In "My Giants" Russ Hodges, well-known sportscaster, writes of his relations with sponsors, agencies, other announcers, of his great moments and his bloopers in more than 30 years of broadcasting. But first and last, this is the story of the Giants, for their story is very much the story of Russ Hodges.

This year starts his 15th season as the voice of the Giants, years that started in New York and are now continuing in San Francisco.

"I don't believe it—I do not believe it!" This was Hodges' cry over the home run that gave the Giants the 1951 pennant. He was there, too, when Willie Mays made his miracle catch in the 1954 World Series.

He has known intimately all the Giant greats of modern times and has opinions and anecdotes, both sad and funny, of Stoneham, Ruchocher, Mays and many more. He was one of the first to know that the Giants would make their his-

toric move from New York to San Francisco, and his locker-room program after their last game at the Polo Grounds has become a broadcast classic.

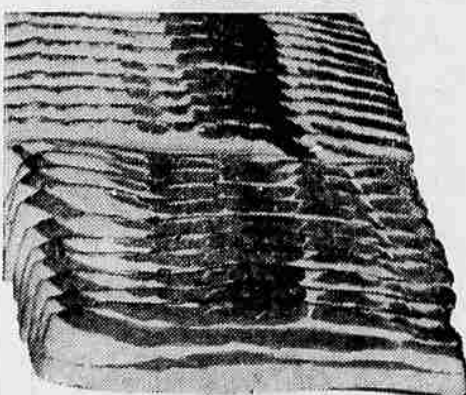

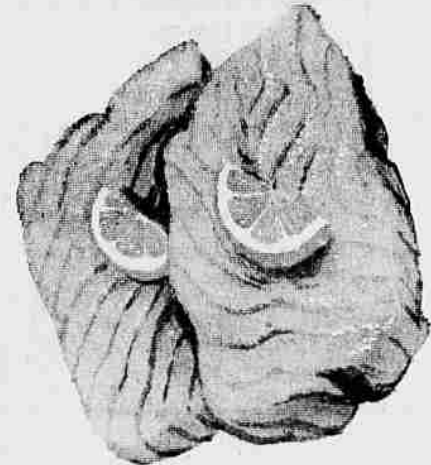
