

# Colts Nip SF Giants, 6-5, To Pad LA's League Lead

Many major leaguers who are traded come back to haunt their old club—but not Carl Warwick. The only regular in the majors who bats right and throws left did his old Los Angeles Dodger teammates a big favor Monday night when he sparked the Houston Colts to a 6-5 comeback victory over the San Francisco Giants.

It was a tough setback for the Giants, who had hoped to pick up ground on the ill Dodgers. Instead, Al Dark's men dropped five games off the pace and into a second-place tie with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Warwick, who broke into the majors with the Dodgers in 1961 before moving on to St. Louis and then Houston, knocked in the Colts' winning run with a line single that capped a two-run rally in the bottom of the ninth.

It was the third time the Colts had come from behind in the game—the only one scheduled in the majors Monday. The Giants had tied the score at four all in the eighth with the help of Willie McCovey's 33rd home run of the season and went ahead in the top of the ninth on another solo blast by Willie Mays, his 28th of the campaign.

John Marichal of the Giants and Houston's Don Nottbart—a pair of no-hit pitchers—dueled through the first seven innings but neither figured in the decision.

Hal Woodeshiek, who relieved Nottbart in the eighth, gained his ninth victory against six defeats and Jack Fisher (6-8) was the loser.

The Dodgers resume their road trip today at Chicago, where they open a three-game set against the Cubs. Last season, Walt Alston's men lost only four of 18 games to Chicago. They haven't found the Cubs such pushovers this season, posting eight victories in 13 games.

The New York Yankees, riding along with a 1½ game lead in the American League, open a two-week road trip tonight with a doubleheader against the Washington Senators. August was a bad month for the Yankees last season when their pitching collapsed and they finished the month with a 17-18 record.

# Cool Dealt First Loss In 10-Inning Thriller

"Down, but not out" was the cry of Roseburg fans Monday after Keith Lampard turned in a spectacular one-man show to put Sargent Construction (Madison) of Portland in the lead for the state American Legion baseball crown.

Lampard's brilliant pitching and timely hitting provided the invaders of Legion Field with a 2-0 10-inning triumph over the defending champion Lockwood Motors in the opening game of the best-of-five series.

As soon as the dust had settled the local fans began planning tonight's assault when the two teams square off in the second game of the state finals. Coach Bill Harper has named Dick Williams (11-2) as his starter on the mound tonight, while Bill Witala stated that either Fred Lambert (1-1) or Steve Chamberlain (5-2) would handle the pitching for Sargent Construction.

Ran Cool, Roseburg's ace southpaw, locked horns with the talented Portland hurler in the heart-stopping opener. Cool was handed his first loss in 14 decisions when two unearned runs crossed the plate in the top of the 10th.

In going down to defeat for the first time this season, Cool turned in a topnotch performance. The flashy Drain lefty whiffed 11 opponents, issued but two walks and was tagged for seven hits.

Lampard came through with flying colors for the winners as he handeuffed all but Mike Blomberg and Dave Sevall throughout the entire 10 innings. The fire-balling right-hander was credited with 10 strikeouts and walked but one batter. The potent Roseburg batting attack managed to collect just three hits.

After walking the lead-off batter in the first inning, Lampard took control of the game. Roseburg's next base runner was in the sixth after the determined Madison star had retired 17 batters in a row. Blomberg broke the string and ruined the bid for a no-hitter by slapping a single into left field.

In addition to his brilliant pitching, Lampard provided Sargent Construction with its two runs in the 10th frame when he drilled a single between first and second bases with runners parked at second and third as the result of two Roseburg miscues.

After missing a golden opportunity in the bottom of the ninth, Lockwood's ran into fielding troubles in the 10th. Phil Bushman attempted to hunt for a hit as the lead-off batter for Madison in the final stanza and reached second when the throw from third baseman Jerry Boucock got through Sevall at first. Dave Schacher drilled a grounder at shortstop Artie McDonald who threw out of reach of the first baseman as Bushman raced to third and the batter ended at second.

The two errors set the scene for Lampard's sharp ground single into right field.

Roseburg's big break in the game came in the bottom of the ninth when Blomberg led off the inning with a sizzling triple to deep right-center. However, Blomberg died at third as the meat of the batting order went down swinging. McDonald, Bob Manning and Jim Beamer followed Blomberg to the plate and couldn't find the range on the offerings of Lampard.

Sargent Construction missed several scoring opportunities ear-

ly in the game, with the lead-off batter getting on base in five of the first six innings. Four times the first batter reached third before the fire could be doused.

Blomberg and Sevall accounted for all Lockwood's base runners. Blomberg had two of the three hits off Lampard, and also drew the only free pass. Sevall was on base twice — once on a hit and once on the lone Madison error.

Butch Lindblad and Ron Lucas each blasted two hits for Sargent Construction. Lindblad was credited with a two-bagger in the second inning when his high fly was lost in the right field lights, then singled in the ninth. Lucas picked up singles in the sixth and eighth innings.

While the pitchers stole the spotlight from the hitters, a certain amount of glory still went to the fielders. Among the top fielding gems of the evening was Boucock's stab of Lucas' line shot towards left field in the third frame. The spectacular grab came with one away and Schacher parked on third base.

