Dual Satellite Shot Scheduled

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The space agency said recently it will try to launch two satellites with one rocket late this year to measure the effect of incoming radiation on the earth's atmosphere.

The satellites will be launched into near-orbital orbits by a three-stage solid-fuel Scout rocket from the Pacific Coast missile range. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) said.

"It will be the first attempt to measure air densities by a polar orbiting satellite."

"It will be the first attempt to use Scout to place two satellites into orbit at the same time."

The military has staged multiple single-shot launches before but with different rockets for different purposes.

One of the spacecraft in the Scout launch will be a radiation-measuring payload provided by the State University of Iowa.

The other will be a 12-foot polka dot sphere, initiated in space, which will measure air densities at orbital altitudes. The polka dots are special materials designed to contrast the sphere's temperature. Scientists have evidence that particle radiation from space heats the upper atmosphere, causing it on occasion to rise to higher altitudes than it would otherwise reach. Some authorities believe variations in the stream of radiation may influence the earth's weather.
