

South Douglas 9 Ends 4th In Babe Ruth Play

Madison of Portland ousted the South Douglas All-Stars from contention in the state Babe Ruth Baseball Tournament at The Dalles with a hard-fought 7-4 victory Saturday.

The Myrtle Creek crew fell behind in the early innings, then all but caught up with the leaders with several late inning rallies.

The loss gave South Douglas a 2-2 record and fourth place in the nine-team tourney. Madison was

eliminated by Jefferson of Portland, who in turn lost out in the finals to a powerful Klamath Falls team.

With the game tied at 1-all, Madison rallied for three runs in the bottom of the third inning to move out in front to stay. The rally came on two walks, two South Douglas miscues and two sacrifices.

Myrtle Creek bounced back with a two-run explosion in the top of the fifth. Alvie Hendricks was safe on an error and Dennis Birenbaum singled. Both runners continued around to score on Vern Walker's base rap.

In the sixth inning the local champs had the bases loaded, one run in and two away when Steve Gordon hit a soft liner at the shortstop. Two runners crossed the plate as the ball bounced before the fielder could get to the ball, but Gordon was called out at first nullifying the rallies.

Bill See went the distance for South Douglas, striking out three and walking four. Dave Arthur tossed the win for defending champion Madison as he struck out nine and walked three. The winners collected 10 hits, while Myrtle Creek banded out a total of seven.

Klamath Falls posted a 5-3 victory over Jefferson in the finals to capture the state crown Sunday. The Southern Oregon team romped through the tourney in four games without suffering a setback.

Bob Moore tossed a nifty six hitter for the win, while Kim Badley and Rick Brostehous each collected two hits for Klamath Falls in the final contest.

Klamath Falls will go on to represent Oregon in the Western Regionals to be held at Kellogg Idaho next week.

Tiger-Fulmer Set For Title Fight Saturday

NEW YORK (UPI)—Champion Dick Tiger and ex-champ Gene Fulmer will have their third middleweight title fight Saturday night at Ibadan, Nigeria, in the week's most important boxing show.

Also on Saturday night, welterweight champion Emile Griffith seeks action, but in a non-title nationally televised 10-rounder with veteran Holly Mims, a middleweight contender, at Saratoga Springs, N.Y.

For Nigeria's first world championship fight, stocky Tiger of Nigeria is favored at 7-2 to beat bull-shouldered Fulmer of West Jordan, Utah, before a sellout 45,000 at Ibadan's Liberty Stadium.

In their two previous title bouts Tiger won the 160-pound crown from Gene on a decision at San Francisco, Calif., last Oct. 23; but the Tiger was hard-pressed to keep the title on a draw at Las Vegas, Nev., last Feb. 23.

For the Griffith-Mims television (ABC) bout at Saratoga Springs, New York, Griffith, king of the 147-pounders, is favored at 11-3 to whip the 34-year-old contender among the 160-pounders.

Members of the State team, coached by Fred Spiegelberg of Medford, and the Metropolitan squad, coached by Bob Hull of Jefferson, reported to their training camps at University of Portland and Lewis and Clark College Sunday.

Guard Andy Graham of Grants Pass failed to show up and was replaced by South Eugene guard Tim Warlick.

The 27-member squads were given physical examinations and issued equipment. The players also had their pictures taken and had lunch together at the Multnomah Athletic Club.

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A three-hit gem was turned in by Jack Aker as Portland downed Hawaii after the Islanders won the opener. In the first tilt both clubs collected six hits with Mike Lee gaining the victory and Jose Santiago getting the loss.

Tacoma halted its losing streak at seven when Bob Garibaldi fired a three-hitter against Oklahoma City in the nightcap of the twin bill.

Denver won its fourth straight on Steve Demeter's two run home run as Pat House picked up his first victory against one loss. In the opener with Salt Lake, Demeter also tripled, driving in another run in the fourth. 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Lumberjills Upset Dairy Maids To Capture 3rd In A Tourney

Roseburg's Lumberjills pulled off the upset of the state women's softball tournament at Salem by nipping the Rogue Valley Dairy Maids of Eagle Point, 5-4, in a second round thriller.

The victory over the Dairy Maids gave the local girls third place in the A tourney to go along with their B state title captured earlier in the season at Salem.

In the opening round of action the Lumberjills were on the wrong end of a no-litter pitched by Nancy Wellborn of the Eugene McCulloch Chain Saw team. The Jills lost their opener 10-0 as nine miscues contributed heavily in the downfall.

While Eugene was topping Roseburg, the Salem Shamrocks edged the Dairy Maids, 1-0.

Battling for their lives, the Lumberjills stayed alive in the tournament by eliminating the powerful Dairy Maids Saturday.

Roseburg took the lead in the bottom of the first as Cheryl McCoy drew a base on balls and scored on Joanne Davenport's two-out single.

The Dairy Maids picked up two runs in the third on two walks, an error and a single.

However, the Jills bounced right back with three counters in the bottom of the inning. Miss McCoy, Nancy Crenshaw and Judy Zeigler drew free passes to load the bases setting the scene for Miss Davenport. The hard-hitting Roseburg outfielder drilled a double to deep centerfield to clear the bases.

