

Twins In Front Of Yankees In Race For Homer Crown

Yes, Virginia, there is a race the New York Yankees are losing.

It's not the American League pennant race, of course, because that's a cakewalk for the world champions who are 8½ games in front with 50 to play. They couldn't lose that one if they let the batboy sub for manager Ralph Houk for the rest of the season.

But there is a definite possibility that the Minnesota Twins will wind up wearing a traditional Yankee trademark: the home run title.

The Twins have clubbed 150 homers in 113 games to put them five homers ahead of the Yankees and the way the Minnesota musclemen hit 'em in bunches they're a good bet to finish the season on top. At their present clip they'll wind up with 210 — only 30 short of the major league record set by the 1961 Yankees when Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle combined to hit 115.

The Twins reached the 150-

mark in homers for the season Friday night when Don Mincher, Zolo Versailles and Rich Rollins connected in a 5-3 victory over the Boston Red Sox. It was the Twins' eighth win in their last nine games but they're still 9½ games out of first place because the Yankees just go on winning...winning...winning.

The Yankees defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 1-0, the Detroit Tigers beat the Chicago White Sox, 3-1, after a 2-1 loss, and the Kansas City Athletics topped the Cleveland Indians, 5-1 in other AL action.

Jim Perry yielded homers to Dick Stuart and Carl Yastrzemski but pitched a four-hitter to win his ninth game for the Twins. The Twins scored the winning run in the sixth inning when Lenny Green tripled home a tally and completed the circuit himself on Chuck Schilling's wild relay.

Bullfrog Jim Bouton won his 15th game for the Yankees with a five-hitter to top the Angels' Don Lee. The Yankees scored the only run of the game in the second inning on singles by Joe Pepitone and Elston Howard followed by Johnny Blanchard's sacrifice fly. It was Bouton's fourth shutout.

Bubba Phillips' tie-breaking single paved the way for the Tigers' 10-inning second-game triumph after relief pitcher Eddie Fisher earned his sixth victory for the White Sox in the opener. Pete Ward doubled and scored the decisive run of the opener on Camilo Carreon's single in the fourth.

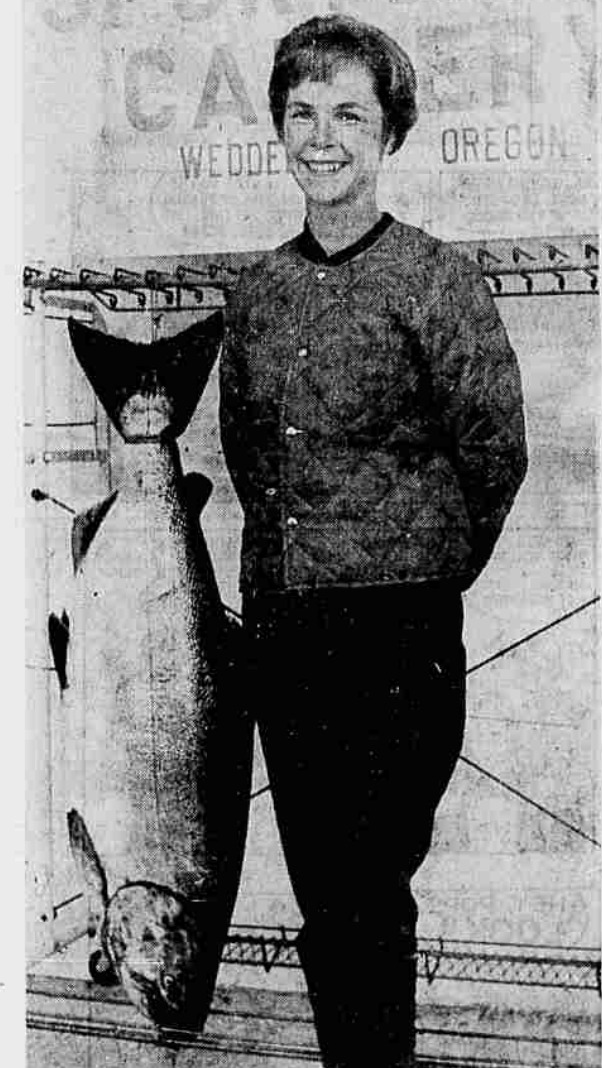

Records Fail To Fall In AAU Swim Action

CHICAGO (UPI) — The expected assault on records didn't take place during the first day of the National AAU men's swimming championships Friday, but California school boy Larry Anderson pulled off an almost impossible dive.

