Effectiveness Of Negro Voter Registration Drive Is Mystery

What It Means

One of the great political mysteries of the day is how effective the Negro voter registration drive will be between now and election day next year.

The registration campaign, while mostly unopposed, is being pushed with quiet determination. Following virtually all major racial demonstrations this year, it has been announced by Negro leaders that the program would continue in the form of voter registration.

Such an announcement was made in Birmingham, Ala., last May following demonstration of near riot proportions. Some of the results are beginning to come to light.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who led the Birmingham civil rights drive announced recently that 2,000 Negroes have been added to the voter rolls in six weeks, bringing the city's voting Negroes to about 14,000.

Used Same Figures

The Justice Department used the same figures Wednesday to show how far behind are Birmingham Negroes in voting status. In a suit demanding the government noted that of 116,100 Negroes eligible to vote only 14,000 are registered. There are 120,600
