

Area Redevelopment Bill Seems Headed For Troubles In House

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy's area redevelopment bill, bruised by an encounter with civil rights, was headed today toward new trouble in the House Rules Committee.

The bill, designed to bring aid to financially depressed areas by authorizing money for public projects, appeared to have enough votes to clear the House Banking Committee but the rules committee chairman, Howard W. Smith, D-Va., has served notice he will do everything he can to stop it.

Ranking committee Democrats agreed to support an amendment barring funds to aid construction of motels and hotels, avoiding a battle over a proposed amendment barring discrimination in any hostilities built with ARA funds. They also agreed to trim about \$100 million off the \$455 million authorization approved by the Senate.

Republicans and conservatives charge the bill, an extension of a previous Kennedy program, is a "boondoggle."

Other congressional news:

Taxes: President Kennedy's tax cut program today faced several days of reshaping by the House Ways & Means Committee which plans to nail down final decisions on the revenue-producing features to be included in its compromise bill before voting on income tax rate reduction. The committee has tentatively approved structure-

al tax revisions that would net little more than \$700 million of the \$3 billion sought by the President to partially offset revenue losses from tax cuts.

Foreign Aid: The House Foreign Affairs Committee neared completion today of its action on a foreign aid bill cutting President Kennedy's request by \$428 million and imposing new restrictions on use of the funds.

Civil Rights: Chairman Emanuel Celler of the House Judiciary Committee said today he would give the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., Negro integration leader, an opportunity to testify on President Kennedy's civil rights package.

Local Church Leaders Set Bible Event

Ministers and lay leaders from more than 20 area churches are currently arranging details in connection with the presentation Sept. 21-22 in Roseburg of "Two Great Days With the Bible," a major undertaking designed to promote interest in Bible study. Theme of the event will be "Re-Discovering the Bible."

A meeting of the general committee and church leaders from Oregon and California who will head the various sessions of the study will be held on Friday, Sept. 20, as a preliminary to the public sessions to begin on Saturday.

All Faiths Invited

Persons of all denominations are invited to participate in the two-day event, set to start off with a men's breakfast at 7 a.m. on Saturday. Speaker at the breakfast will be Donn D. Moomaw, minister-at-large of the First Presbyterian Church at Berkeley, Calif., who was formerly a member of the UCLA football team and also a member of the Billy Graham Team during the now-famous London Crusade. Moomaw in 1957 was elected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of the five outstanding men in California for that year. Bible sessions for all age groups will also be held on Saturday with various Roseburg churches opening their halls for meeting places. Main center of activities for the event will be at the First Baptist Church.

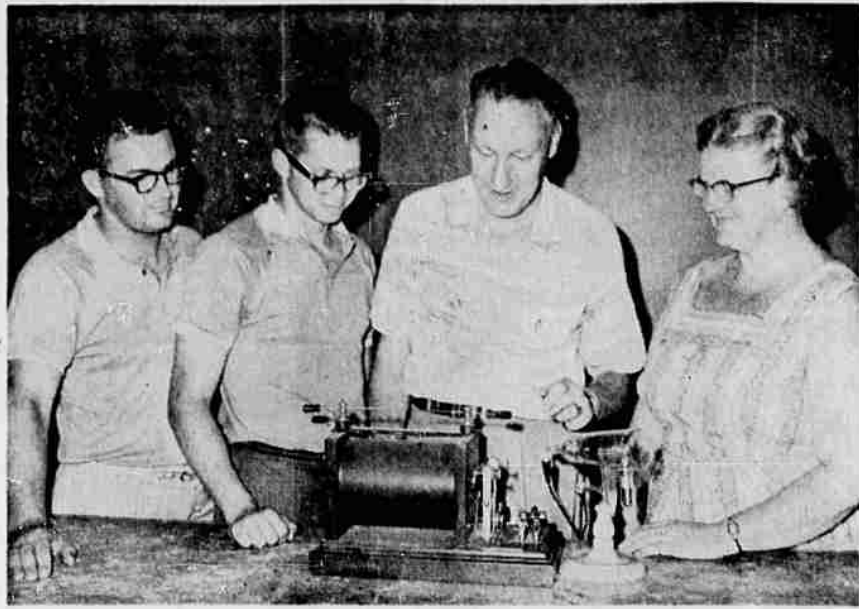
Youth Rally Set

Paul Haney Named To Succeed Powers

HOUSTON (UPI)—Paul Haney has been named to replace Lt. Col. John A. (Shorty) Powers as director of public affairs at the Manned Spacecraft Center, the head of the center said today.

