Couple Held In Jail Tell Intentions To Wed

EASTLAND, Tex. (UPI) — Bill Splawn, 40, and the 37-year-old woman who, with only a few stitches on, helped him escape from an Idaho jail, want to get married.

The woman is Mrs. Millie Jones. She and Splawn were arrested recently in Lewiston, Idaho, and held for Texas authorities, who wanted them on a charge of robbing a grocery in Ranger, Tex., March 8.

Several days ago Mrs. Jones, with only her panties on, slugged a jailer with a bar of soap in a shirt sleeve and freed Splawn. They fled into the street.

They confronted a motorist who was shocked by Mrs. Jones' lack of clothes that he abandoned his car and fled. They drove into the country where Mrs. Jones dressed herself by burglarizing a farmhouse.

They were captured 24 hours later. Sheriff Lee Horn and Ranger Earl Stewart later returned them to Eastland. Splawn said he will plead guilty to the grocery store robbery but he denied that Mrs. Jones had anything to do with it. He admitted she drove the getaway car, however.

Mrs. Jones said they plan an informal wedding. If there is one, it probably will be held in the Eastland County Jail.

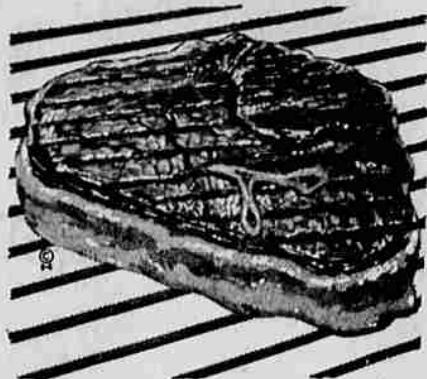

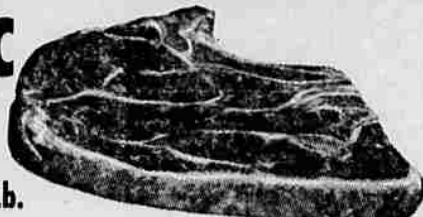

Coos Leaders Preview Weyerhaeuser Plant

COOS BAY (UPI) — Weyerhaeuser Co. Tuesday gave community leaders and news media representatives a preview of what it billed as the nation's newest high-speed, automated forest products plant.

Manager Howard Hunt said the plant here will begin production early next month with 150 employees. He said the plant cost more than \$5 million and will produce 100 million square feet of 3-8 inch plywood annually.

Ultimate plans call for 300 employees and a production of more than 200 million square feet, he said.

Plywood superintendent Bert Hammond said the main features of the plant are improved lathe design, an automatic grading line, high speed packaging, a combination high speed sawing and sanding line and a 36 - opening hot press, the largest in the industry.