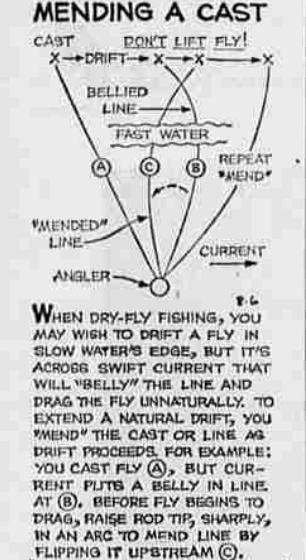

## Bug Invasion Could Damage Deer Ranges

An extensive caterpillar invasion of sage lands in eastern Oregon is being viewed with alarm by the game commission, Phil Schneider, state game director, advised today.

Any substantial loss of sage from this insect pest would be extremely detrimental to deer, antelope and sage grouse, Schneider said, and would be particularly acute on winter ranges where sage forms an important part of the diet of these game birds and animals.

According to Miles Langdon, range specialist for the game commission, the culprit is a small moth larva which has infested nearly 100 per cent of all species of sage in southeastern, central and parts of northeastern Oregon.

Langdon reported the larva, about ¼ of an inch long, rolls a few leaves into a ball, apparently for a house, and feeds on the leaves and along the stem. The infestation is rather inconspicuous in its early stages, but quickly erupts to the acute stage. Severely infested plants have a brownish-yellowish appearance and are literally crawling with the larva, Langdon reported. Final effect on the plants has not been determined, but on a similar small scale observed last year in Lake county, defoliation in some instances was sufficient to kill the plants.

According to Schneider, an inspection by range specialists in Harney county revealed that all sage lands in the county have the infestation. Areas at the elevation of Burns show sage heavily infested. At higher elevations in the Steens and Stinking Water mountains infestation appears lighter but is affecting nearly all sage plants.

Similar conditions were found in Malheur County, Schneider said. In the vicinity of Burns Junction, Rome, Jordan Valley, and the Whitehorse and Mahogany mountains infestation ranged from complete defoliation at the lower elevations to light contamination at the mountain tops. Bend, Brothers, Prineville, Mitchell, John Day and Columbia Basin sage lands show varying degrees of larval infestation. California and Nevada are also experiencing this outbreak.

Schneider advised that at present entomologists know very little about the moth larva causing the damage. Until recently it has gone unnoticed and its identity is still not positive. Extension Service entomologists at Oregon State University are gathering information, and collections of larva are being made in several counties. Schneider said the U. S. Department of Agriculture has been asked to coordinate the work on this insect to determine its life history, effect on wildlife resources, and control methods.

## Famed 'Shotgun' Formation Missing With Kilmer's Loss

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The "shotgun" formation, once one of the most feared weapons in professional football, is a gone proposition, coach Red Hickey of the San Francisco Forty Niners said today.

Hickey, trying to put together a winning combination for the 1963 National Football League campaign, says he just doesn't have the right talent for the spread formation.

"You need special personnel to fit the shotgun formation," says Red. "And we haven't got that. When Bill Kilmer was hurt and became unavailable for competition this year, then we lost the trigger for our shotgun."

The loss of Kilmer has been a severe blow to the hopes of the

## Forty Niners this year, but Hickey still is optimistic about the season.

"We are going to have good speed in the backfield," he says. "And most of our fellows reported to camp in very good shape. That helped."

"Our biggest weakness last year was in tackling and pass protection. That's where we have to improve this year."

Five men have just reported from the all-star game: end Hugh Campbell of Washington State; back Kermit Alexander, UCLA; tackle Charley Slemnick, Penn State; tackle Walter Rock, Maryland; and lineman Floyd Dean of Florida.

"I haven't seen much of this boy Campbell yet," says Hickey. "But I'm very anxious to get a good look. I hear that he can't run when he gets the ball; that he is slow, but that he can catch a ball thrown anywhere near him."

"But I note that he was the outstanding player in two All-star games; and he did a lot of scoring for Washington State. And that's what we want — scores."

Hickey had been planning on Alexander as one of his top ball packers this year. But Alexander, who has terrific speed, also is a standout defensive back.

Then along comes a lad named Don Lisbon, a 190-pounder from Bowling Green, who has been just short of sensational in lugging the leather during practice sessions.

"It has made me think twice about the possibilities of using Alexander on defense," admits Hickey.

Another rookie in camp who has been shaking up the defense is Mike Lind, drafted last year from Notre Dame, but unable to play in 1962 due to injuries. Lind is a powerful runner and follows his interference well. He also is the slowest back in the clockings.

"But we'll try everybody out to see who has the most," says Hickey. "And we'll have to do it in the exhibition games."

"Shucks, there was a time when I used to play and was an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Rams that we could look at a schedule and figure five games out to see who has the most," says Hickey. "And we would hope to pick up two or three more to win a title."

"Those days are gone, now. The league is more evenly balanced. Your can't count on a single game that is a cinch. Green Bay still is the team to beat. But every city has a potential winner."
