

NY Giant Offense Dominates Action In Pro Grid Camp

Joe Morrison, the New York Giant's 25-year-old handyman, broke through the Giant defense for a 35-yard touchdown sprint as the offense dominated the controlled scrimmage for the first time since camp opened.

The Cleveland Browns, still intent on building a "big-back" offense patented after Green Bay, worked on backfield blocking Wednesday. Coach Blanton Collier was particularly pleased with the blocking of Jim Brown, which he called "exceptional" and that of newly acquired Mel Triplett.

The Detroit Lions solved a big headache when they finally signed All-Pro middle linebacker Joe Schmidt along with John Gory. Only two more Lions, Sam Williams and Gail Cogdill, are not signed.

Dennis Harmon, a defensive back from the Chicago Bears' camp Wednesday to return to Southern Illinois University for his degree, Harmon, the Bears' eighth draft choice this year, has decided to stay out of pro football "for a while."

Stehouwer Injured
Guard Ron Stehouwer was the only Pittsburgh casualty in the Steelers' controlled scrimmage. Stehouwer twisted his knee, but is expected to return within a few days.

Coach Bill McPeak of the Washington Redskins took a long look at rookie defensive linemen Ron Snidow and Dave Nickson and liked what he saw in the Skins' first scrimmage, while a coach Wally Lemm also sent his St. Louis Cardinals through their first full scale scrimmage.

In the Baltimore Colt workouts, star quarterback Johnny Unitas was once again firing long passes to Lenny Moore, although the signal-caller had not thrown a pass during the past two days.

The San Francisco Forty-Niners concentrated on sprints with the speeding honors going to half-back Dale Messer and end Bernie Casey. Guard Bruce Bosley, who injured his leg on Saturday, will probably be out of action for 10 more days.

Billy Joe Moody, a rookie defensive halfback from Arkansas, became the third player to quit the Los Angeles Ram camp on his own Wednesday.

The Dallas Cowboys, who play the Rams in the first exhibition till for both teams next Thursday, concentrated on their passing attack with ends Billy Howton and Lee Folkins making fine catches.

To Start Rookies
In American Football League developments, the Denver Broncos plan to start three rookies in the starting backfield in Saturday night's exhibition tussle with the Houston Oilers, but the Oilers, adopting a "stay put" attitude, will start old pro George Blanda at quarterback along with veterans Billy Cannon and Charlie Hennigan.

The Buffalo Bills defense, led by defensive ends Ken Rice and Jim Moss, smashed the offense and ruined the passing accuracy of quarterbacks Warren Rabb and Mance Wheeler.

The Boston Patriots, preparing for Sunday's exhibition game with the Oakland Raiders, returned to work Wednesday after a one-day vacation. The Pats leave Saturday for the West Coast. Meanwhile, the Raiders ran through their last scrimmage before Sunday's game, and gained confidence with the return of veteran quarterback Tom Flores who had been sidelined for a week.

Dan Ficca, whom the New York Jets acquired in a trade for Bob Mischak, reported to the club Wednesday after being released from the service.

Roseburg Bees Batters Hit At Good Clip During Year

Five of the regular starters for the Roseburg Legion Bees wound up the season with batting averages of more than .300, a final tabulation of the Bees' season records showed.

Outfielder Ray Sheppard went three for nine in the Bees final three games to boost his batting average to .359 and capture the team batting honors among the regulars. Jim Coon, another member of the Bees' outfield, went three for seven in the final outings to jump into second place with an even .350 average.

Lone Home Run
The long-ball honors went to outfielder-catcher Chuck Dornisite, who blasted out the team's only home run of the season. Dornisite missed the .300 mark by just a shade, as he went 7 for 25 for a .280 average. Another who missed by just a shade was shortstop Danny Withers, who hit .283 for the year.

The outlook is bright for the Lockwood Motors teams of the coming year as far as outfielders are concerned. The third member of the Bees' front-line outfield, Chuck Person, a speedster from Douglas, wound up with a .340 batting average for the season.

This puts a sparkling .349 batting average in the starting outfield.

Others At .300
First baseman Stan Young from Glite rapped out 11 hits in 34 at bat to end the season with a .343 batting average. Catcher Gary Heeter went three for nine in the final series to boost his average to .300.

Others above the .300 mark at the end of the year were Davidson at .300, Pat Long at .364, and Dave Fenner, Bill King and Rian Brown at .333.

