

Traffic Violation Convictions Up

Oregon courts reported more than 123,000 traffic violation convictions to the Department of Motor Vehicles during the first six months of this year. The figure represents an increase of more than six per cent over the same period a year ago.

During the period, the department ordered 21,198 driver license suspensions — 18,652 under mandatory provisions of the law and 2,546 under discretionary authority given to the licensing agency.

Suspensions vary in length ranging from 30 days up to several years. Most suspensions are ordered only until drivers comply with the state's financial responsibility law.

The department said that mandatory suspensions included 1,224 for convictions of driving under the influence of liquor. The bulk of these were 90 day suspensions, based on a first conviction on the charge, but 189 were for one year based on a second conviction, and 84 suspensions were given to third-time offenders. The latter are suspended for three years.

Insurance Protects Much Of Nation's Farm Investments

On The Farm Front (Reg. U.S. Pat. Off.) By W. L. P. GOODWIN United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department said recently more than \$470 million of farm production investments in 1962 are protected by federal crop insurance.

John N. Luit, manager of the Federal Crop Insurance Corp. (FCIC), said the protection total this year is the highest in the 25-year history of federal crop insurance.

Luit estimated premium costs to the policy holders for this protection would total about \$28 million.

Federal crop insurance this year covers about 420,000 crops on 13 million acres against production loss from natural hazards. This is a sharp increase from the 37,000 crops and nearly 2.5 million acres under the insurance program in 1962. The protection afforded in 1962 was \$258 million.

"As crop insurance expands by its legislative limit of 100 counties and three new crops a year," Luit said, "and as improved management, program training, and information practices begin to take effect, we expect to increase this basic protection to a billion dollars within the next five years."

Federal crop insurance now is available in 1,066 counties in 28 states. The protection will become available in 100 more counties for the 1964 crop year.

Federal crop insurance is a voluntary, self-help service offering the farmer protection of his crop investment against loss from all natural hazards to most of the 20 crops on which the insurance is available. Some specialty crops such as citrus, raisins, cherries, and peaches, are insured only against loss from natural causes such as freeze and wind damage. The service operates like any other insurance plan, with farmers paying yearly premiums based on local crop production and loss history and with payments for loss being paid from this premium fund.

The Agriculture Department announced Tuesday that Japan now is free of rinderpest and foot-and-mouth disease and is eligible to export meat to the United States. Department officials said only limited amounts of specialty meats are expected to be imported.

The declaration that Japan is free of the livestock diseases makes it possible for that country to be added to the list from which meat, meat food products, and meat byproducts may be imported into the United States under the federal meat inspection regulations.

World production of oranges in 1962 (from the bloom of 1962) was slightly more than 263 million boxes, according to the Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS). This was 48 million boxes below the large crop of 411 million boxes of 1962.

Almost all of the decline in world orange production was in the United States which had the smallest orange crop since 1948. Freezing weather which damaged fruit and trees was responsible for the decline in U.S. production.

FAS said 1962 production of sunflower seed was record high — 745 million short tons.

The Soviet Union is the largest producer of sunflower seed, turning out in 1962 some 4.83 million tons. Other heavy producers in 1962 included Argentina, 948,000 short tons; Bulgaria, 311,000 short tons; Rumania, 250,000 short tons; and Yugoslavia, 150,000 short tons.

The United States did not produce a measurable total of sunflower seed.
