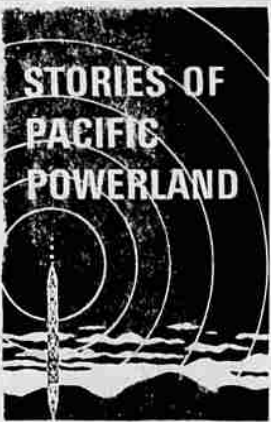

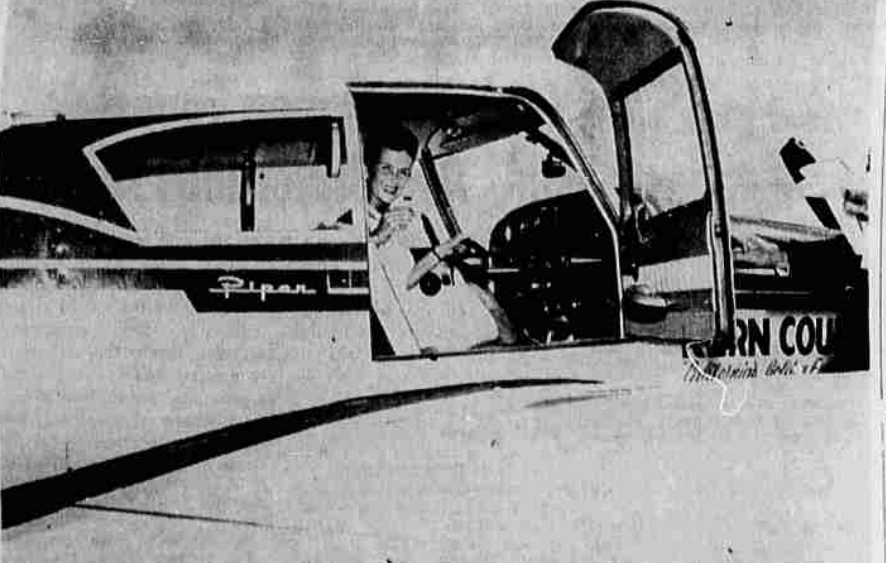

She says it keeps her wide awake with plenty of energy along the skyways to Atlanta City, a three-day hop. Her dad, a member of one of Bakersfield's pioneering families, was a "keeper of the bees" when she was a child.

A housewife and mother of a seven-year-old son, Mrs. Haycock was once "Miss Kern County," won the title of "Champion Outdoor Girl" at the Salinas Rodeo, and has served as a California police-woman.