Dr. Robert Gilruth, head of the space center, said Haney will replace the 41-year-old Powers sometime this week.

Powers will remain with the space center near Houston as a special assistant to the director, Gilruth said. Powers' new duties have not yet been detailed.

Haney, 35, is a former assistant city editor for the Washington Evening Star. He has been with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration since December 1958.

In speaking of the transfer of Powers, Gilruth said "Col. Powers did an outstanding job on the Mercury program, for the center and for the country."

Gilruth said he originally intended to announce the changes at a press conference later this week, but a "leak" developed and because of several queries, he had to confirm it early today. It had been speculated several times in recent weeks that Powers would be fired because of a dispute with NASA headquarters officials.

Powers became as familiar to the public as the astronauts he publicized during his four years as the voice of Mercury control. Since the flight of Maj. L. Gordon Cooper last May, Powers had been conspicuously absent from several celebrations tendered the astronauts.

U.S. Medical Units Aid Skopje Survivors

SKOPJE, Yugoslavia (UPI)—U.S. Army medical units, pledging to remain in Skopje as long as needed, worked today to heal the injured survivors of the wrecked city's earthquake.

Disaster workers have recovered 831 bodies and believed 700 more were still buried under the ruins caused by last Friday's pre-dawn tremor.

An American field hospital set up near here was working around the clock to care for a portion of the estimated 21,170 injured. "We will stay here as long as we are needed—no matter how long that is," Lt. Col. George Santos of Henrietta, Okla., said Tuesday night.

Santos is commander of the hospital and the 240 surgeons, nurses and medical corpsmen flown into Belgrade by the U.S. Air Force. The full field hospital, including a laboratory and X-ray equipment, was carried into this mountainous region by U.S. Army trucks and set up at Kumanovo Airport, 20 miles north of here.

The citizens of Skopje appeared impressed by the fast American help, and the skill of the medical teams has brought much favorable comment.

Yugoslav engineers threaded their way through the city's devastated streets to mark buildings for demolition.

Hopes of finding any more buried survivors has virtually vanished.

Houses to be dynamited were splashed with red paint while those to be left for repairs were daubed with green or yellow. Most of the buildings were marked red.

Once Skopje, a city of 200,000 persons, was considered a show-place for Yugoslavia's commun-

MacMillan Faces More Woes Over Philby's Defection

LONDON (UPI)—Russian confirmation that Britain's notorious "third man" defected to the Soviet Union posed another political headache for Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in the House of Commons today.

Macmillan was expected to face a new political storm despite an earlier agreement calling for no more questions in public about former British agent Harold A.R. (Kim) Philby.

Moscow confirmed Tuesday that Philby had defected to communism, asked for asylum in Russia and requested Soviet citizenship. It described him as a "leading" member of British intelligence.

On July 1 Lord Privy Seal Edward Heath identified Philby as the mysterious "third man" who had warned turncoat diplomats Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean they were under British surveillance.

Burgess and Maclean fled to the Soviet Union in 1951 after years of security service in the British Diplomatic Corps. Shortly thereafter, Philby was forced to resign because of his Communist connections.

In 1955 Macmillan, then foreign secretary, told Parliament there was no hard evidence Philby tipped off Burgess and Maclean. Later Philby was given a job on the London Observer, a Sunday newspaper, at the suggestion of the Foreign Office. He became the paper's Middle East correspondent.

Philby remained in Beirut until Jan. 25 when there were reports that he had disappeared. Heath said there was evidence he had worked for Soviet Russia before 1946, and indications he had gone behind the Iron Curtain.

In London, there were widespread press reports that Philby had been sent to the Middle East as a British agent but that actually he was a "double agent" in the employ of the Communists.

The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia, which confirmed his defection, had claimed earlier this year that Philby's job was to help the deposed Imam of Yemen regain his throne. Izvestia said at the time that Philby was in the pay of American and British intelligence.

Birch Society Sets United Nation Talk

The John Birch Society of Roseburg isn't giving up in its determination to discuss what it calls "the unfavorable side" of the United Nations.

Some weeks ago, the society challenged the Roseburg League of Women Voters to debate on the U. N. The League refused.

Roy Cottrell, a spokesman for the society, said a tentative date of Aug. 13 has been set, at which time a speaker will be booked to discuss his views of the U. N. He said it is not definite yet who the speaker will be.

"The local John Birch chapters," he said, "realizing that not everyone supports the U. N. so docilely as does the League, have decided to sponsor a program showing the other side of the U. N. Since there is so much material against the United Nations that the League does not use, it is only fair that the public have an opportunity to see this unfavorable side," he concluded.
