

Burkhart-Stewart Wedding July 13

Miss Nancy Lou Stewart became the bride of John Allan Burkhart on July 13. The double ring ceremony was solemnized at 4 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church, with the Rev. Clark Enz officiating.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Stewart of Roseburg. The bridegroom's parents are Allan Burkhart of San Leandro, Calif., and Mrs. Julius Klaus of Portland.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was radiant in a floor-length gown of antique white satin, with fitted sleeves that tapered to points at the wrists. The bodice was styled with a sweetheart neckline and a pleated cummerbund at the waistline. The back of the bell-shaped skirt featured a double bow caught to one side by a pair of satin Dior roses. She wore a Juliet cap of heirloom lace, which had been designed and made by her mother. The cap was edged with seed pearls with a tear drop over the forehead. Her butterfly veil of silk illusion was shoulder length. She wore a single strand of pearls with matching earrings, a gift of the bridegroom. The traditional blue garter which she wore had been made for her by a sorority sister, Miss Kathy Parry of Needles, Calif. She carried a white Bible with her bridal bouquet which was a purple-throated white orchid with cascades of stephanotis and white satin ribbons. The bride's mother, Mrs. Gordon Stewart, was the Maid of Honor. She was Honored Queen of Job's Daughters, a present from Mrs. Cora Young.

The couple exchanged wedding vows before an altar of flowers and candles. Lighting the cathedral candles were JoAnne Stewart, sister of the bride, and JoAnne Stewart, sister of the bride. Prelude music chosen for the bride was played by Mrs. Homer W. Grow at the organ. She also accompanied Miss Thelma Ray and Lake Oswego who sang "Wedding Prayer" and "The Lord's Prayer." As Mrs. Grow played the chimes the attendants gathered at the altar to the strains of "Trumpet Tune" by Purcell. The traditional Lohengrin Bridal March was played as the bride approached the altar.

Attending the bride as matron of honor was Mrs. Roderick S. M. (Roxine Huntley) Iversen of Oakland, Calif., a classmate of the bride at Willamette University. Her dress was of "mille-lake" blue crystalline which featured short sleeves, a scoop neckline and a slightly gathered bell-shaped skirt. Bridesmaids were Miss Valerie Boden of San Mateo, Calif., and Miss Gayle Emerson of Sandy, both sorority sisters of the bride at Willamette University; and Miss Cheryl Jerred, cousin of the bride from Meridian, Idaho. Their dresses were of pale "mille-lake" blue crystalline and were styled identically to the matron of honor's. The bride's attendants all wore head-dresses of blue net held in place by blue velvet bows. They carried bouquets of white gladioli with blue net. Their matching blue nylon gloves and pearl earrings were gifts from the bride.

Serving as best man was Ramon Nolte of Roseburg and Ft. Benning, Ga. Performing the ushering duties were Albert Crabtree, Roger Stewart, brother of the bride, and Greg Christian, cousin of the bridegroom.

For the occasion the bride's mother wore a dress of pink lace with matching accessories. Her corsage was of pink rosebuds. The bridegroom's mother wore a navy blue ensemble with white and navy accessories. She wore a corsage of red rosebuds. Mrs. R. L. Whipple, maternal grandmother of the bride, wore a blue sheath dress with matching hat and accessories. The bride's paternal grandmother, Ella Lenox, was attired in a gray and rose print dress with a rose hat and harmonizing accessories. The bride's table, covered by white net over white lace was centered by a three-tiered colonnade cake. Each tier was decorated with white and had a nosegay of pink roses and orange blossoms with white satin ribbon. A fourth tier was the bridegroom's cake and was made by the bride to be saved for their first anniversary. A top tier was a miniature bride and groom under a heart-shaped bower of net ruffling, orange blossoms and white roses. The bride and groom cut the first piece of cake using a sterling silver knife which was a gift from

the groom's mother. Serving the cake was Mrs. George Jerred, aunt of the bride of Meridian, Idaho, and Mrs. Hugh Whipple of Drain, a great-aunt of the bride.

Coffee and punch were served from a lace covered table centered by an arrangement of pink roses in a cut-glass and silver compote. Lighted tapers in silver holders were used on either side of the arrangement. The accessories were loaned by Mrs. Kenneth Ford, and she made the centerpiece. Mrs. Ford also made the arrangements at the windows of the reception room using blue hydrangeas and white frosted candles. Pouring coffee was Mrs. Larry Peachey of Spokane, Wash. Presiding at the punch bowl were Mrs. Kenneth Ford and Mrs. H. B. Kruse, aunt of the bridegroom.

For traveling the bride wore an ensemble of turquoise blue silk shantung. For her corsage she wore the orchid from her wedding bouquet. Her accessories were white. The wedding couple left for a honeymoon trip to The Village Green and coastal points. They have since left for 29 Palms, Calif., where the bridegroom is stationed at the Marine Base. The bride will be teaching in the fifth grade there.

Both the bride and bridegroom were born in Roseburg and attended the Roseburg schools. The bride was graduated in June from Willamette University. The bridegroom has attended Southern Oregon College and Portland State and plans to resume his education after his discharge from the service.
