

Dodgers' Lead Cut As Giants Gain Tie With Cards In 2nd

Say it ain't so, Walter. You don't often say much but Dodger fans from the Brooklyn Gowanus to the Malibu Freeway need a word to assure today.

That once-imposing seven-game National League lead is down to 4 1/2 games almost overnight and the memory of the 1962 collapse is still fresh. Those San Francisco Giants have won seven straight and the St. Louis Cardinals are in exactly the same striking range, too.

Can it happen again? Well, the Dodgers held a four-game lead as late as Sept. 20 last season and contrived to blow the flag. So, it looks like it could be the same old cliff-hanging suspense again this year.

The Giants rolled to their seventh straight victory by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1, Sunday while the Philadelphia Phillies beat Los Angeles, 7-4, and handed the Dodgers their fourth loss in a row. The St. Louis Cardinals lost an opportunity to gain important ground when they dropped a doubleheader to the Chicago Cubs, 5-1 and 16-1, but are tied for second-place with the Giants.

Braves Beat Reds

The Milwaukee Braves scored a 5-2 victory after losing to the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3, and the Houston Colts dealt the New York Mets their 22nd consecutive road loss, 8-2, in other National League games.

In the American League, New York beat Minnesota, 3-2, after a 5-1 defeat, Los Angeles defeated Boston, 5-0 and 5-4, Chicago downed Baltimore, 4-1, Detroit whipped Washington, 7-4, and Cleveland drubbed Kansas City, 12-7, after a 3-0 defeat.

Willie Mays' two-run sixth

inning homer enabled the Giants to take a 2-1 lead and Jack Sanford hung on with an eight-hitter to snap his six-game losing streak and raise his record to 10-11. Don Schwall surrendered all the San Francisco runs in 6 1/2 innings and lost his fifth game of the season.

The Phillies scored their 11th victory in 12 games on homers by Clay Dalrymple and Johnny Callison that drove in five runs. Callison was the first of a left-handed batter off Ron Perroski since the Dodger relief ace entered the majors. Relief pitcher John Booser won his second game for the Phillies and 13-game winner Don Drysdale suffered his 11th loss.

Alert for 20

A crowd of 40,222, the Cubs' largest since June 1, 1952, saw Dick Ellsworth strike out 10 and pitch a seven-hitter for his 15th win. Then the Cubs unleashed a 16-hit attack, including two homers by Lou Brock and one each by Billy Williams and Jim Schaffer to win a nightcap slugfest in which nine homers were hit.

Gene Freese drove in three runs with a homer and a double and Jim Maloney went seven innings to increase his season record to 16-3 in the opener for the Reds. But the Braves came back to split the doubleheader on the strength of Denny LeMaster's six-hit pitching and two hits each by Denis Menke, Lee Maye and Joe Torre.

The Colts extended the Mets' losing streak on the road to 22 games, equalling the all-time record set by the 1890 Pittsburgh Pirates, on the strength of the six-hit pitching of Ken Johnson and the homers of Carl Warwick and John Berman. The Colts wrapped up the win with four runs in the first inning to hand Al Jackson his 13th defeat.

Fox Belts 2,500th Hit As Sox Down Orioles 4-1

Nelson Fox is elbowing his way into the class of baseball immortals, one base at a time.

He won't be remembered for his power, nor for his physique, but the scrappy Chicago second baseman who is a throwback to the long-age heroes of baseball will command as many lines in the record books as some of the game's most notable sluggers.

Fox reached another milestone Sunday when he notched the 2,500th hit of his major league career. Typically, it was a single, and typically it turned into the winning run as the White Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles, 4-1.

Only 39 other players have reached the 2,500-hit plateau. Five of them were second basemen, and all now have a place in the Hall of Fame. It's big company indeed for Fox, an unimposing five foot, nine inch, 160-pounder.

Yankees Split

In other American League games, the New York Yankees overcame the Minnesota Twins, 3-2, after dropping the opener of a doubleheader, 5-1; the Los Angeles Angels swept a twinbill from the Boston Red Sox, 5-0 and 5-4; the Detroit Tigers beat the Washington Senators twice, 3-2 and 7-4; and the Kansas City Athletics stopped the Cleveland Indians, 3-0, in the first game but dropped the nightcap, 12-7.

In the National League, San Francisco drubbed Pittsburgh, 3-1, Philadelphia beat Los Angeles, 7-4, Chicago walloped St. Louis, 5-1 and 16-1, Houston topped New York, 8-2, and Milwaukee tripped Cincinnati, 5-2, after a 4-3 loss.