The 17-year-old Anaheim, Calif., state high school champion, who never had figured in major competition, piled up an amazing score of 72.50 on a forward 3½ somersault dive. Three of the five judges scored him eight of a possible 10.

Most of the winning names—the Indianapolis Athletic Club, Don Schollander, Tom Stock and Ted Stickle — were familiar ones in the outdoor competition at the Ridgeland common pool in suburban Oak Park.

Schollander, another California teen-ager from the Santa Clara S.C., scored the biggest triumph of the day. He swam to victory by 25 feet in the 400 meter freestyle with a clocking of 4:17.7.

The tow-headed Schollander won the 200 yard outdoor 200 meter freestyle and the 1963 AAU indoor 200 yard freestyle.

Stock, a world record holder in the back stroke, won his seventh national title by taking the 200 meter event in 2:12.4. But the 21-year-old Indiana University student from Aurora, Ill., missed his best time by more than a second.

Injury Riddled 49ers Favored In Grid Opener Against Vikings

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners open their exhibition season against the Minnesota Vikings tonight here at Multnomah Stadium.

Five Vikings starters are out for a variety of reasons. J. D. Smith, the team's number one runner, and veteran end Clyde Conner are definitely out with injuries. Guards Bruce Bosley and Mike Magac are doubtful because of injuries and coach Red Hickey hopes to get by without them. Guard Ted Connolly is warring with the team over his contract.

Kermit Alexander, the much-heralded back, is expected to be restricted to runbacks since he has only been in camp a week. He will especially be looking at such backs as Lloyd Winston, Jim Vollenweider and rookies Mike Lind and Don Lisbon. They have run well in practice and if one could be found to join Smith in the starting backfield, the versatile Alexander might wind up

playing defense. The Forty Niner passing game should be a strong one with quarterback John Brodie having a pair of outstanding young receivers in Bernie Casey and Jim Johnson.

Leon Donohue and John Thomas will open at guards and if they can move a few Vikings aside and men like Winston and Lind can look as good as they have in practice, then the Forty Niners might get a ground edge too.

Minnesota will not unveil its flashy rookie quarterback, Ron VanderKelen, but veteran Fran Tarkenton is around and he can throw with the best of them. VanderKelen, who started for the college all stars against Green Bay, also has only had a week of practice.

The Vikings' best runner, Tommy Mason, is sidelined because of injuries and the veteran Tommy Wilson will take his place. San Francisco defeated Minnesota three times last year and rates as the slight favorite today.

Pro Football Teams Face Full Schedule

Professional football swings into its 1963 exhibition season in earnest today with six games scheduled from coast to coast.

The Chicago Bears and New York Giants square off at Ithaca, N.Y., and the Baltimore Colts tangle with Philadelphia Eagles at Hershey, Pa., in the East's two National Football League attractions.

In West Coast action, the Minnesota Vikings test the San Francisco Forty-Niners at Portland, Ore., in an NFL contest and the Boston Patriots visit San Diego for a clash with the Chargers in the only American Football League game. The Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla., will be the scene for the Green Bay Packer-Pittsburgh Steeler game, while the Detroit Lions play host to the Cleveland Browns in NFL games.

Before departing for Ithaca, the Giants released rookie defensive end Dick Koblin of John Carroll to trim their squad to 51. Halfbacks Dick Skelly of Florida and Charlie Killett of Memphis State will miss the game because of injuries.

Gary Knafliec, who was released by the Green Bay Packers earlier this week, had second thoughts about his retirement plans. Knafliec, who has received feelers from several AFL teams, said he "may go to the West Coast next week to discuss football."

The Patriots received a jolt Friday when it was learned that halfback Ron Burton, would be sidelined for at least a month as the result of a back injury sustained against the Oakland Raiders last week. Rookie Tom Neuman will replace Burton in tonight's game.
