled home Mike Hersherberger in the third inning and rode home on Dave Nicholson's triple. He also singled home two more runs in the seventh inning to boost the White Sox into a 4-0 lead and provide the necessary cushion for two relief

Fred Hawkins Holding Lead In Western Open Golf Play

CHICAGO (UPI) — Golf pro Fred Hawkins was in a familiar spot today, he hoped the road would take a different turn to a new ending Sunday.

Hawkins, on the pro tour for sixteen years with only one victory, was the first round pace setter in the \$50,000 Western Open with a four under par 67 on the thickly roughed, heavily wooded Beverly Country Club course.

It was the same position he held at the same milepost of the same tournament on Medinah No. 3 course last year. But last year he sagged to a third place tie, earning only \$3,075, when young Jack Cupit, one stroke behind after 18 holes, came from behind for the \$11,000 first prize after 72 holes.

Today Hawkins held a one stroke margin over three players heading into the second round, 48 year old Skeet Reigel, 27-year-old Joe Campbell, and 25-year-old Australian Bruce Devlin. The field was bunched tight behind them with eight players at 69, among them the Masters and PGA champion Jack Nicklaus.

Hawkins held first place by virtue of an almost sensational putting on an erratic trip around the 6,867 yard links. He had 13 one putt greens, equalling the best performance on the pro tour this year. He took 23 putts, only two more than the previous showing in a PGA event this year.

Yet he hit the rough nine times. Five times he was in traps, and he connected on "only one good drive," on the 18 holes.

The Winchester Red Sox high-lighted action in the final round of the annual Kiwanis Pee Wee baseball jamboree Thursday night by defeating the High School Giants 12-5 to maintain their undefeated season's record.

In other games, the Fullerton Phillies edged the Green Huskies 4-3, the Fullerton Reds squeezed by the Eastwood Orioles 5-4 and in a 10-11 year old game, the Fullerton Mets downed the Riverside Indians 7-4.

One game which drew some side interest was that between the Fullerton Reds and Eastwood Orioles, as it pitted the two Lockwood Motors American Legion batboys against each other as opposing pitchers. Chris Gray was on the mound for the Reds and Don Wassom was on the hill for the Orioles.

The Reds came up with three runs in the second inning to claim a narrow 5-4 victory. Gray pitched a one hitter for the Reds, while Wassom gave up only three hits for the Orioles.

In the other 12-13 year old game, the Fullerton Phillies took advantage of three walks to come up with three big runs in the third

The Roseburg Legion Bees, after having the second "ringer" in a row thrown at them, walked off the field on a protest after two men had batted in their scheduled game with Creswell Thursday night.

Creswell, a member team of the Lane County summer high school league, turned out for action with a pitcher who'll be a junior at Seattle University this fall. He pitched eight games for Seattle U. during the past season.

"It's not a question of whether we win or lose," Bees coach Jerry Droscher said, "but we're supposed to be playing high school players. When they start showing up with college players, that's the time to draw the line."

Earlier this week the Bees had gone against Lowell, of the same league. Lowell showed up with former South Eugene pitcher Jerry Gjesvold, who was on his way to tryouts with a semi-pro team. They led Gjesvold 2-0 at one time, but dropped a close 4-2 decision.

In Thursday night's game, Droscher was coaching third base in the top of the first inning. Suspecting the Creswell pitcher looked a bit old to be a high school player, he asked the Creswell third baseman what the pitcher's name was. The third baseman admitted he didn't know, nor did he know the pitcher's age.

Droscher called time and asked the umpire if he knew the pitcher, once again getting a negative reply. It was then admitted the chucker was a college student with two years experience at Seattle U. "We asked them to change pitchers, and when they wouldn't we just walked off the field," Droscher said.

The Bees will see their final action of the season tonight at Oakridge in a single game starting at 8 p.m. A scheduled game at Cottage Grove Sunday was called off so the Bees can see the playoff action at Klamath Falls.

The Bees currently have a 10 won and three lost record.

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Legion To Face Klamath Falls 9 In Playoff Game

The defending state champion Lockwood Motors American Legion Junior baseball team will begin its bid for a berth in the Regional Tournament here in August on Saturday night when they play host to the Klamath Falls Falcons for the Area 4 championship.

Game time for the opener here Saturday night has been moved up to 8 o'clock. The second game in the best two-out-of-three series will be held at Gem Stadium in Klamath Falls at 8:30 p.m. Sunday.

If a third game is needed, the two teams will return to Legion Field in Roseburg for the showdown at 8 p.m. Monday.

Cool Draws Starter

Lockwood coach Bill Harper has given crafty left-hander RAN Cool the starting assignment for Saturday night's game. Cool, who has compiled an impressive 11-0 record this season, will face the Falcons' Rich Jackson.

During the regular season's play, Cool appeared in 87 innings, giving up 16 runs on 37 hits and 28 walks. He boasts a sparkling 186 strike outs for the year. Jackson, one of the Falcons' top chucks, during the past couple of seasons, has seen limited action this year, but has compiled a 5-2 record. In 48 innings he has given up 17 runs on 23 hits, 21 walks and has struck out 64.

Harper will wait until after Saturday night's game to name his starter for the second game at Klamath Falls. It appears probable the Falcons will go with right-hander Gary Benson, 11-1 for the season, in their home game Sunday night.

Hard-Hitting Falcons

The Falcons will invade Legion Field with one of the hardest-hitting squads in the state. They have an overall team batting average of .286 and the nine starters who'll take the field Saturday night will average .315 in the hitting department.

The Lockwoods, too, feature some fine hitting. Led by catcher Jim Beamer, left fielder Mike Blomberg and center fielder Bob Manning, the Lockwoods carry a .265 batting average into Saturday night's game.

They'll be beefed up in the hitting department by the reappearance of Lance Casebeer, who has been sidelined with an injury during a good portion of the season. Casebeer, who was hitting .271 before his injury, will be available for pinch-hitting duties.

Tom Morrison, who missed Wednesday night's double header with Sheldon, will be back in action and in the starting lineup Saturday night.

Impressive Record

The Lockwoods will carry an impressive 40 won and 7 lost record into the playoff series. Klamath Falls will come into the playoffs with a 26-7 record. The Falcons defeated Brookings last weekend for the right to meet Roseburg for the Area 4 title.

Harper's starting lineup for Saturday night's game will have Cool on the hill and Beamer, currently belting the ball at a .358 clip, behind the plate. Blomberg, who

is hitting at a pace of .330 for the season, will be in left field. Manning, who went 4 for 3 Wednesday night to raise his batting average to .305, will be in center