Fox, who led the major leagues in singles for seven straight years, opened the sixth inning at Baltimore with one of his specialties. The score was tied 1-1 at the time, but the Sox moved ahead to stay when Fox came around on a walk and Jim Lemon's single. Dave Nicholson homered for Chicago and Gary Pe-

ters, who went all the way for his 10th victory, took over the league leadership in earned run average.

The Yankees held on to an eight game lead over Chicago when Hector Lopez hit a two-run, bases-loaded single in the ninth inning of the second game. Minnesota won the opener behind the six-hit pitching of Camilo Pascual and the hitting of Don Mincher and Johnny Goryl. The loss broke a 12-game winning streak for Yankee starter Whitey Ford, now 16-4.

Relievers Help Angels

Strong relief pitching enabled the Angels to win both games at Boston and Jimmy Piersall officially marked his return to the American League by engaging in a violent dispute with the umpires in the second game. Piersall, signed by Los Angeles on Saturday, was thrown out of the game. Don Lee pitched shutout ball for the Angels in the opener but still needed ninth-inning help in the 100-degree temperature and Paul Foytack gained credit for the second game victory.

A sacrifice fly by Gates Brown and a two-run triple by Bill Freeman in the eighth inning provided Detroit with its winning runs in the nightcap after Al Kaline had won the opener with a two-run homer. Norm Cash homered for the Tigers in the second game and Don Blasingame and Jim King retaliated for Washington to tie the score in the top of the eighth inning.

Orlando Pena pitched a two-hitter and Norm Siebera drove in two runs to account for Kansas City's first game victory. The Indians evened the score in the nightcap with a seven-run rally in the sixth inning that included John Romano's first major league grand slam home run. Reliever Ted Abernathy benefitted by the blast with his fourth triumph in five decisions.

CHICAGO (UPI) — Pro golf's biggest money winners, Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Julius Boros, play off today for one of the biggest purses of the pro tour, \$11,000 first money in the \$37,200 Western Open.

It will be the fifth playoff in the last seven pro tournaments and for Palmer, his fourth in his last five outings. He won his last two overtime playoffs, the Cleveland Open and the Thunderbird, but he lost the National Open title to Boros in the previous scrap.

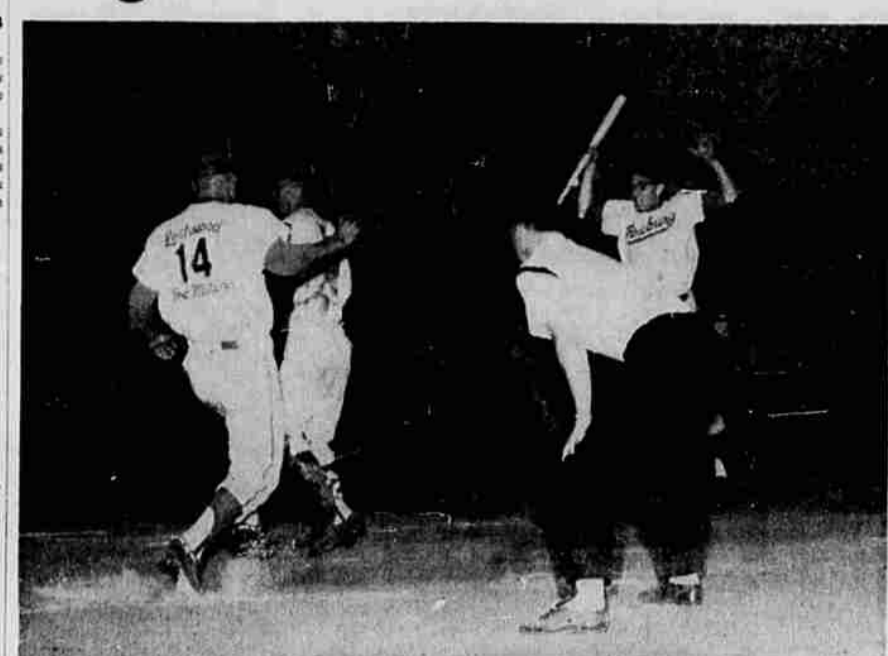

Palmer Slips

Nicklaus had the best round of the four-day tourney Sunday, a 67, and Boros tallied his second 67 in four rounds. Palmer, who had fired 67s in the second and third rounds, slipped to a 73 for the fourth 18 holes.