Hubbard Was Workhorse
Rusty Hubbard was the workhorse of the Bees pitching staff, as he appeared in 35 1/3 innings and ended up with a 4-1 record.

Hubbard gave up 12 runs on 30 hits, while striking out 50 and walking 19. Pete Woodworth ended up with a 2-9 record and Sheppard put in one appearance on the mound and claimed a victory. Pat Long ended up 2-2 and Doug Matson 1-1 for the season.

The Bees ended up with a 10 won and four lost record for the season, which coach Jerry Droscher said he felt was a fine showing. The Bees got a late start and stepped into some tough competition, but made a fine overall showing for the season.

LA Dodgers' Lead Helped As Giants Lose 7-3 To Phillies

The Los Angeles Dodgers were back in the "cat bird seat" today because the bubble burst for the San Francisco Giants and poor Roger Craig can't win for losing.

The Dodgers made the most of six hits Wednesday night to beat Craig and the New York Mets, 5-3, while the Philadelphia Phillies snapped the Giants' nine-game winning streak with a 14-inning 7-3 victory.

It was Craig's 17th straight defeat -- one short of the National League record set by Clifton Curtis of the old Boston Braves in 1910.

A walk, a single by Ron Fairly, a triple by John Roseboro and a sacrifice fly by Willie Davis in the second inning accounted for three Los Angeles runs and two more singles, an error by New York second baseman Ron Hunt plus a wild pitch by Craig scored two more in the fourth inning. That proved more than enough as Pete Richert, Ken Rowe and Ron Perranoski held the Mets off to nail down the victory.

Combined with the Giants' loss to the Phils, it restored the Dodgers' first-place lead to 4 1/2 games.

Marichal Knocked Out
Juan Marichal was cruising along with a 3-0 lead when the Phils scored a run in the eighth and then chased him with two more in the ninth.

In the 14th the roof fell in for the Giants. Bob Oldis led off with a single off reliever Bob Bolin and then Johnny Callison unloaded a two-run homer to wrap it up.

The third-place Cardinals also lost ground, slipping to five games off the pace, when they dropped a 9-2 decision to the Cincinnati Reds. In the other NL games, the Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Houston Colts, 6-3, and the Chicago Cubs nipped the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2.

In the American League, the New York Yankees beat the Kansas City A's, 3-2; the Minnesota Sox, 9-5; the Chicago White Sox subdued the Washington Senators, 5-2; the Baltimore Orioles nipped the Detroit Tigers, 2-1, and the Cleveland Indians swept the Los Angeles Angels, 1-0 and 9-5.

O'Toole Won 14th
Jim O'Toole spaced seven hits in gaining his 14th victory against nine defeats. The Reds made it easy for him to snap a personal six-game losing streak by hopping on Bob Gibson for six runs in the first three innings. Pete Rose, Frank Robinson and Mar-

Whitfield Grand Slamed
Whitfield was nicked for 11 hits, including homers by Lee Thomas and Leon Wagner, but the Indians hit six. Fred Whitfield connected for a grand slam in the third inning and his sixth inning homer in the open broke open a scoreless duel between Barry Latman and Fred Newman.

The Yankees stayed eight games in front with a 3-2 win over the Athletics while the second place White Sox tripped the Senators, 5-2. The Orioles defeated the Tigers, 2-1, and the Twins downed the Red Sox, 9-5.

In the National League, Philadelphia upended San Francisco with a 14-inning 7-3 victory. Chicago beat Milwaukee, 3-2. Cincinnati stopped St. Louis, 9-2. Pittsburgh defeated Houston, 6-3, and Los Angeles increased its lead to 4 1/2 games with a 5-3 triumph over the Mets.

Herbert Won 10th
Jim Landis and Camilo Carro collected three hits apiece for the White Sox as Ray Herbert gained his 10th victory by holding the Senators to seven hits in eight innings. Hoyt Wilhelm finished up. Don Zimmer homered for Washington.

Southpaw Steve Barber outduelled Frank Lary in Baltimore's victory over Detroit. Al Smith singled home the winning run in the first inning to hand Lary his fifth setback in six decisions. Barber, whose record now is 14-8, allowed six hits and the only run off him was unearned.

The Twins bombed the Red Sox' prize relievers, Jack Lamabe and Dick Radatz, for five runs in the seventh inning to break a 4-4 tie. Jimmie Hall's 14th homer with two on was the big blow during the rally. Bob Allison had hammered his 24th homer earlier in the contest. Dick Stuart hit his 23rd for