In the sixth inning the Dairy Maids added two more runs to tie

the score, and had the go-ahead run cut down at the plate when centerfielder Joan Heeter threw a strike to Miss Crenshaw.

Southbay Brenda Solnicka came on in relief in the seventh and held the Dairy Maids scoreless to set up the action packed finale.

With two away in the bottom of the seventh three walks loaded the bases, then four straight balls to Rexi Nicholson forced Miss Zeigler across the plate with the winning run.

The victory sent the Roseburg girls into the semifinals outing—again facing the McCulloch Chain Saw Team of Eugene. Misses Wellborn and Solnicka pitched scoreless ball for the first four innings for their respective teams.

However, the Jills weakened in the fifth as consecutive singles by Eugene's Pat Lewis and Carrol Hart and an unsuccessful fielder's choice left the bases jammed.

Kathy Applegate then blasted a triple to deep center to drive in three runs.

The Lumberjills scored a single run in the bottom of the inning on a walk, singles by Miss Nichol-

son and Jean Sork and a sacrifice fly by Sue Weber. Eugene scored an insurance tally in the seventh to post a 4-1 decision and earn the right to face Salem in the finals.

Salem pitcher Pearl Pinion was selected as the outstanding chucker of the tournament and Jane Lannell, another Salem player, was picked as the outstanding player and led the batters with a .555 series.

Miss Heeter was selected to an outfield spot on the all-star team which was dominated by Salem players.

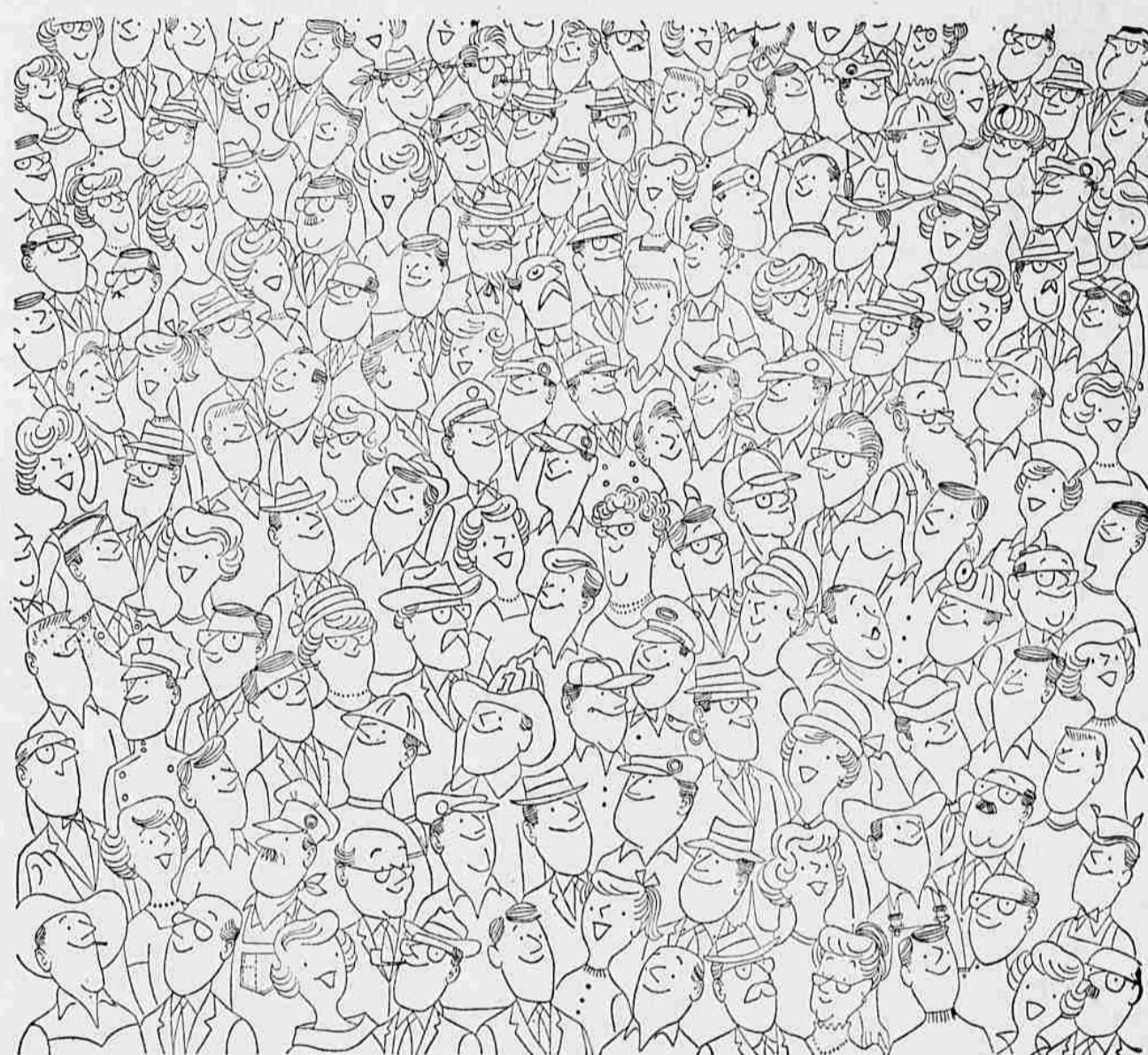
