

# Mickey Mantle Hit By Another Injury

NEW YORK (UPI) — A depressed Mickey Mantle faced up to the grim possibility today that the season may be all over for him.

Set back even further by a new knee injury, which is literally one on top of another, the downhearted Yankee centerfielder said he had "no idea" when he might be able to play again.

Mantle suffered his latest injury, a loosening of a cartilage on the outside of his left knee, while trying to work himself back in shape from an "old" injury sustained on June 5.

Mickey was running in the outfield prior to a game with the Los Angeles Angels last Tuesday when his left knee suddenly gave way.

He was immediately examined in the clubhouse by Yankee team physician Dr. Sidney Gaynor, who relayed his findings to manager Ralph Houk.

"Dr. Gaynor came to me on Tuesday and said, 'I've got some bad news for you,'" Houk related.

"I said, 'Oh, no what now?' Then he told me what had hap-

pened to Mantle and I could hardly believe it.

**Injury A Factor**

"Mickey doesn't know when he'll be back; the doctor doesn't know and I don't know. Who knows, maybe he'll be able to pinch hit in three days? Then again, maybe he won't be able to play for the rest of the season. There's no use trying to minimize this."

Plagued by a long succession of injuries almost from the day he broke in with the Yankees in 1951, Mantle recently came off the disabled list after breaking a bone in his left foot when he ran into a wire fence at Baltimore on June 5.

He returned to his home in Dallas two days later and noticed a black and blue mark on his left knee but paid little attention to it. He said the knee didn't bother him at all until three days ago.

When the Yankees were informed of Mantle's latest injury, they decided to make it public and called a press conference following Thursday's 5-0 loss to the Los Angeles Angels.

Both Houk and Yankee General Manager Roy Hamey were at the session but Mantle wasn't. He was in the trainer's room where he was being treated for both his injuries.

**Take Pressure Off**

"People kept asking him when he was going to play again," Houk explained. "It's bugging him. We wanted to take some of the pressure off him."

"We don't have any reason to believe this new condition requires any surgery," Hamey declared. "But if it does, the surgery will be done after the season is over."

"I sure would love to be back in there playing again," Mickey said before Thursday's game. "but I don't feel good generally. I don't know when I'll be able to play again."

**Southwest:** Winchester Bay salmon angling fair, Coos Bay good, south coast, Rogue and Chetco bars good to excellent. Trout angling in North and South Umpqua fair to good, Diamond Lake fair, upper Rogue fair to good, Fish Lake fair, Applegate River fair to good.
