

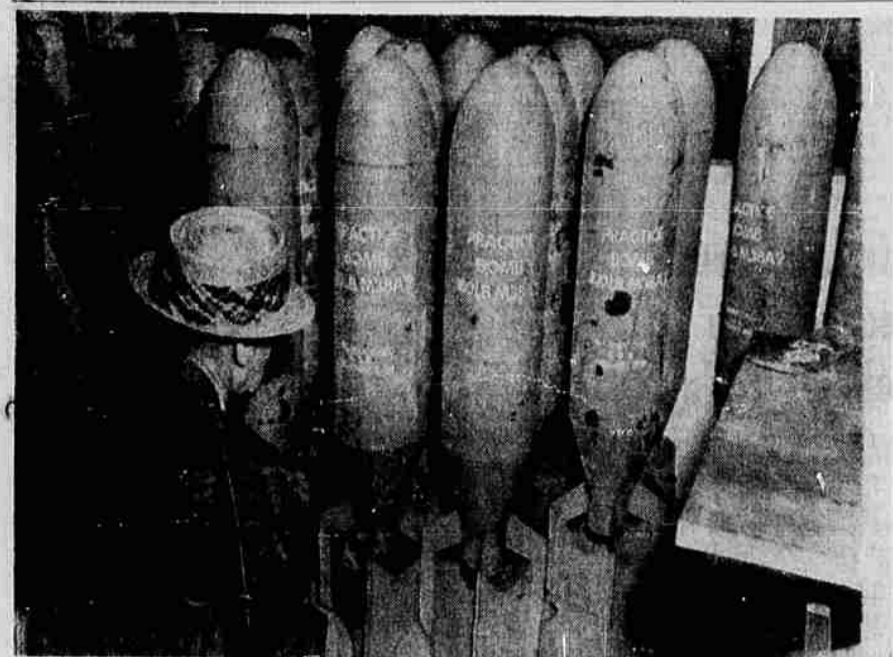

School Board Picks Architect For Fullerton School Addition

The Roseburg School Board has selected John Briscoe of Eugene as architect for a proposed four-room addition to Fullerton IV School.

The district's building program table calls for completion of additions to Fullerton IV, Fremont and Joseph Lane junior high schools prior to opening of school in the fall of 1964. These improvements will be financed from serial levy funds.

Supt. M. C. Deller at Wednesday night's school board session urged the board to make the architectural assignments now to allow ample time for planning.

Defense Head Views Security In W. Germany

BONN (UPI) — Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara flew to the edge of the Iron Curtain today to find out if the American lock on nuclear warheads earmarked for West German forces really is safe.

With West German Defense Minister Kai-uwe Von Hassel at his side, McNamara hopped to Hannover, then to Brunswick, and from there to inspect German units on the Communist border near Passau.

Hassel's army units have U.S. rockets and missiles, but American Army forces keep the nuclear warheads in their custody. McNamara was checking the devices installed to insure the warheads remain under direct U.S. control.

Before flying back to Bonn, McNamara also was inspecting the new West German standard tank at the Munsterlee proving grounds.

Korean War Defector Plans Return To His Ohio Home

HONG KONG (UPI) — An American captured during the Korean War who chose to stay behind the Bamboo Curtain returned to the West from Communist China today and said another American may be coming out soon.

Lowell D. Skinner, 32, of Akron, Ohio, a former corporal who has not seen the United States since 1950, stepped across the border into this British crown colony shortly after noon.

Strike Spread Stops After Hatfield Offer In Lumber Dispute

Spread of the Northwest lumber strike halted, at least temporarily, today after Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield offered the services of his office in helping to settle the dispute which has idled about 29,000 workers.

It appeared the respite from new strikes would be brief, however. Harvey Nelson, Region 3 president of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) indicated more walkouts were planned against the 196-member Timber Operators Council, but he declined to say when.

'63 Timber Days To Start Friday

Preparations are quickening and excitement is mounting in the city of Sutherlin as area residents go into the final stages for Sutherlin Timber Days scheduled to begin Friday.

The big three-day event will get underway in the evening with the queen's coronation ball at the American Legion Hall. Six girls are competing for the Timber days crown.

U.S. Signers Leave Friday For Moscow

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy is expected to emphasize anew today his hope for overwhelming congressional and public support of the nuclear test ban to be signed in Moscow next week.

The President scheduled a news conference for 4 p.m. EDT, which could serve as a forum for his new appeal. The conference was being televised and broadcast live to the nation.

Kennedy was believed ready to give some indication of U.S. reaction to the attitude of French President Charles de Gaulle, who has declined to sign the pact and plans to continue his test program.

Clarification Unlikely
It was considered unlikely, however, that the President would clarify in any great detail the question of whether the United States was prepared to assist France with information and weapons if the French keep their experiments underground.

Under Secretary of State W. Averell Harriman said Wednesday the President could be expected to give some observation on the French attitude toward nuclear testing. The President was understood, to be wary of taking too definite a position pending further study.

Harriman pumped more steam into the administration drive for test ban approval by asserting that the United States would "lose our leadership of the world" if the Senate failed to ratify the ban on air, space and underwater tests.

Announced Delegation
The delegation includes Democratic Sen. J.W. Fulbright, ex-Officer; Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn.; John O. Pastore, R.I.; and John Sparkman, Ala.; and Republicans Everett Stalton, Mass., and George Aiken, Vt.

Others are United Nations Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson; Disarmament Agency Director William C. Foster; Chairman Glenn Seaborg of the Atomic Energy Commission; Lewellyn Thompson, former ambassador to Moscow and now a top adviser to Rusk; and Arthur Dean, former head of the U.S. delegation to the Geneva disarmament negotiations.

Khrushchev To Attend Signing Of Treaty

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will attend Monday's signing of the partial nuclear test ban treaty and take personal command of high level talks with the United States and Britain, it was learned today.

Informed sources said Khrushchev changed his vacation plans in order to take a personal hand in the treaty signing ceremony and the discussions that will follow with Secretary of State Dean Rusk and British Foreign Secretary Lord Home.

Khrushchev had been scheduled to leave for his Black Sea retreat today and relax for at least two weeks before making a journey to Yugoslavia on Aug. 20.

It was officially announced, meanwhile, that Rusk has accepted Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko's invitation to remain here for three or four days after the ceremonial treaty signing Monday. Lord Home similarly is expected to stay for the three-way talks.