Nicklaus benefitted from a six-par in dropping birdie efforts of 33, 15, 12, 8 and 4 feet. Boros went over par only once, when he took three in reach, green on the 464-yard 15th hole, but he dropped three birdie putts of 15

Lockwoods, Klamath Falls 9 Square Off For Area Crown

Lockwood Motors of Roseburg and the Klamath Falls Falcons will square off at Legion Field in Roseburg at 8:30 tonight in the showdown battle for the Area 4 American Legion Junior Baseball Championship.

Roseburg opened the best two-out-of-three series Saturday night with a 2-1 come-from-behind victory here and Klamath Falls squared the series at 1-1 by pounding out nine hits for an 8-3 victory at Gem Stadium in Klamath Falls Sunday night.

Crafty left-hander Ran Cool kept the 1962 fans who packed Legion Field Saturday night on the edge of their seats for more than two hours as he blazed his way through 19 strikeouts to give Roseburg a thrilling 2-1 victory.

Cool yielded a lone run in the second inning when he issued a walk to leadoff batter Dave Johnson and pitcher Rich Jackson followed through by ripping a line-shot double off the left field fence for the RBI.

Jackson held the Lockwoods at bay until the bottom of the sixth inning, when shortstop Artie McDonald singled to deep short with two outs. Bob Manning then laced a line drive into center field for a single and when the center fielder failed to pick the ball up cleanly McDonald raced all the way to score and tie it up 1-1.

Cool and Jackson battled back and forth for the next three innings and then, with one out in the bottom of the ninth, Jackson issued back-to-back walks to Jim Beamer and Tom Morrison. Dave Sevall then stepped in and rapped a hard-hit grounder which skidded off the first baseman's glove and into right field, allowing Beamer to race home with the winning run.

The Falcons threatened early, as leadoff hitters LeVoy Young and Larry Binney rapped out back-to-back singles in the top of the first. Cool then struck out Lanny Guyer, but a bad throw in the infield on a pickoff play allowed the runners to move to second and third. After issuing an intentional pass to Mike Kitching to set up the force at home or a double play, Cool struck out the next two batters to retire the side.

Cool duplicated the feat of striking out the side in the fifth and sixth innings, and struck out two batters in every other inning but the second, when all three outs were made by fly balls.

Young and Binney proved to be the thorns in Cool's side again in the ninth, when with two outs they laced back-to-back singles again. Cool worked his way out of trouble by striking out the next batter to end the inning.

Cool gave up seven hits and walked three, while striking out 19. Jackson, showing a brilliant effort for the Falcons, gave up five hits, walked four and struck out six.

Sunday night proved to be the batters' turn to shine, as Klamath Falls started out with two runs in the first inning and moved out 6-0 before Roseburg was able to score. Starter John Burnham issued two walks and a single to the Falcons before being lifted for reliever Rojelio Gutierrez, who went the rest of the way, with one out in the bottom of the first. Both runs scored in that inning, in a single by John Parisotto, were charged to Burnham.

In the second inning, the Falcons pieced together three singles and a pair of walks to bring in three more runs and make it 5-0.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cuban Jose Stable of New York, second-ranking welterweight contender, will seek his fifth straight victory Saturday night in a nationally televised fight with Stanley (Kitten) Hayward of Philadelphia at Madison Square Garden.

That stands out as the most interesting bout on this week's boxing schedule although Flash Elorde of the Philippines, Junior lightweight champion, meets Love Alotey of Ghana, top contender, in a non-title bout at Manila, Saturday night.

In the New York 10-rounder, Stable will try to improve his record of 20 wins, two defeats and one draw. He knocked out six opponents.

Kitten Hayward, 24, will be making his Garden debut and trying for his eighth straight win. His 16-1-1 record includes seven kayoes.

Clay Or Doug Jones Sought As Terrell's Next Opponent

NEW YORK (UPI) — Matchmaker Teddy Brenner today sought high-ranked Cassius Clay or Doug Jones as the next opponent for Ernie Terrell, Chicago giant and new scourge of the heavyweight division.

Brenner stressed that a Liston-Clay match in September was unlikely because Clay's handlers want him to have a couple more bouts before challenging big Sonny.

Terrell, who carries 204 pounds on a six-foot-seven frame, was rated eighth among contenders when he went into the ring against seventh-ranked Folley, 203 1/2. And the betting was at "even money."

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
