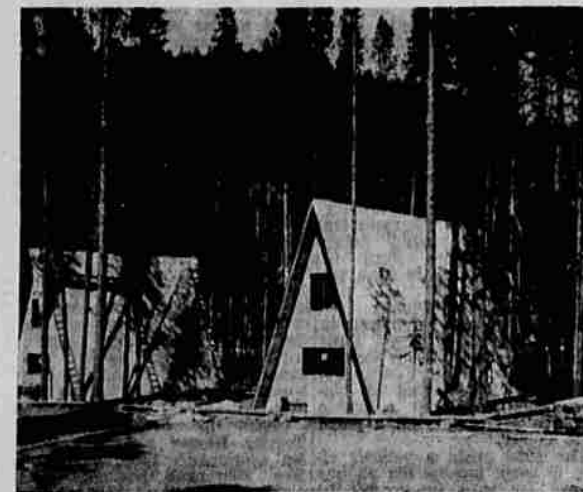

New Processes For Wood Manufacture Are Noted

Ways in which small businesses can take advantage of four newly developed wood products and a solar process for drying lumber are described in a new leaflet announced by John C. Barnett, office manager of the Small Business Administration, 921 S.W. Washington St., Portland.

The leaflet, New Development in Wood Technology, is No. 84 in SBA's series of technical aids and is obtainable upon request from all SBA offices.

The four new wood products are: Overlaid lumber. Researchers have created an attractive and sturdy

product for outdoor use by gluing overlays of resin-impregnated kraft paper onto poor-grade lumber.

Modified woods. Woods treated with two chemical solutions—phenolic resin and Polyethylene Glycol—showed 25-35 per cent less swelling or shrinking.

Particle board. Made from forest and mill residue in a heat-compression process, it is already popular for use in roofing, partitions and siding.

Slicewood. Sawdust waste is reduced by "slicing" rather than sawing lumber into boards. The experimental product, "slicewood," has proved successful in his patents in Washington State apple harvest.

Lemolo Lake Resort Slated To Open In Another Week

Lemolo Lake resort facilities should be ready by the weekend of Aug. 3 and 4, according to Don Wilson of Roseburg, developer of the resort.

Wilson said the lodge building, which will have a store and restaurant in the first unit, should be ready to open then, and it will be operated for him by George Kuhn.

The first unit consists of an L-shaped building. Plans call for it to be continued to form a "U" with sleeping rooms for lodge patrons above the second floor. This will not be completed for another year.

Four cabins also are being finished, as the first of a series of about 25. Wilson said he hopes to have a total of 15 cabins constructed by next summer. They will be built during the fall and spring months.

Work is to start next week on a Tidewater Oil Co. service station, which will take about two weeks to build.

Considerable ground work has been necessary at the resort. Clearing was necessary and roads have had to be constructed. Water and sewage systems have been

put in. All electrical wires have been buried in the ground.

The resort is located near the Pool Creek camp ground on the south side of the lake, a short distance from the dam which forms the impoundment.

Navy Retrieving Explosive Rocket

SALISBURY, Md. (UPI) — A highly explosive rocket, dropped accidentally from a Navy plane, has been "pinned" in a 160-acre wooded area, Maryland state police said today.

The rocket was lost Thursday by a Sky Raider plane which was on a firing practice run from the super carrier Forrestal off the Virginia Capes.

A Navy spokesman said that the five foot long, gray-colored rocket fell from the wing of the plane due to a malfunction in controls.

A widespread search was launched off for the highly explosive rocket and residents in the area were told not to touch it if they came across the missile.

Navy weapons experts from the Navy weapons station in Yorktown, Va., were sent to the area in an effort to retrieve the rocket.

Tozer To Handle Aluminum Awnings

Southern Oregon Area Dealership, Plant Set Up Here

Tozer's Heating and Sheet Metal of Roseburg has been appointed regional distributor and local retailer of C-Thru horizontal aluminum awnings, it was announced this week.

The area of distribution to be served by Tozer's includes all of Douglas, Lane, Coos, Josephine, Jackson and Curry counties, owner Vern Tozer stated. Local dealers will be appointed in the major centers of all the counties except Douglas, which will be served by Tozer's.

Fabrication of the awnings will be done in Roseburg and each installation will be individually tailored to the customer's desires in style and color combination. More than 5,000 combinations are said to be available.

Tozer indicated that the local fabrication will involve several specialized machines and the stocking of a substantial variety of components. In addition, it is expected that the manufacture of the awnings here will provide additional employment in Roseburg.

The Roseburg firm selected the C-Thru product to handle because of a conviction that there is no better similar product on the market for the purpose and a belief that there is substantial market opportunity in the area.

The awning is of a curved semi-open lower design, which keeps out sun while letting glare, frost light and air through. It is said, and the enamel bonded to aluminum finish provides sparkling colors for years.

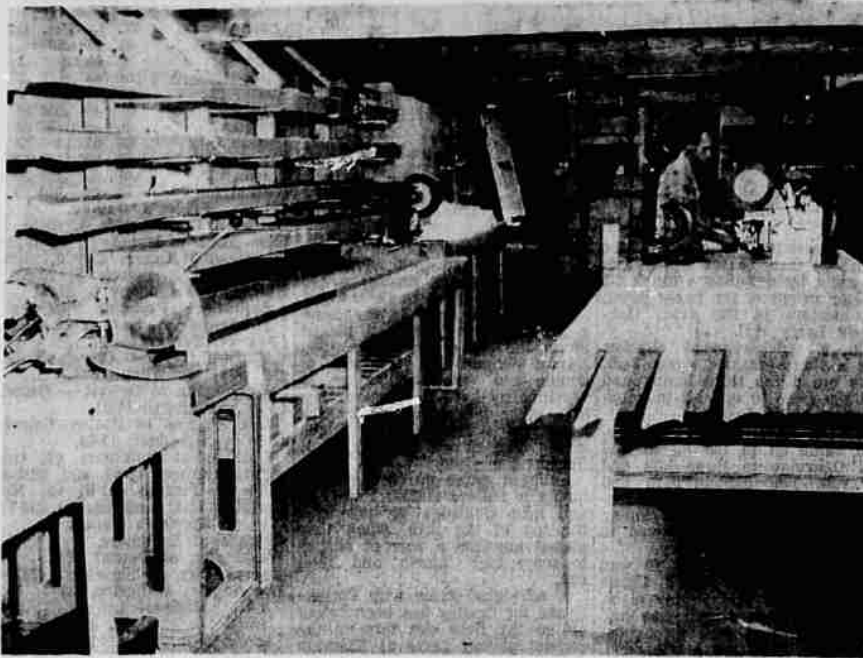
