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Small, Green China Pig Is Offered As Collateral By Young Borrower

Greg Ehrensing is 4½ years old. He behaved like any other child of his age when one of his older brothers read to him all about magic "Moon Rocks" as printed on the side of a cereal box.

He wanted some "Moon Rocks." The instructions on the box said to cut out and fill in the coupon and send it in, together with 25 cents. The Moon Rocks would arrive in the mail before too much time had elapsed.

Greg asked his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Ehrensing, for the necessary 25 cents. They teased him,

telling him they didn't have the money. They suggested that he ask their next door neighbor, Edwin G. Young, a vice president of the Douglas County State Bank, if his bank would loan the money.

A few hours later, as his father chatted over the fence with Young, Greg came up and asked if he could borrow 25 cents. Greg and his father explained the need for the money, and a loan was arranged. As collateral Greg was to give one of his prized possessions, a little green china pig.

Two days later, no doubt to Young's surprise, Greg, his mother and the pig appeared at the bank.

Young was equal to the occasion. He had a bank draft written to the company handling the cereal box premium and a promissory note to the bank which Greg very laboriously signed "Gerg." The terms of the note — five cents a week until the 25 cents was paid. The little green pig was left for collateral, snugly wrapped in a small grimy shirt.

Thus Ed Young and Greg Ehrensing, possibly the youngest borrower on record, negotiated the smallest loan ever made by the Douglas County State Bank.

As a sequel to this story, the Moon Rocks have come (and gone), the loan has been paid and the pig is back in Greg's hands.

Roseburg Attorney Back From Seminar

Spencer W. Yates, Roseburg attorney, has returned here from Urbana, Ill., where he attended the Professional Trial Lawyer's Seminar conducted by John Alan Appleman, noted trial attorney, author of more than 40 legal volumes, former president of the Federation of Insurance Counsel, and past dean of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers.

The seminar, conducted annually, is designed to enable experienced trial lawyers to further develop their skill in the trial of law suits, particularly those involving personal injuries. Yates was one of 12 lawyers throughout the country selected to attend the seminar this year.

Biggest Mortgage Instrument Filed

A mortgage instrument filed with the Douglas County clerk's office this week by El Paso Natural Gas is the largest document ever recorded by the office.

County Clerk G. D. Myltenbeck said the document, the main portion of which is bound as a book, contains 689 pages. It is described as a chattel mortgage as well as a mortgage on real estate and other property.

The document was filed in connection with the firm's scheduled natural gas pipeline installations in Douglas County. The document restates the text and provisions of an indenture of mortgage dated June 1, 1946, between the gas firm and Manufacturers Trust Co. and Frederick E. Lohr, trustees (under which A. P. Keuthen is now the successor individual trustee).

The filing fee paid in connection with the instrument also set a record. Myltenbeck said the fee was \$354.

The clerk's office plans to set up a special volume in its micro-filing department to provide a convenient and separate index for the gas firm's voluminous filings.

County's Building For July \$138,450

A permit for an addition to Drive-N-Save market in Northwest Roseburg in July helped boost the permit valuation total for the county to \$138,450.

This figure does not include construction within city limits. The Drive-N-Save permit was for \$2,000. Two other commercial permits were given, one to the Glendale Trailer Park for a utility and storage building and another for a saw shop addition at Wilbur.

Permits were issued for a total of 12 dwellings with a valuation of \$113,700. Others were granted for one addition for \$500, two carports and garages for \$750 and two restrooms at Singleton Park valued at \$1,500.

New Liquor Outlets Rejected By OLCC

Two places of business in Douglas County were turned down by the Oregon State Liquor Control Commission as new outlets for liquor.

The two were the Stockade Tackle Shop at Winchester Bay, owned by Robert Guiles, and Lemolo Lake Resort on the North Umpqua, owned by Donald and Joan Wilson.

In other action by the Liquor Commission, the Reedsport Tavern at Reedsport, owned by Harold E. Smith, was granted an application as a new outlet; Junction Tavern and Cafe, owned by James and Orlena Lewis of Winston, was okayed for change of ownership; and the Log Cabin Grocery, of Roseburg, received permission for greater privileges.
