Watermelons, Cantaloupes Good Buys In Marketplace

Among the best buys in markets now are watermelons and cantaloupes, but the market is described as only "easy."

The California fields are providing top quality melons of both varieties at reasonable prices.

As yet, most of the other produce items are coming from out of state or from the Portland area.

White Rose, Early Gem and russet potatoes of good quality are coming from Wapato and Bruce, Wash. Carrots, turnips and yams are being brought in from Baker, field and Salinas. Some turnips are starting to come from Portland.

Nyssa, Ore., and Idaho are expected to get into the onion market, as the stocks from Walla Walla, Wash., peter out. These will include, reds, whites and yellows. Some high quality small yellow bullheads are starting to come into the area.

Green onions and radishes of good quality and steady price are arriving from Portland and California. Portland is still also providing some lettuce, but the best quality lettuce is coming from Salinas.

Cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and celery of high quality are coming from California. The small amount of cabbage coming from Portland is only fair in quality.

Snap beans and corn from the Douglas County area are starting to show in local markets. Beans are coming in fast, while corn is just making its first appearance. The county is also supplying produce counters with some top quality zucchini and yellow squash.

Another local vegetable coming on is the cucumber. The Wapato, Wash., supply is about through, but Portland is sending in quite a few.

Peppers from Douglas County fields are expected to start making their first appearances soon.

Ranch Ramblings

Starting next Wednesday, Aug. 14, the 1963 edition of our Douglas County Fair will get under way at the Fairgrounds here in Roseburg.

Douglas County is extremely proud of the fair that we have, and I am sure that it is one of the best fairs in Oregon. I would encourage all of you to support your Douglas County Fair in 1963.

There are a wide variety of things that will be of interest to everyone, and it is a chance to see some of the fine products that we produce. There appears to be more open-class livestock entered at the fair this year than there has been in past years. Encouragement along this line is helping to get more stock here. This gives the ranchers a better chance to see what some of the really good stock looks like, and we would encourage you to come in and look at it and take home the best information you can about quality of the type of stock that you are raising or are interested in.

Contests Interesting
Of course the highlight of the fair is the Junior Division. Some of the most interesting contests take place in 4-H. It is always very interesting to watch the showmanship classes and to see how the different 4-H members conduct themselves when they are being judged with their animal. The fair is the high point of the year for all of these club members, for this is the culmination of their work in preparing an animal and taking care of it.

Also of interest are the contests in cooking and sewing and of course the demonstrations that are put on by the club members. All in all there is an awful lot to see and I hope that everyone gets a chance to go out and see the fair.

Just prior to the fair, on Saturday, Aug. 10, the Oregon Corral Association will be holding a ram sale at the Fairgrounds, in the park area. Anyone interested in Corral Association should attend. These rams should be good quality rams and should do a good job for you.

Heat Important
Most sheepmen should know, and probably do, that rams are more susceptible to heat in relation to fertility than any other male farm animal. If your ram gets too warm he temporarily becomes sterile. Consequently, if you have much wool on rams at this time of year it is a real good idea to shear. This can make a big difference in the earliness or lateness of your lamb crop and also how much it might be strung out.

Your lamb crop next spring may depend on how well your ewes are fed at this time of year. Perhaps a little addition of oats, handed to the ewes at about a quarter to a half pound a day could make a big difference in the lamb crop that you have. Any method of feeding with an improving feed program should help in getting a better lamb crop. This also should help to group the lambs into a shorter lambing period.

This can be affected by how much range the rams have to travel over to service the ewes. If it is possible to confine your ewes in a fairly small pasture for the first two weeks or so of breeding season, on good feed, you may

end up getting a better job done than if they are running over a hundred acres up on the mountain.

Increase Rams
If you are not able to confine the sheep to a small area, then perhaps the answer is more rams. Normally, we recommend a bout three rams to the hundred for good breeding, but if you are on a real rough range it certainly wouldn't hurt to put in an extra one or two. This could mean money in your pocket next spring when you get ready to sell the lambs. If they are late, they may never make fat lambs by the time the main fat lamb market ends and by the time the feed dries up.

As fall approaches, perhaps you should think about controlling grubs in your cattle. Some excellent materials are on hand for cat grub treatment and these should make a real difference in the value of the carcass when it is marketed. If the cattle are not bothered by flies during that time of year they also may have more pounds of meat on them when the selling day approaches, so cattle grub control should be real helpful.

Senate Approves Military Pay Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A \$1.2 billion military pay raise bill that will mean more money in the paycheck for nearly all of the nation's servicemen won quick approval in the Senate this week.

The Senate vote was unanimous — 84 to 0.

Designed to encourage careers in the military, the bill provides pay raises ranging from \$5 to \$120 a month.

CLAIMS SEVEN LIVES

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — The smallpox outbreak raging in south west Poland has claimed seven lives, including the doctor who cared for the victims, the Polish news agency PAP said today.

It said 23 new cases were reported in the last five days in Wroclaw and Opole provinces near Poland's boundary with East Germany. Among the dead was Dr. Stefan Zawada, a Wroclaw physician who fought the outbreak.
