

## First Lady In Fine Spirits Following Birth Of Patrick

OTIS AFB, Mass. (UPI)—First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy was in "remarkably" good condition today following the premature birth of her third child, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy.

President Kennedy's beautiful 34-year-old wife was described as in "good spirits" while waiting word at the quiet hospital on this base about the health of her son, born Wednesday.

Kennedy was to bring the news to her himself today following a visit to Children's Medical Center in Boston where their 4-pound, 10½-ounce baby is being treated for a lung complication.

The President was reported to have telephoned his wife twice during the night from Boston after seeing their new child in its special incubator at the Children's hospital. The second call was understood to have occurred at 12:30 a.m. EDT today.

The President assured Mrs. Kennedy that everything was all right, and, according to sources here, the First Lady "was very comfortable, very happy and sleeping very well."

**Found Daughter Happy**  
Mrs. Kennedy's last caller late Wednesday night was her mother, Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss, who said she found her daughter "awfully happy that everything was going well" and in "remarkably good condition."

Told that the world was praying for the baby, who is having breathing difficulties, the attractive Mrs. Auchincloss indicated that both she and her daughter had confidence the baby would pull through. Partly attired in

black, Mrs. Auchincloss flew to Mrs. Kennedy's bedside with her lovely daughter, Janet, 18, Mrs. Kennedy's half sister, who will make her debut this month at Newport, R. I.

The First Lady was awake, though a bit groggy, and chatted with her mother about the baby when they visited her.

The new Presidential baby's other grandmother, 74-year-old Rose Kennedy, is vacationing in Europe. Earlier in the day the White House cabled the news to Mrs. Kennedy's sister, Princess Lee Radziwell, who is vacationing in Greece.

**"Resting Nicely"**  
The President's world-renowned wife has been "resting nicely" since she underwent a Caesarian section in a race with the stork at noon Wednesday.

Her Washington obstetrician, Dr. John W. Walsh, remained on call throughout the night at the hospital. He has been on Cape Cod since mid-July, keeping tabs on Mrs. Kennedy for just the kind of emergency that occurred when her baby arrived 5½ weeks ahead of schedule.

Attending Mrs. Kennedy in the newly refurbished VIP wing of the hospital was the beloved family nurse, Lonella Hennessey, of Walpole, Mass. The red-haired nurse has been around for the births of 21 of the 22 grandchildren of former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, and she ranks as a member of the family with all of the clan.

Mrs. Kennedy's off-white hospital room was simply furnished. She slept in a hospital bed with bed stands on both sides and wore a hospital gown.

**Rocking Chair Delivered**  
The unpretentious green-shingled wing of the hospital, however, had an elegantly furnished sitting room with green wall-to-wall carpeting where the First Lady and the President can relax when she begins to feel better.

A rocking chair was delivered by truck to the back entrance of the hospital Wednesday for the President's use during the next several days when he will visit his wife.

Mrs. Kennedy saw the little baby for the first time while her husband was in the hospital room with her. After a hectic trip to Otis from the White House, Kennedy missed the baby's birth by 45 minutes.

For both parents it was a repetition of history. John Jr. was born three weeks early on Nov. 25, 1960, while Kennedy, then the President-elect, was flying back to Washington from Boston after learning that his wife had been rushed to Georgetown Hospital.

Though drama and world excitement accompanied the birth this time, Mrs. Kennedy proved again that she is an ideal patient, calm and cool, in time of crisis.

**Regional Forester Asks Wild Area For Cascades**

PORTLAND (UPI)—Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone of the U.S. Forest Service here has proposed establishment of a 96,944-acre Mt. Jefferson Wild Area in the Cascades.

He said the proposed site has been under intensive Forest Service study for the past few years. It would take the place of the existing 86,700-acre Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area which has been so classified since the early 1930s.

The proposed wild area is dominated by the namesake peak, Oregon's second highest, and is located some 60 miles southeast of Salem.

Besides 10,497-foot Mt. Jefferson, the proposed wild area contains 200 miles of trails, nearly 100 lakes, and an abundance of game, Stone said.

## Golden Age Club Hears Talk On Housing

How a community can obtain federally assisted low-rent housing for elderly persons was described here Wednesday night by a representative of the Housing and Home Finance Agency (HHFA).

Roger Spaulding, San Francisco, outlined programs which Congress has established to help elderly people obtain suitable housing within their means. Spaulding addressed a group of about 30 persons at a meeting arranged by the Roseburg Golden Age Club.

The housing official discussed the various loan programs available through the HHFA but indicated the plan most adaptable to communities seeking housing assistance for elderly persons with low income is the low rent public housing program conducted by the Public Housing Administration (PHA), a part of HHFA.

**Started In 1937**  
He explained that this program was established in 1937 to aid local communities in providing safe, decent and sanitary housing for families unable to afford standard private housing.

He said since the inception of the program 1,500 American communities have used the program to clear away bad housing and to improve living conditions.

Spaulding explained that federally assisted public housing is owned and managed by local housing authority established by state law. Under the PHA program, the homes are built, owned and operated by the local housing authority.

He said a proper procedure for action in this community would be for advocates of the housing proposal to petition the City Council. The council, if it favored the proposal, could then urge the Douglas County Housing Authority to make application for the federal housing. Funds to build a project may be borrowed from the PHA. The local housing authority would repay the advances from proceeds of bonds sold to private investors.

**Bonds Guaranteed**  
These bonds, Spaulding explained, are guaranteed by a contract in which the federal government agrees to make up the difference each year between rent revenues and operating costs and bond retirement. This "annual contribution" makes it possible to provide the homes for modest rentals based on a reasonable proportion of the families' incomes. Rents might range from \$37 to \$47 monthly for individual units.

The local government would participate by exempting the project from taxation, providing normal services (such as police and fire protection) and agreeing that an equivalent number of substandard homes will be eliminated in the community within five years.

Spaulding stressed that there is no cost to the community in developing the project. He referred to the project as a way for the community taxpayers to get back some of the housing dollar that goes to Washington.

## Discussion Of Local Flying Club Due At Airport Meeting

Surfacing improvements, flight schedules, air show results and a ruling on the airport operator's contention that Dalo Flying Club provides unfair competition are the subjects of reports scheduled to come up at Monday's meeting of the Roseburg Airport Commission.

The meeting is scheduled at 4 p.m. in the office of the city manager.

In the matter of airport improvements, the commission is expected to make recommendation to the City Council in regard to an upcoming airport sealcoat project. Roseburg Paving Co. submitted the only proposal on the work at a recent city bid opening.

Another improvement topic will be the proposed new airport ramp to be developed at a site west of the present hangar building. Bids will be opened on this project next Monday.

A ruling by the city attorney will be made in connection with the pending disagreement between Dalo Flying Club and the airport operator. City officials said the disagreement basically involves an opinion held by the base operator that unfair competition is being provided by the flying club in connection with rental of aircraft during training.

At the close of the commission's previous meeting, Chairman Orval Petersen had asked the flying club to submit by-laws or other records to the city for an opinion by the city attorney as to whether or not their activity could be considered "commercial" under terms of the ordinance.

New flight scheduling by West Coast Airlines will also be discussed. Hal Wallace, West Coast Airlines vice president, is expected to attend.
